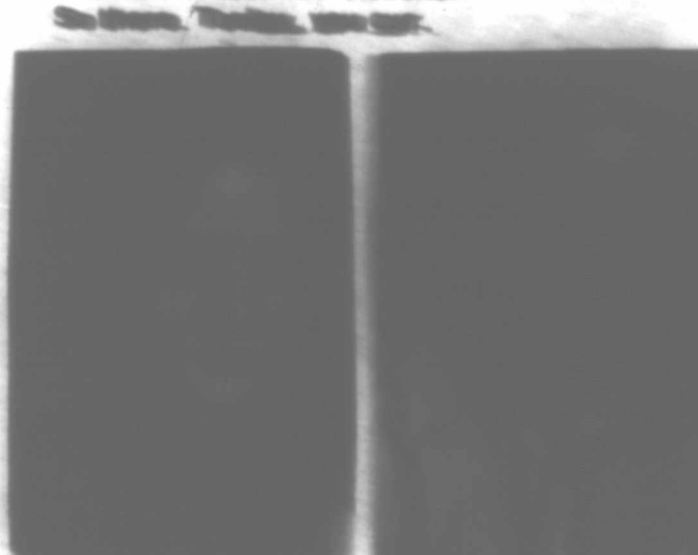
Of course, that last part kind of destroys the case of the kids in the 6-15 year-old age group who are most likely to enjoy being dirty.

## THE BIBLE SAYS--

The Two Covenants, (Part 3) The last two weeks we have seen that the law of Moses, the ten commandments, was given only to a certain people, and for just a certain length of time. Then we saw that Jesus and the Apostles, when (speaking in) the New Testament, referred to the prophets, the Psalms, and all the books written from Exodus forward as "the Law". There is no distinction made by the New Testament writers between the ceremonial part of the Law and the ten commandments. Now we want to see how the Holy Spirit, through the New Testament writers, declared that the first covenant was fulfilled and taken away. Look at Ephesians 2:14-16 "...having abolished in his flesh the enmity, even the law of

commandments contained in ordinances..." See also Colossians 2:14-15; "having blotted out the bond written in ordinances that was against us, which he hath taken out of the way, hailing it to the cross; "The new was now in force; See Hebrews 8:13; "...he is also the mediator of a better covenant..." The Apostle Paul in his letter to the Romans tells us we are not under the Law. See Romans 6:15; "What then? shall we sin, because we are not under law, but under grace? God forbid, " See also Romans 7:4 "Wherefore, my brethren, ye also were made dead to the law through the body of Christ..." And again, Romans 7:6; "But now we have been discharged from the law..." Then Romans 7:7 makes it abundantly clear what law Paul is talking about; "What then is the law sin? God forbid. Howbeit, I had not known sin, except through the law; for I had not known coveting except the law had said, thou shalt not covet..." The law written on stones and all the rest were done away in Christ! The question may come to your mind, "well if we aren't under law, but under grace, then we don't have to obey the ten commandments any more right? Then we can kill and steal, and lie, and God will forgive us right?" The Jews of that time ask that same question. Paul answers it in Romans 6:1; "What shall we say then? Shall we continue in sin that grace may abound? God forbid! We who died to sin, how shall we live any longer therein?" Ok, you may say, so the Law of Moses was taken out of the way, what now? See you next week!

## FOOD STAMP NEWS

State governors have 45 days to comment on plans and amendments that are submitted by states participating in the Food Stamp Program, according to a new regulation announced today by the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA). The new regulation provides a 45-day opportunity for each state governor or his delegated agency to review the relationship of food stamp plans and amendments to other state plans and programs. State agencies will then send the governors' comments to USDA's Food and Nutrition Service (FNS), along with the state plans and amendments when they are submitted for approval. The Society is a professional association of natural resources conservationists dedicated to advancing the science and art of good land use. It has about 14,000 members in the United States, Canada and more than 80 other countries.

The proposal is in line with requirements of Office of Management and Budget and is similar to regulations that have been adopted by other federal agencies. FNS received seven comments on the regulation after it was published for a 30-day public comment.

## CIVIL SERVICE EXAMS TO BE HELD

The U. S. Civil Service Commission has announced that applications are being accepted for the Professional and Administrative Career Examination (PACE) written test to be given in November, January, February, March, April and May. The cut-off date to apply for the first test is September 9. Persons wishing to take the November, January, February, March, April, and May tests must apply by the 20th day of the month preceding the month the test is given.

The written test will take about 4 1/2 hours and will be given at locations throughout the nation.

## COTTON, INC. NEWS

Cotton Inc. is a cotton producers organization to promote cotton for better markets. It has come under a lot of fire from congress and a few producers the last two months because of the salary paid the president of the company. I have commented on this before, but I would like to stress the importance of Cotton Inc. and the precedent that might be set if the congress goes through with the salary limitation on the 610 fund.

The 610 funds do not go directly to Cotton Inc. The funds go to the Cotton Board. The Cotton Board contracts with Cotton Inc. for the research funds. The 610 funds by law are used only for research.

Dukes Wooters was hired four years ago with a starting salary of 100,000 dollars. This was the same salary he was receiving from the company he was working for, where he was a vice-president. Not President. He accepted the position with Cotton Inc. because of the challenge it offered and the opportunity to advance with a good performance.

Board of Directors who are elected through producer organizations such as Plains Cotton Growers, Coop Oil Mill, Plains Cotton Coop Assn., etc. These people are capable of looking into all the alternatives and hiring the best people available for the money, and they felt Dukes Wooters was that man.
