



ever, Kuykendall contends that the quality and flavor of many vegetables grown in the fall are superior to those from spring gardens.

So, even though the weather will remain hot for a while, get an early jump on your fall garden. Just the thought of fresh garden vegetables this fall should be enough to entice most folks, even those with summer blahs.

Q. My father-in law is a perfectionist. He doesn't want to be underinsured, yet he hates the idea of having to figure out the replacement cost of his house every year during this inflation. This endorsement provides for an automatic increase every three months in the amount of protection afforded by the policy, at the rate of 1 percent of the original amount of the coverage. This means that a \$20,000 homeowners policy with an inflation guard endorsement would offer protection totaling \$20,800 at the end of one year, or \$22,400 after
