then (welf, actua any wastil someone gets upset with no or other we have done, or thing we have not done, in the paper. We which we adhere to, and often these come into conflict with semmone's idea of what we ought to do.

There are many things we do not print in our newspaper because we have an established policy against them. These include, among other things, locally written poetry, liquor advertising; any form of horoscope or astrology, anything relating to fortune-telling, stories with long lists of names (we try to hold them to a maximum of about 20) of persons attending reunions, winners of stock shows or alber grante and third or itsorth place. plotures of bridegrooms and brides all cuddled up together, and pertain details of weddings, such as who blayed plano at the rehearsal dinner, and names of persons present at routing club meetings, who read the minutes and such as that.

Sometimes we get people quite put out at us for some of these taboos, and they come in asking why we don't do this, that or the other. Usually we try to explain our policies, but sometimes it is pretty hard to do without going into an entire journalism course. When this happens, we frequently just tell them that right or wrong, it's our policy. Like the sign, "There's No Reason for This-It's Just Our Policy."

Anytime anyone comes into the newspaper office and demands that we "run this article just exactly like I have it written down here, and den't change a word of it, and be sure and put it on page one", they're likely to be disappointed. As we have pointed out before, we always reserve the right to edit, rewrite and delete portions of any material which is not paid advertising.

What many people do not seem to realize is that the newspaper is not here to be a personal scrapbook for either individuals or organizations. We do want news, but we want news of things that will be of interest to more than just a few people.

That comment probably will get me a lot of allippings through the mail of things we print high would interest almost nobody. Oh, well, Maybe we can plead insanity.

ASIDE FROM policy matters, we manage to make folks angry with us sometimes by making mistakes, which we do very well. For example, one local family had two weddings in the last year and we made errors on both of fism. We regret these and other mistakes, but that doesn't help much, so far as the victime of the errors are concerned.

We do print corrections, as do most Airport. sewapapers. I noticed that a recent adition at Bitor & Publisher (a trade magazine) said most papers run their corrections under a heading "Corrections", or "Sorry" or even "We Gooled." And they seld one Florida paper runs them under a heading of Dumb Things We Bid." We may adopt that


