How It Looks From Here

Like to repeat a letter we received from someone who seems to know from beans.

Dear Editor:

I was watching television the other day when the striking farmers drove their tractors around the White House in Washington.

A TV reporter, trying to get both sides, had his camera zoom in on a young farmer who got out of his tractor and explained that he was there because, while he enjoyed helping feed America, he didn't enjoy going broke in doing it. Then the camera switched to a bystander, obviously a well-fed city dweller, who said, when asked what he thought of the strike, "if the farmers can't make a living farming, why don't they sell out and try something else?"

The network then switched to a report on the Middle East, of which Congress nor anyone else for that matter, knows very much about.

A few days later, I was reading a newspaper account of the President's new budget, and down toward the end it reported that city mayors were unanimously upset because the budget has reduced appropriations for cities.

"Cities are in dire financial trouble," a prominent mayor said, "and if the Federal government doesn't give us more relief, the whole country is in for serious trouble."

That evening on the network news I kept looking for some farmer to pop up and say "if cities can't make it on their own, why don't they sell out and try something else?"

Another thing that amuses me is the way some city people jeer when they see striking farmers driving tractors with enclosed cabs. "Look at that!" they say. "If farmers are so hard up, how can they afford those tractors with heated cabs? Probably air conditioned for summer too." Then they go back to their winter heated and summer air-conditioned offices and do whatever it is people do in a 20 story office building from 9 to 5, after which they drive home in cars with enclosed tops and sides, first stopping by a grocery store to pick up a 60 cent loaf of bread, of which the farmer was paid 3 cents for the wheat.

But if it will make them feel any better, my tractor out here on this High Plains grass infested farm doesn't have a cab. What's a cab good for on a 30 year old tractor with four flat tires? But I will say this, and I don't care what they say, my house is heated in the winter time. And in the summer, if no city people are around, I turn on a window evaporative cooler.

Community Contest

"PRIDE means working together to make our community a better place in which to live", according to Hoyt Robertson, president of the Sudan Community Improvement Association (SCIA).

He, along with other members of the organization, wish to stress the importance of this fact to all area residents.

SCIA has entered the Sudan community in the Texas Community Improvement Program, which is sponsored by electric utility companies in Texas in cooperation with the Texas A&M University System. Cash prizes will be awarded to winners.

Progress in communities from April 1977 - March 31, 1978 will determine winners.

In entering this contest, reports of progress are needed from each organization in the Sudan community which includes civic groups, other clubs, churches, schools, etc. Thus far, only a few such reports have been received by the Records Committee composed of Jo Ann Chester, Geneva Glascock and Micky Stephens. These reports are needed by March 1 and may be taken to Chester Irrigation or Johnson Chevrolet for the committee.

In a meeting of SCIA on Tuesday, February 14, at 7:30 p.m. in the Community Center when Robertson presided, other committees also gave reports.

The Hotel Restoration Committee stated that several items in the hotel will remain there while others will be selected for the auction of SCIA. This date for this auction has not yet been set.

Randy Humphreys gave a report on the City of Sudan's water situation and dumpsters, the building of 10 F.H.A. housing units, ambulance provision, and of a meeting last week with Southwestern Public Service Company representatives. Work on the housing units will begin in March in west Sudan and should be completed in October. This will pretty well coincide with the time construction begins on the new SPSC coal fired plant north of Sudan. The first crews are expected for that job in the summer months, according to Humphreys. SCIA is in favor of supporting the City of Sudan in their decisions on these projects. The dumpster service will begin soon.

The last Music Festival was reported to be a success by Geneva Glascock. She estimated some 300 persons in attendance along with TV reporters for Channel 13, Lubbock. The event is sponsored by Sudan Fire Department and the Lions Club. The next Music Festival is February 25 (this Saturday evening). Mrs. Glascock further stated that the Outsiders Basketball Tournament sponsored by Booster Club would begin this week and a part of the proceeds will go to the Sudan Baseball Association as does the proceeds from the Concession stand at the Music Festival.

According to Micky Stephens of the Sudan Arts and Crafts Association, arts in many forms was displayed, and demonstrated in their seminar held recently in the local school with each form being explained. In conjunction with the seminar, contests were held. Seven elementary students were presented certificates and will receive some instruction in a form of art. One high school student, Kevin Fisher, will receive a full course in art. The seminar was to initiate art into the local school system with hopes of a program there in the future. A total of 150 students participated in the contests showing their interest in the subject.

Sara Wood, secretary-treasurer of SCIA gave a report of the treasury and of bills due. She also had read minutes of the January 10 meeting which were approved.

Dottie LaGrone of the Department of Human Resources in Littlefield was introduced. She requested support from SCIA and volunteered their services to SCIA.

Also present was Dorothy Powell of the Lamb County Extension Service in Littlefield.

Refreshments of finger sandwiches, cookies, punch and nuts were provided by Sara Wood, Geneva Glascock and Dottie LaGrone. They carried out the Valentine motif in decorations.

Historical Marker Dedicated

The Lamb County Historical Survey Committee wishes to announce that a Historical Marker commemorating the McKenzie Trail will be officially dedicated March 2, 1978 at 3 p.m. The marker has been placed 1/2 mile south of Fieldton on Highway 1072.

Principal speaker for this dedication will be Don Oyner, County Judge of Lamb County, a resident of the Fieldton community. Billy Wayne Clayton, speaker of the House of Representatives of the State of Texas will also address the assembly. V.M. Peterman, chairman of the Lamb County Historical Survey committee will conduct the ceremony.

The McKenzie Trail passed through this area along the Brazos River, commonly known as Black Water raw, during the beginning of Lamb County History. Col. Ranald S. McKenzie led an expedition of 248 officers and enlisted men along the draw in a campaign to break up a ring of traders paying the Indians to steal cattle and horses from the early settlers. The pass was then used by his men used later by scouts and trappers.

Every citizen of Lamb County and all other interested persons are invited to attend this event of historic significance.

Wanted By The FBI

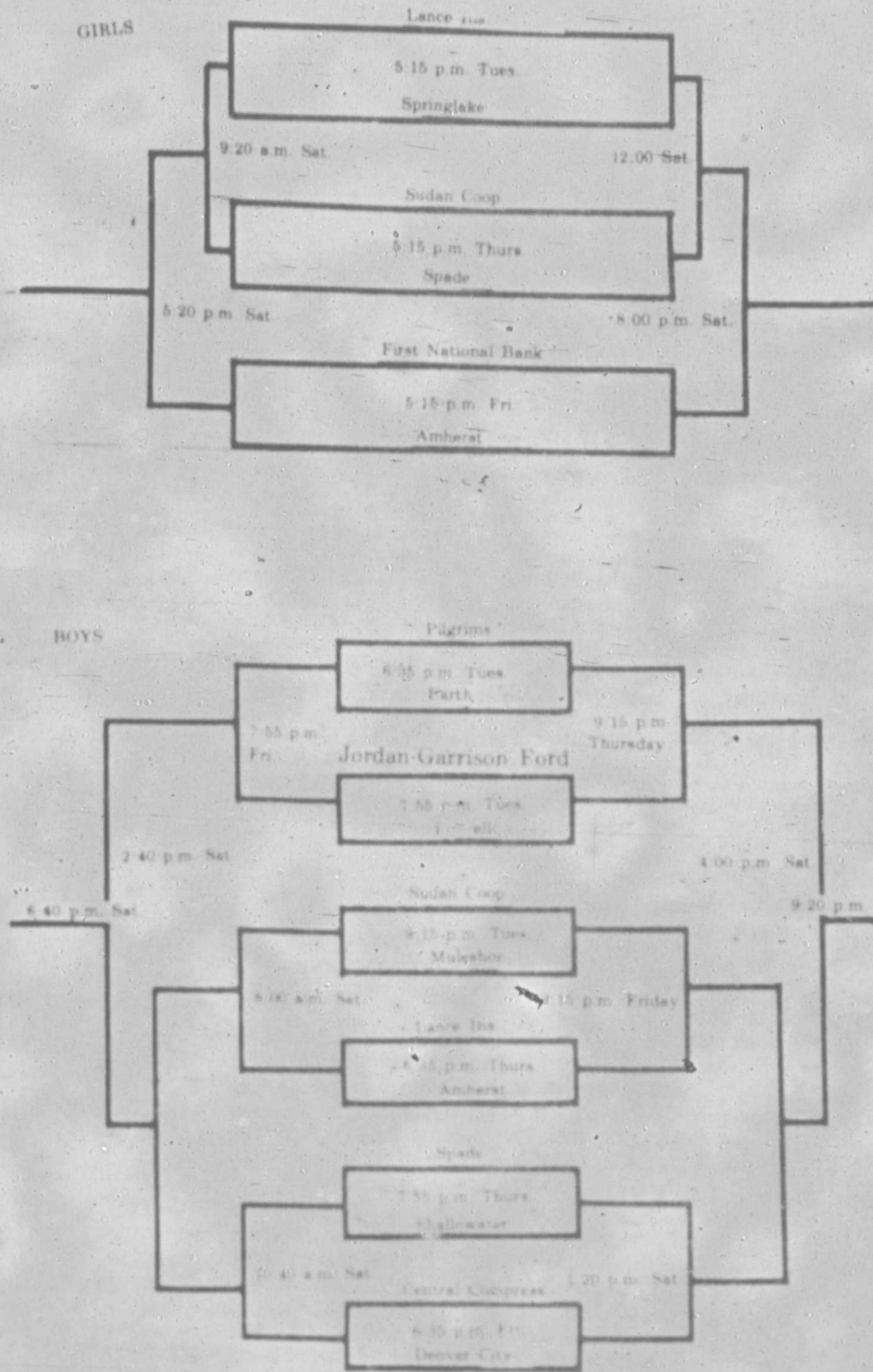

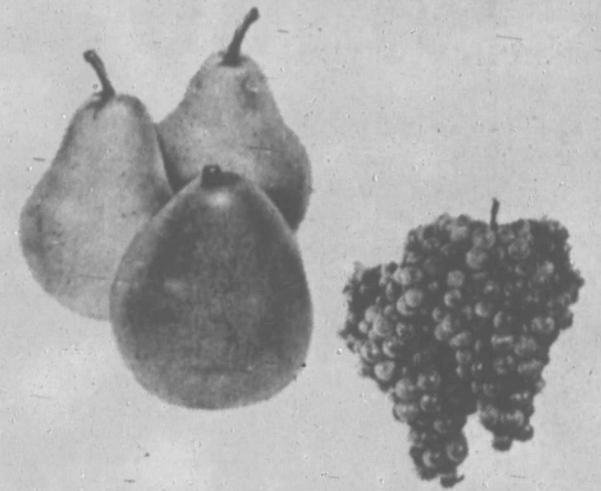
- I cannot change my partner, but I can change me.

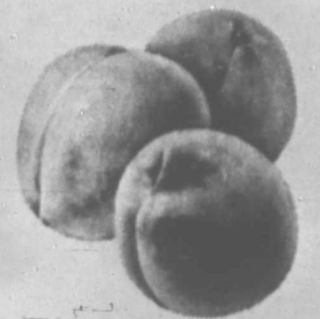

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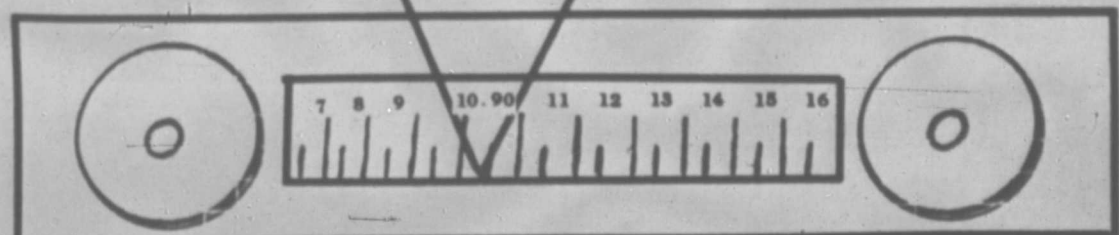

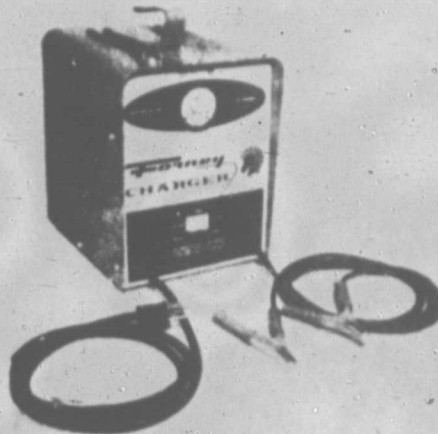
