Years ago a Kentucky grandmother gave a new bride the following "receipt" for washing clothes. It appears below just as it was written, and despite the spelling has a bit of

1. Bilt fire in backyard to heet keetle of rain

2. Set tubs so smoke won't blow in eyes if wind is pert.

3. Shave one hold cake lie soap in bilin water.

4. Sort things, make three piles, 1 pile white, 1 pile collored, 1 pile work britches and rags




