The Bible Says

The Bible says that Jesus performed miracles. In Matthew chapter 23, Jesus gave his disciples authority to cast out demons and to perform other signs and wonders. The Gospels have proven to be historical. Yet today we have people who say they don't believe that miracles were performed in the time of Christ. Why is this hard to believe? Today let's look at a few characteristics of the miracles of Jesus and see that it is very probable that miracles did occur just as the New Testament writers said they did. (1) These miracles were performed in public places. Jesus did not try to deceive anyone. He did them where all could see. (2) These miracles were performed over an extended period of time, say about three years. Again, Jesus was not trying to deceive. He didn't perform a miracle and then hide. He didn't perform a miracle and then hide. He continued to walk among the people, therefore they had time to check Him out and prove Him false. (3) These miracles were performed even in the presence of His enemies. (Luke 6:6) This should prove beyond all doubt that He performed miracles. He did not try to

avoid the outside. (4) These miracles were performed to help the needy. He could heal the lame blind, as well as calm the sea, as well as cause a fig tree to die. Deceivers have their limitations and get tricky, but not Jesus. (5) They were performed without any limitation. He made no attempt to draw huge crowds in advance with advertising etc. (6) These miracles never made Jesus (or his disciples for that matter) rich. In fact, in Matthew 10 when He gave them the power, He charged them that they take no gain from anyone. (7) These miracles were never successfully disproven by his enemies. The truth is that Caius, Heliodorus and Julius, all opponents of Jesus admitted that Jesus did work miracles. Gamaliel (Acts 4:15-16 and 5:38) and the rest of the Jewish council admitted the miracles were done in the name of Jesus. (8) These miracles did not always require faith in the one blessed by the miracle. He raised many who were dead, and thus unable to believe. What faith had the wind, sea, or the fig tree? Yes, truly Jesus did perform miracles. The greatest miracle of all being when God raised Him from the dead, proving for all time that Jesus is Lord!
