THIS IS BEING written just a few days before a group including 27 persons mostly from the Slaton area and about the same number from the Floyd area will board a plane for a 9-day trip to Europe.

Why are we going? Well, I don't know about the others, but I thought it would be nice to add to the places I've been, and I certainly never have been to Europe. I have been to Fort Worth, Big Spring and Denver City and once even to Amarillo, but now I just can't wait until we get back and someone from church says "we missed you last Sunday," and I'll reply nonchalantly: "Oh, I was in Europe last weekend."

I understand that many of those from here who are going already are packed or have every move planned out. Only today have we even thought about what we're going to take. I recall that some wise traveler once said that when you plan a trip of any kind, get all packed up and ready to go, then survey everything, take half as much luggage as you planned and twice as much money.

One thing I already have done: I sat down Sunday and read a little brochure called "Tips on Travel" from the company handling the tour. Some of the tips sound like valuable information; some of it sounds kind of weird. Here are some of them:

"Pack in layers — start with the heavy and odd-shaped items." I immediately thought of my tennis racket, banjo and our dog. But these wouldn't leave much room for clothing and such, so we'll likely leave them behind. The brochure even lists suggested items of clothing to pack, and the women's list doesn't even mention pants suits, which I'm sure will be the main garb of all the females on the tour. The men's list includes several things I don't even own, and several things I wouldn't take, even if I did. One is a robe. For lounging, I use an old pair of coveralls described by my kids as "grungy". And the brochure suggests I take three neckties. I may take one — not to wear, but to hang myself with if I miss the plane leaving Amsterdam for home.

One of the rules for qualifying for bringing back \$100 worth of stuff duty-free is that "you must be abroad for 48 hours". This sounds like a biological impossibility in my case, and we aren't going to Sweden. Also, you can bring back all the cigarettes and one quart of alcohol duty-free. I don't plan to bring back either. It also says one may mail gifts to the USA duty-free. I think I'll mail the IRS a quart of ice cream.

Candle lighters were nephews of the groom, Tommie and Randy Harper of Houston. They also handed out wedding programs.

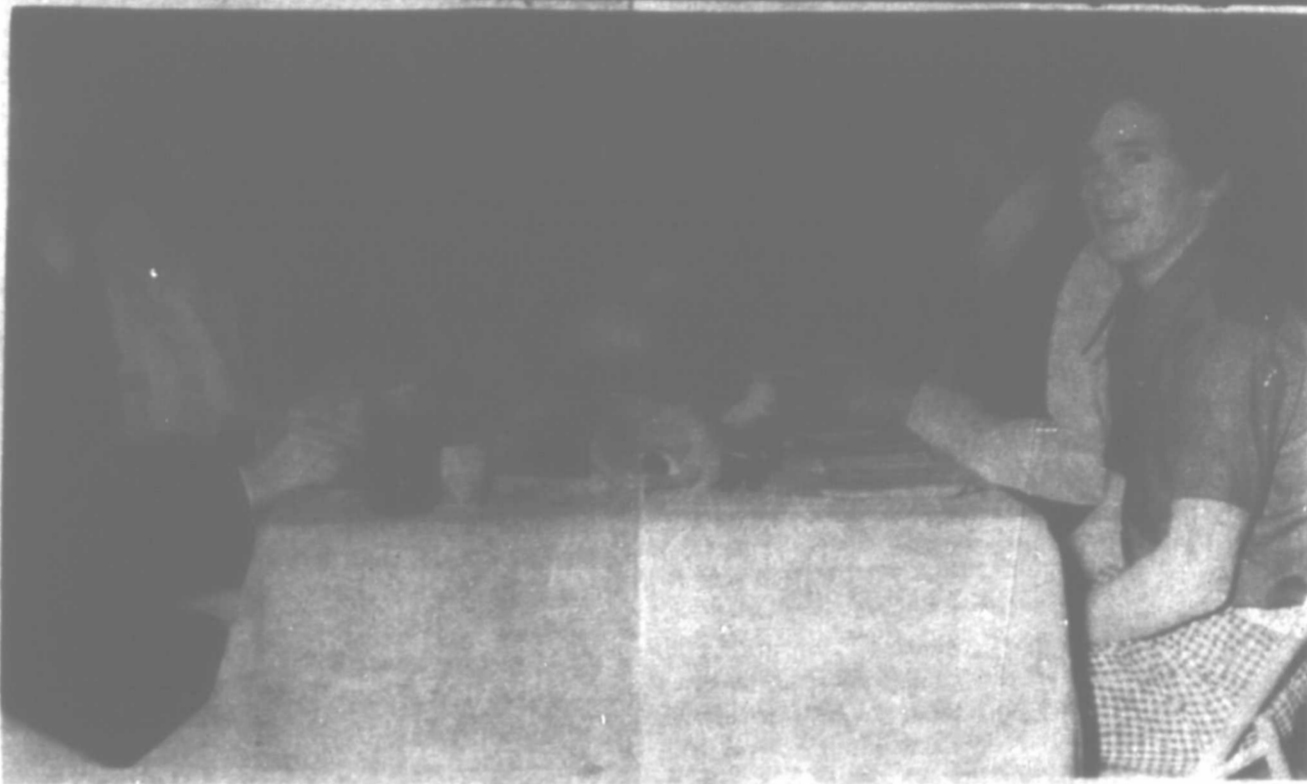

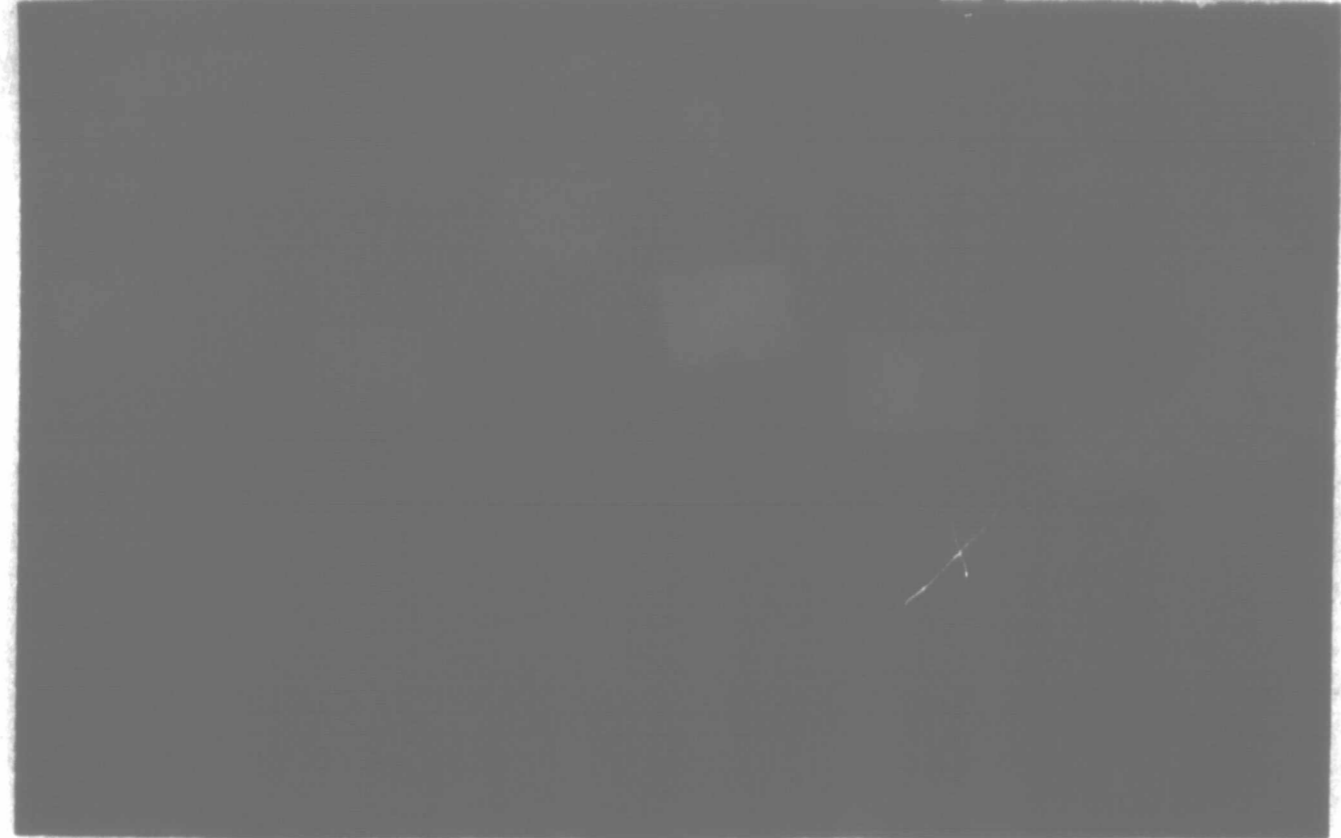

Track Meet

Sudan girls High School track team accumulated 16 points for 10th place in the Olton Track Meet Saturday.

Placing were the following: Rita Robinson—7th, Long Jump, 16' 3/4"; wtd, 440 Dash, 62.2 for a new school record; 2nd, 100 Yd. Dash setting a new school record in the preliminaries with a time of 11.5.

Kay Tamplin—8th, Shot Putt, 30' 4", and a new school record.

The Sudan High School boys participated in the Denver City Relays March 22 and did not fare so well. According to the coaches, the lack of participants in field events hurt us. We did not have Daryl Roberts (Shot Putt & Discus), Steve Richards (Shot Putt & Discus), and Rick Hill (Pole Vault). With these people not there, we scored only one point in field events when Craig Pickett scored sixth in High Jump.

The Class A schools were the only ones to out jump us in the Broad Jump. All three of our jumpers went over 10'; Luther Robinson, 19' 9"; Craig Pickett, 19' 3"; and Harvey Donahue, 19'.

In running events, we scored 46 points. Again we were minus key runners—David Aills, High Hurdles; Dennis Harvey, H.H. and Intermediate Hurdles; Jeff Withrow, distance; Darren Provence, distance; and Jerry Williams, sprinter.

In the 440 Yd. Relay where we finished third with a time of 46.9, we were disqualified because we ran out of the exchange zone.

In the 880 Yd. Dash, Brad Pierce ran a 2:29.4 but did not place. His time was 12 seconds over his best time of 2:17.0.

Edgar Tamplin ran the 120 H.H. in 20.8 but did not qualify for the finals. Craig Pickett ran 18.2 in the preliminaries and 17.8 in the finals and placed fourth.

In the 100 Yd. Dash, we had the three fastest qualifiers. Luther Robinson ran in 11.2 in the preliminary, but was disqualified, due to false starts, in the finals. Danny Williams placed first with a 10.5 against the wind, and Joel Williams placed second with a 11.2.

In the preliminaries of the 440 Yd. Dash, we qualified all three of our quarter milers. In the finals we placed fifth with H. Messamore, 56.1; sixth with M. Lane, 57.6; and seventh with B. May in 59.0.

In the 330 Intermediate Hurdles, Edgar Tamplin failed to qualify with a 48.8 as did Craig Pickett with 49.2. Kyle Martin qualified with 46.6 and ran 46.1

in the finals for fifth place.

Danny Williams and Joel Williams qualified in the 220 Yd. Dash, and placed third and fourth in the finals with a 24.4 and 25.2. Harvey Donahue ran a 25.9.

In the Mile Run Brett Poe, who has not prepared for the Mile, ran a 6:44.6 and placed ninth.

Sudan ran the Mile in 3:41.9 which was eight seconds faster than last week.

If it had not been for the disqualifications in the 440 Yd. Relay and the 100 Yd. Dash, we would have picked up 18 points which would have made our total 65 points, and would have moved us up to second place in team totals. We are coming close to peaking, stated one of the coaches, and we hope to peak by the district meet at Canyon in three weeks. We are hoping for a large turn out of fans to see us possibly win our first District Team Championship in Track.

The Bible Says

We've been studying about obeying God's commands, and how that God requires obedience to be acceptable to Him. In EVERY story in the Old and New Testament where there is a case of someone being disobedient to a command of God, we find God displeased. Another case in point is that of the sacrifices of Cain and Abel, the first recorded offerings of Adam and Eve.

Abel's sacrifice was accepted, but Cain's was unacceptable. But why? Both apparently wanted to worship God, because both brought an offering of their labors. Why was Cain's offering not acceptable to God? In the book of Hebrews in the New Testament we see that, "By faith Abel offered a more excellent sacrifice than Cain..." Does this mean that Cain did not have faith in God? Yes, in the pure sense of the word! Cain did not trust God. Had God given a command as to what sacrifice He would accept? Yes! I believe we can see this from two scriptures—Romans 10:17, "So then faith cometh by hearing, and hearing by the word of God"; and Hebrews 11:14

"By faith Abel offered a more excellent sacrifice." How could Abel have offered a sacrifice "by faith" without hearing what sacrifice to offer? (since faith comes from hearing.) Any sacrifice other than what God had authorized (example: Cain's offering) was not of faith, and whatsoever is not of faith is sin. (See Romans 14:23) Any time we offer God something He has not

commanded, or substitute something else for what He has authorized, we sin because we cannot offer it in faith. Paul said on one occasion that we as humans with all our "wisdom" should keep in mind that God doesn't want us going beyond what is written. (See 1 Corinthians 4:6) When we worship God we are trying to please GOD, not ourselves. If we forget this, God will treat our sacrifice the same way he treated Cain's, with rejection.

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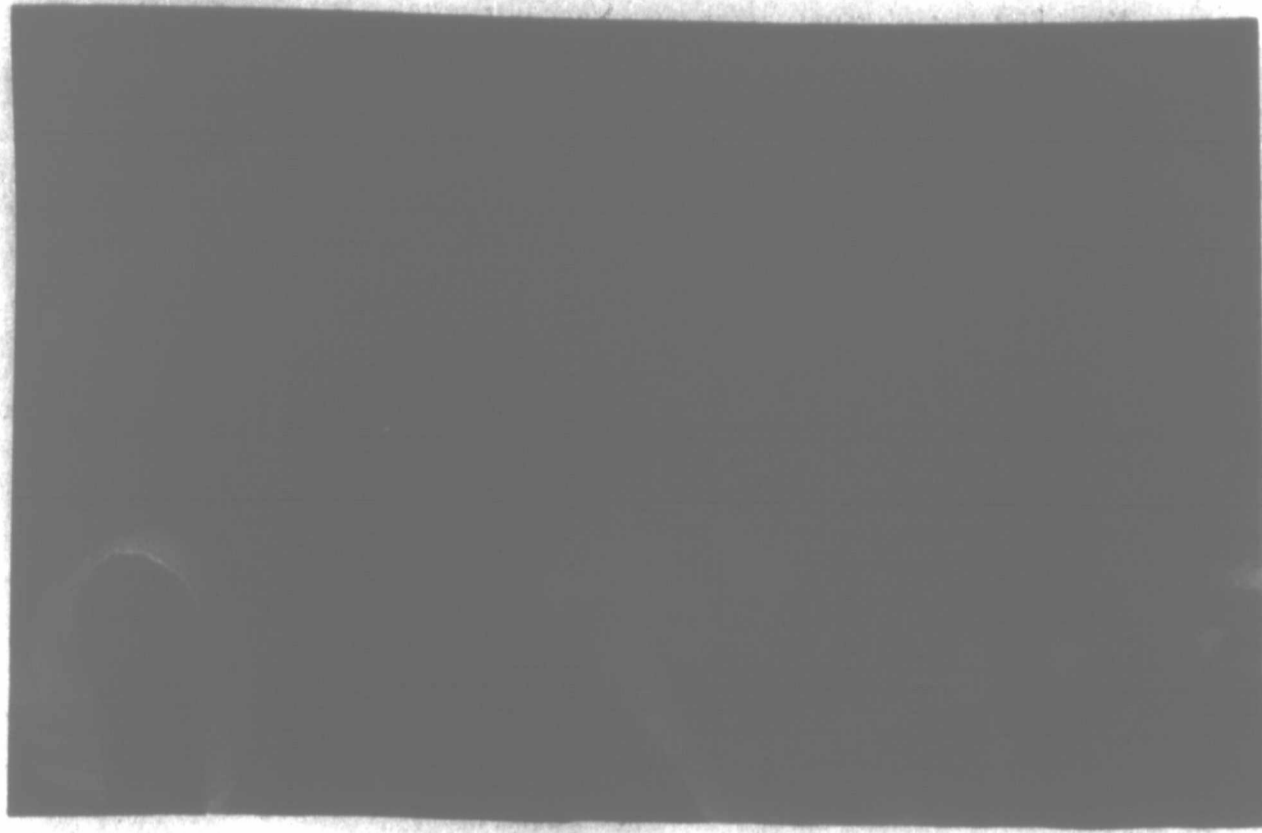
