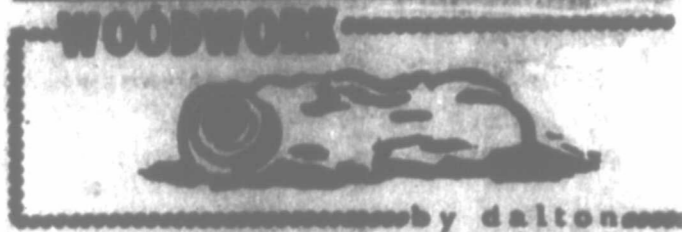

A Hornet ran the wrong pattern, and an alert junior Danny Gerber, back, picked off the pass for the Swifts. The interception return covered 18 yards for a Nazareth touchdown. The kick for the extra point was wide to the left, but the game was tied 6-6 with 8:17 left in the second quarter. The rest of the half was a defensive struggle.

At the beginning of the second half following the Hornet kickoff to the Swifts, the visitors showed they had come to play ball by moving from their 39 to the Hornets 34. Then one of the big plays of the game took place. Facing second and six at the Hornet 34, Swifts QB Kenny Brockman, tried a quick pass to his left end. An alert Kyle Martin intercepted the pass, got a clearing block from Lonnie Williams and raced 66 yards to score. A running try for two extra points failed. But with 7:31 left in the third quarter, the Hornets had the lead again, 12-6.

Both teams continued to play good defense, and just before the end of the quarter, Hornet Harvey Donahue came up with another big play. Facing fourth and five from their 42, the Swifts tried a quick kick. Donahue raced in from his left

end spot going in to block and hit the ball just as the Swift punter began his kick. The Hornets then made their last scoring drive of the game. At the Swift 43, the Hornets drove in for the TD in 10 plays on a three yard scamper by Danny Williams with 8:55 left to play. Kyle Martin kicked the extra point and the Hornets now had a 19-6 lead.

The Swifts, still not to be denied, took the following kickoff and moved from their 21 to the Hornet six yard line in 16 plays. However, the Hornet defense held. Sudan's offense then gained two first downs and ran out the clock.

The Hornet defense played a good ball game allowing Nazareth only one first down in the entire first half. In the second half, they did have two good drives, but were stopped short of scoring.

As the football season nears an end, it finds the Hornets leading in competition in the north zone of District 2-B with two conference games remaining. They are one game ahead of neighboring Amherst who lost last week 8-7 to Motley County Matadors. The Hornets have both of these teams to play going to Amherst Friday night in their "homecoming" event. The Hornets expect the Bulldogs will be even more ready for them due to this fact as well as the fact that they suffered a 28-14 defeat by Sudan last year. The Hornets are expected to be "up" for their opponents also, with all team members in good condition and expecting to see action Friday. Game time is 7:30 P.M.

The Pep Rally for Friday will be held in back of the Hornet field house at 6:00 P.M. since school is not being held that day. It is hoped that everyone will come so a good "send off" can be given for the Hornets.

Also, a caravan of boosters plans to leave Sudan together Friday night to make the trip to Amherst together. For the time, call a member of the Booster Club. All boosters are invited to join them.

Sudan Jr. High defeated the Nazareth hosts Oct. 23 by a 26-8 score. Sudan scored in all quarters.

Sudan touchdowns were by Victor King over center from the seven yard line in the first quarter; Billy Williams returning a second quarter kickoff from Nazareth 80 yards, following a Nazareth TD on a long pass play and conversion of two points; Billy Williams off right tackle in the third quarter for a 40 yard TD; and Williams around right end for a 20 yard TD in the final period of play. King scored the point after and the win of 26-8.

The next and final game of the season for Sudan Jr. High will be here today, Oct. 30, at 5:00 P.M. The team has lost only two games during the season. Come on out today to back the team as they host Amherst in the final game.

Teachers Meeting Slated For Lubbock

Public school students in the area will enjoy a holiday October 31 when over 5,000 teachers and school administrators from 17 West Texas counties gather in Lubbock for the Eighth Annual Convention of District XVII, Texas State Teachers Association (TSTA).

Dr. William W. Purkey of the University of Florida will be principal speaker at the morning session. He is internationally recognized for his research, writing, and lectures on self-concept theory and processes for humanizing education.

The House of Delegates for the convention will convene Thursday evening, October 30, at Coronado High School. The business session will follow at 9:30 p.m. banquet.

The general session October 31 begins at 9:30 a.m. in Lubbock Municipal Coliseum, Dean Andrews, president of District

XVII and superintendent of Lorenzo Public Schools, will preside. Mrs. Jewel Howard, immediate past president of TSTA, will bring greetings and a report from the state organization. Presentation of colors will be by Lubbock's Escadado High School Army Junior R.O.T.C. Music will be presented by the Lorenzo High School Band, and the invocation will be given by Rev. Fred Hecks, Pastor of the Lorenzo First Baptist Church.

Numerous luncheon and afternoon sectional meetings are planned for members of several educator associations and teachers of subject matter areas. An afternoon session for elementary teachers will be at 2:15 p.m. in the Monterey High School Auditorium. This large group meeting will feature an address by Lewis Timberlake of Austin. He is president of Decision Dynamics, a corporation engaged in the development of human potential. Frank Mollican, principal of Lubbock's Madgeon Elementary School, will preside. Secondary teachers will attend the appropriate sectional meetings for their subject matter specialties.

Held concurrently with the teacher meetings will be sessions for members of the Texas Educational Secretaries Association and the Cafeteria Section of TSTA. COTTON MARKET SLOW PRICES WEAK

Growth prices were steady to weak during the week ending October 24, according to Paul R. Dickson, in charge of the Lubbock Cotton Classing Office.

Trading was slow. Growers offered small lots of new crop cotton in very light volumes.

Demand was best for mixed lots of mostly grades 42 and 44, staples 30 through 34, middles 2, 7 and higher, Dickson said. These lots brought \$1.00 to 42.00 cents per pound.

Grades 31, 41 and 51 were predominant. Long bale accounting for 13 percent, 35 percent, 17 percent and 20 percent is respectively.

Mike readings 3.5 through 4.9 amounted to 34 percent of the total. Mike group 3.3 through 3.4 accounted for 21 percent and 3.0 through 3.2 ran 34 percent. Mike 2.7 through 2.9 was 11 percent.

Pressing tests indicated breaking strengths at Lubbock averaged 86,000 pounds per square inch.

About 1,200 samples were classed by the Lubbock Classing Office during the week ending October 24. This season's total stands at 1,375 samples compared to 238 on the same date a year ago, according to the USDA's Agricultural Marketing Service.

(Cotton harvest is just beginning in the Sudan area, with most gins having received only their first bale.)

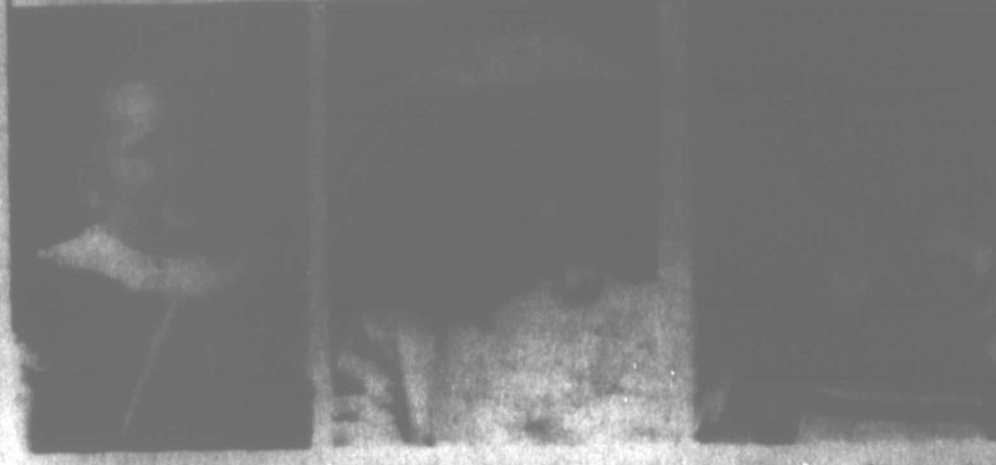

THE BIBLE SAYS

By Art Lynch
"Every person is born into this world a sinner." This is a statement I read recently in a tract that was widely distributed in this area. Since this column is entitled, "The Bible Says," I had better begin by saying that the Bible does not teach such a doctrine. This is a man-made idea and quite contrary to the teaching of the Scriptures. The two Scriptures used to substantiate this claim were: Psalm 51:5... "Behold I was shaped in iniquity, and in sin did my mother conceive me," and Romans 3:23... "For all have sinned and come short of the glory of God." Let us

first deal with Romans 3:23. Notice Paul says, "For ALL have SINNED..." This states that the persons being talked about have done something, in this instance, sinned. Sin is lawlessness, 1 John 3:4. Lawlessness is the breaking of some law. Breaking of law requires knowledge of such law. Babies have no such knowledge of law, therefore cannot transgress law. Sin is the breaking of God's law. What baby or child in the first several years of their life, for that matter, is capable of breaking God's law? This verse definitely cannot be used to put forth this doctrine. The context of Romans 3 is definitely not children. Paul is talking to Jews and Greeks, all old

enough to read his letter, (see verse 9) and he is telling them that neither one of these groups are elect. Notice verse 10, "There is none righteous, no, not one;..." Then in verse 23, Paul says "...all (both Jews and Greeks) have sinned..." What is the logical end of a doctrine started by men that teaches being born in sin? It means that all children who are not old enough to believe in Jesus Christ but die a premature death are condemned to an eternal punishment, because we must believe in Jesus to be saved, Acts 16:31 (a verse used in this same tract) and the wages of sinners is death, Romans 6:23 and 1 Corinthians 6:9-10 (also used in this tract). Therefore, if

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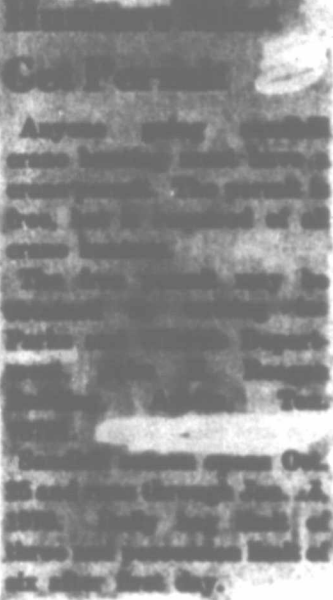

Texas Taxes

Austin—We get a surprising number of calls asking if residents of other countries can make purchases in Texas without paying the Texas sales tax.

The answer, of course, is no. Many of these calls come from merchants along the great border we share with Mexico and from cities where there are universities with large foreign student enrollments.

The only kind of sales tax exemption granted foreigners by Texas law covers staff members of foreign consulates housed in Texas. The only other type of sales tax exemption available for foreigners shopping in Texas covers merchandise bought here but shipped directly to the home address of the foreign purchaser.

If the foreign purchaser takes possession of the purchase in Texas, though, the state and city sales taxes must be paid.

There is considerable activity in foreign purchases of goods for tax-free shipment outside Texas, particularly along the Mexico border. There are several ways this can be accomplished.

The retailer may deliver the goods to a forwarding agent or customs broker for shipment outside the state. The retailer must retain all shipping documents with a copy of the shippers export

COTTON TALKS

FROM PLAINS COTTON GROWERS, INC.

Pending labor legislation has been a recurring topic of conversation of late at the offices of Lubbock-based Plains Cotton Growers, Inc.

One of the labor bills under discussion, which would boost minimum wages across the board, is of direct concern to cotton producers. The other, known as the "Common Situs" picketing bill, ostensibly relates only to construction trade unions, but carries distinct and dangerous implications for cotton producers along with everyone else in the U.S., PCG officials believe.

The minimum wage bill, H.R. 10130, would increase the minimum wage for farm workers in graduated steps to \$3.00 per hour in 1978. The minimum would be \$1.80 per hour until December 31 of this year; \$2.00 from January 1, 1976 to June 30, 1976; \$2.35 from July 1, 1976 to December 31, 1976; \$2.60 through 1977 and \$3.00 per hour beginning January 1, 1978.

The industrial worker minimum and the minimum for many workers in agricultural processing plants such as oil mills and warehouses, would go to \$3.00 in 1977. Ginners would be required to pay their help no less than \$2.00 the remainder of this year; \$2.20 January 1, 1976 to June 30, 1976; \$2.50 July 1, 1976 to December 31, 1976; \$2.60 for all of 1977 and \$3.00 thereafter.

Also, two new twists have been added. The bill would provide automatic wage increases triggered by the Consumer Price Index after January 1, 1977 and would boost overtime pay from the present 1-1/2 times hourly rate to 2-1/2 times hourly rate. The hourly wage would be increased by 1 percent plus the percent rise in the price index at its highest level during any consecutive 3-month period in which the CPI rose at least three percent over the index for the month in which the bill becomes law.

Hearings on H.R. 10130 were held October 21-23 before the House Labor Standards Subcommittee. Testimony against the measure was voiced there by the National Council of Agricultural Employers, of which PCG is a charter member.

The "Common Situs" bill, among other things only slightly less noxious, would give officials of the building trades unions power to shut down an entire construction project, involving dozens of contractors, because of a dispute with a single contractor on the project. In short, it would legalize secondary boycotts.

According to the National Right to Work Committee (NRWC), its passage would lead to "rampant feather-bedding, mushrooming make-work practices and ballooning construction costs" on churches, schools and commercial construction.

The bill, originating in the House as H.R. 5900, went through that body with a minimum of debate. It will become law if passed by the Senate and signed by the President. The NRWC is asking that thousands and thousands of individual letters be written to Senators and to President Ford as the only means to overcoming the tremendous lobbying power of the unions.

"We must convince Congress and the President it is political suicide to legalize Situs Picketing," the NRWC says.
