SUNFLOWERS AND JAR LIDS are topics of interest these days, and both are getting even more attention as the summer goes by.

We heard one farmer grumbling the other day that he used to do everything in his power to keep sunflowers from growing around his farm, and now a lot of folks are planting them on purpose. The other day, we noticed some wild sunflowers south of Wilson and were struck by the difference in those and the beautiful hybrids that farmers are raising all around, especially north of here.

The big jump from 5,000 acres of sunflowers last year to more than 300,000 acres this year is being watched with a lot of interest by just about everyone. If the farmers make a good return on their crop this year, there likely will be a much greater increase in acreage next season.

We don't know much about sunflowers or why they are in demand. I understand they make oil out of them for cooking, and perhaps for other purposes. Also, the young folks eat the seeds for some unexplainable reason. (I tried a few once.) Probably if some of those kids were to be x-rayed, one could see sunflowers growing in their stomachs.

We picked up a big hybrid sunflower recently and brought it home. It was about the size of a pie plate, and must have weighed two or three pounds. If good for nothing else, it would make a good weapon in an emergency (I got this lump, Doc, when my wife hit me upside the head with a sunflower).

Anyway, going back to that farmer's suggestion that he likely won't be able to grow sunflowers now that they are valuable made us think how great it would be if a market could be developed for carotene seeds. Of course, then the wild cotton plants probably would choke them out.

Or suppose someone discovers that you can take a fresh halibut and rub it on your left ear and you'll never have a common cold or sinus trouble. Then all the farmers would be out trying for hail, so they could gather up all the stores and freeze them for a big money crop.

When you start feeling around with something as important as canning green beans and corn, somebody who is found guilty of deliberately creating a problem in this area is sure to be the prime target of wrath from millions of disgruntled home canners.

Some say there are no lids around because people are hoarding them. My wife says she doesn't blame anybody for that, and wishes she were one of them. "I'd certainly buy a big supply of lids if I could find them," she said.

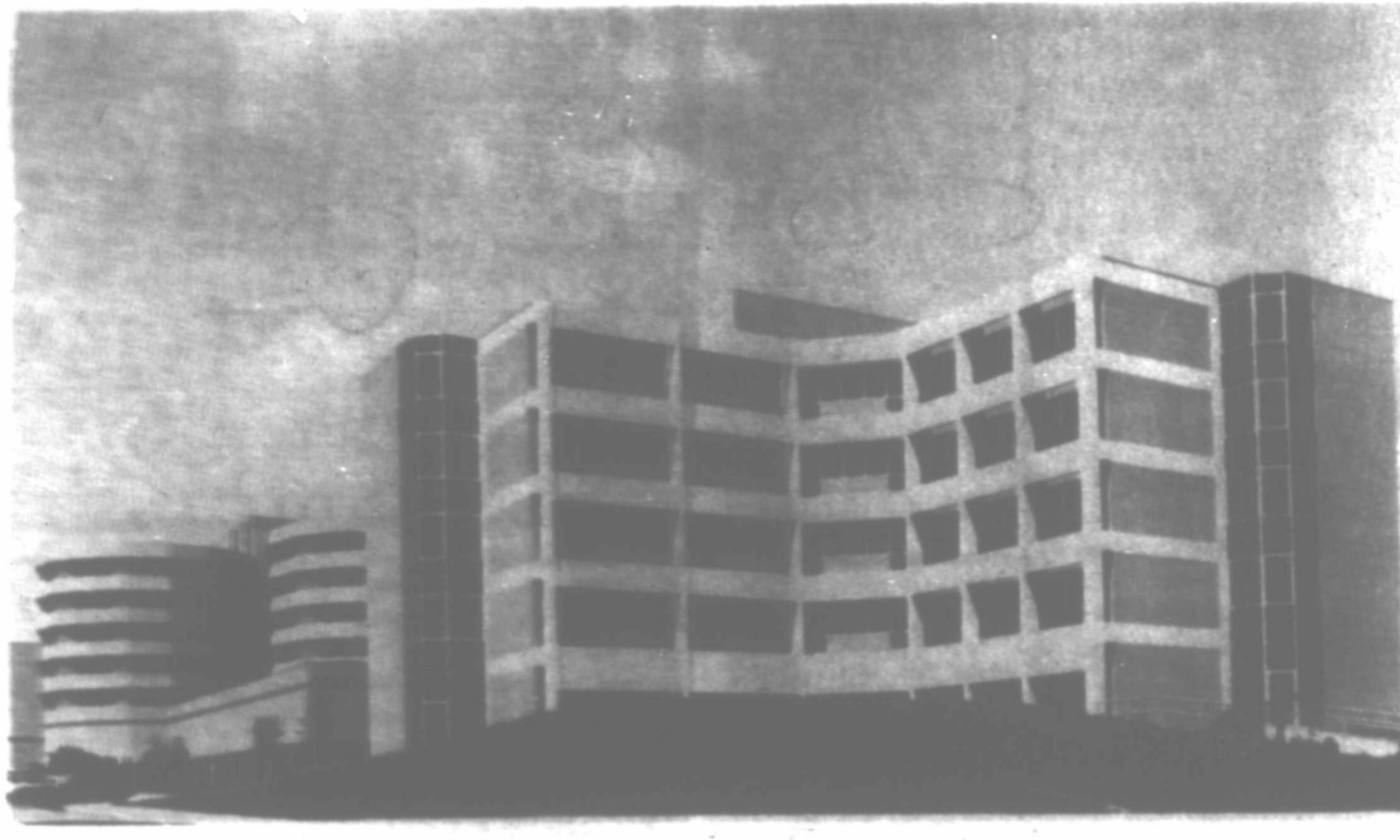
Meanwhile, we've got all these beans and corn and things, but few lids for the jars. It's an un-canny situation.

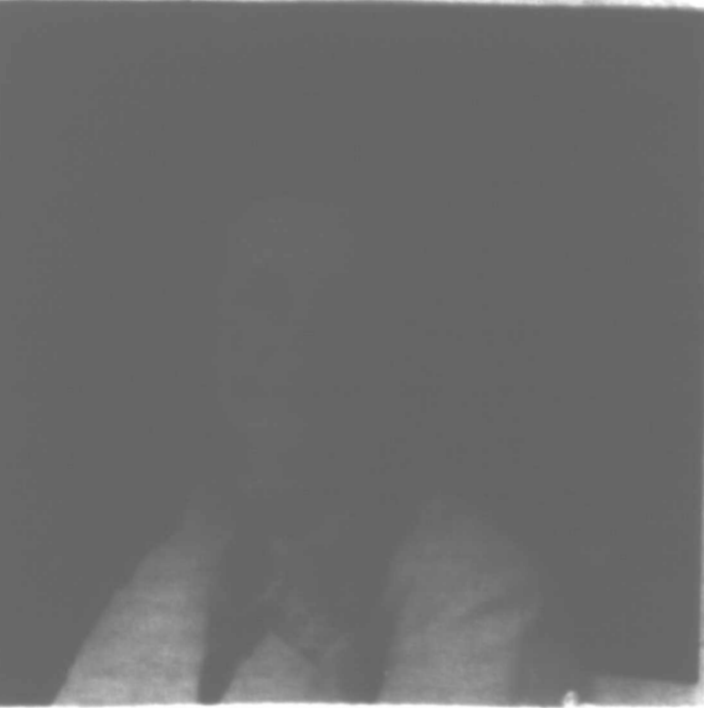

THE BIBLE SAYS BY ART LYNCH

This will begin a series of articles concerning the two covenants of God and man. I realize that God has made many covenants with man down through the ages, but the two I am referring to are particularly significant to you and me today. We will refer to the covenants as the "old covenant" and the "new covenant". We want to study; the relationship of the two covenants to each other; the purpose of the "old covenants" the passing of the "old covenant"; and the establishment of the new. By way of definition, a covenant is an agreement by two or more parties to do or refrain from doing some act or acts. In any covenant, benefits are promised and conditions are stipulated. The old covenant was an agreement between God and a nation. The new covenant is an agreement between God and individuals (you and me). The marriage agreement is covenant with which we are all familiar. In this covenant two parties are involved. Both have conditions to meet and promises to enjoy.

The old covenant was made between God and Israel when Israel was brought out of Egypt to Mount Sinai. Note Exodus 19:1-5; "... And Moses went up unto God, and the Lord called to him out of the mountain, saying, 'Thus you shall say to the house of Jacob, and tell the people of Israel:...' Read also Exodus 24:1-8. The old covenant was a national law, given only to Israel. Note Exodus 31:12-17 and Exodus 34:27-28; 'Write these words; in accordance with these words I have made a covenant with you and with Israel, (Moses and the Hebrew nation)... and he wrote upon the tables the words of the covenant, the ten commandments.' We see here that the words of the covenant were the ten commandments. Now, notice carefully Deuteronomy 5:1-5; 'Hear, O Israel, ... the Lord our God made a covenant with us in Horeb (Sinai). Not with our fathers (Abraham, Isaac, Jacob) did the Lord make this covenant, but with us, who are all of us here alive this day...' It included no other people. It was given for a definite period of time, "all the seed should come" (Galatians 3:19). This seed was Christ, see Galatians 3:16. The book of Galatians was written to people who were trying to be justified before God on the basis of keeping

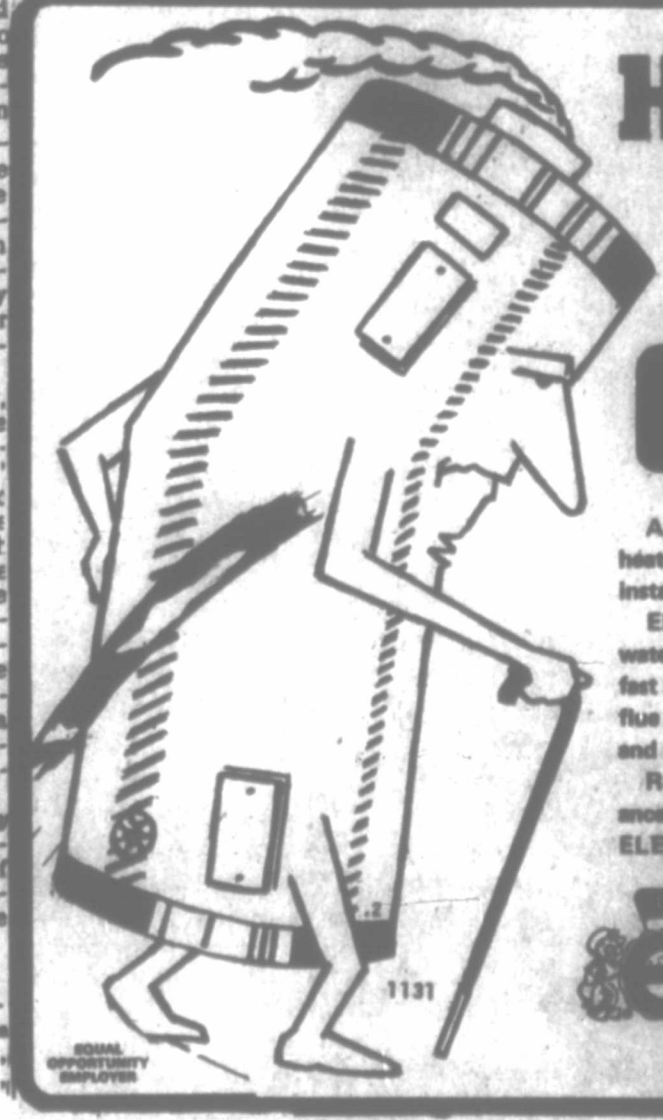

TIME FOR FALL GARDENS
Although it's the middle of summer, that's the time to start getting things in shape for your fall vegetable garden, Says Jim Kuykendall, Assistant County agent for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

Spring gardens generally did well in most parts of Lamb County although adverse weather conditions reduced some yields.

Now the fall gardening season is approaching, and that means getting land prepared and getting transplants started as soon as possible.

According to Kuykendall, many popular vegetables such as tomatoes, peppers, eggplants, pole beans, potatoes, okra, cucumbers, and squash can be planted during late July and August.

Also, the so-called "winter" vegetables such as broccoli, cabbage, cauliflower, greens, parsley and carrots can be planted at this time for early harvesting. Later plantings of these cold-hardy crops will supply fresh vegetables well into winter.

What are some of the important aspects of fall gardening?

First of all, get the land into good shape, emphasizes Kuykendall. If a garden was planted this spring and fertilizer was applied, little if any additional fertilizer will be needed before fall planting.

For new gardens, Kuykendall recommends applying two to three pounds of a complete fertilizer such as 10-20-10 per 100 square feet and working it into the soil. If plants make slow growth, alight amount of fertilizer may be applied between the rows and watered into the soil.

Of major importance for a fall garden is an adequate water supply, contends Kuykendall. Since planting is done during hot weather, sufficient water is needed for germination and early growth. Light waterings three or four

times a week may be necessary to keep the soil from drying out and crusting. Water stress during early growth of plants can reduce later yields.

Since transplants of recommended varieties of vegetables may be hard to find at local nurseries, Kuykendall suggests buying seed and growing your own transplants. Four to five weeks should be allowed from the time of seeding to setting young plants in the garden.

Transplanting is a good practice in the fall since this allows seed to be started in areas sheltered from high temperatures and drying winds.

Of course, as with all gardens, a wary eye must be kept for such problems as weeds, insects and diseases. How-

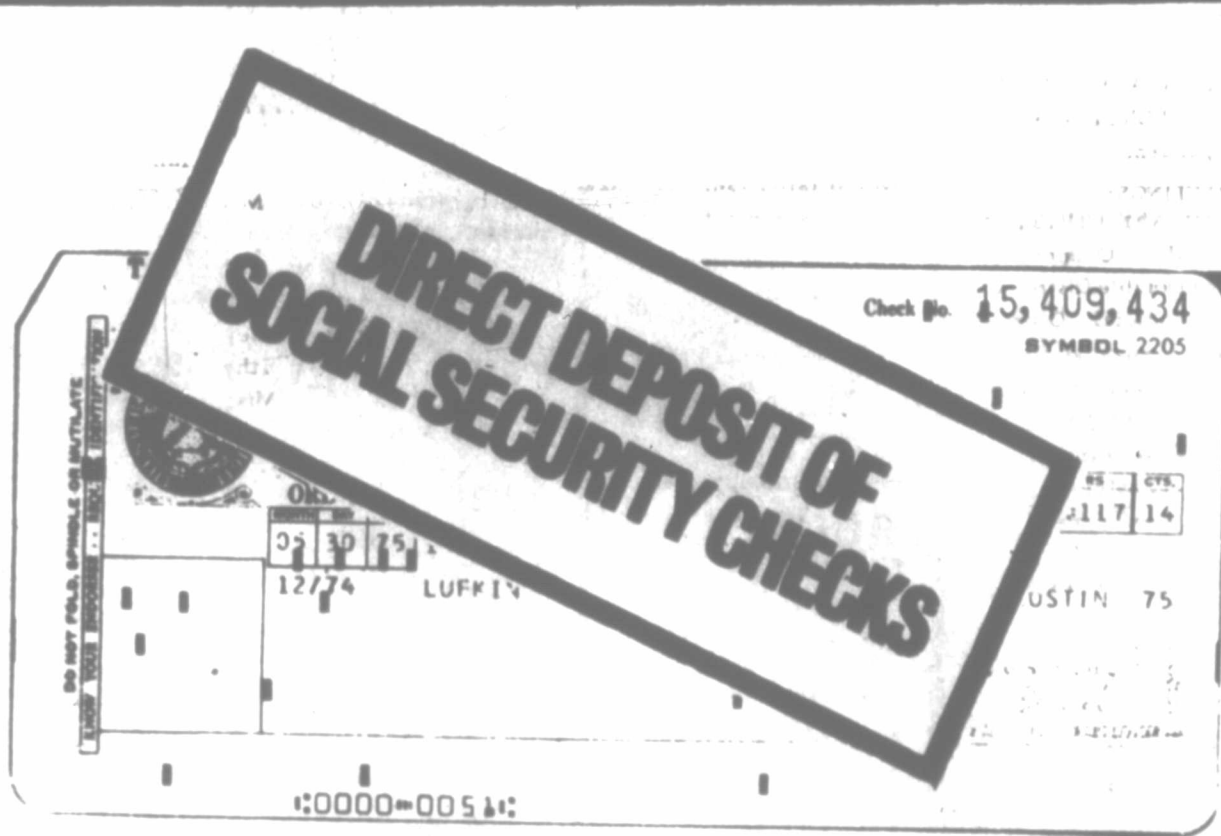
Some 151 persons attended the ceremony.

ever, Kuykendall contends that the quality and flavor of many vegetables grown in the fall are superior to those from spring gardens.

So, even though the weather will remain hot for a while, get an early jump on your fall garden. Just the thought of fresh garden vegetables this fall should be enough to entice most folks, even those with summer blahs.

Q. My father-in law is a perfectionist. He doesn't want to be underinsured, yet he hates the idea of having to figure out the replacement cost of his house every year during this inflation. He thinks it would be a good idea if insurance companies would figure out a way to do this automatically for people like him. Is this feasible?

A. Absolutely. In fact, in many states you can now obtain an inflation guard endorsement, which periodically increases your coverage under the homeowners insurance policy as protection against the effect of inflation.

This endorsement provides for an automatic increase every three months in the amount of protection afforded by the policy, at the rate of 1 percent of the original amount of the coverage. This means that a \$20,000 homeowners policy with an inflation guard endorsement would offer protection totaling \$20,800 at the end of one year, or \$22,400 after three years.
