## Bond Election Called

A Bond Election for Water and Sewer Improvements has been called for April 22nd. This is to purchase land for additional water wells, elevated storage tank, supply lines, distribution lines, along with all necessary appurtenances for improvements to the City of Sudan water system, and sewer system.

An application has been made by the City to South Plains Association of Governments and Farmers Home Administration for a grant and long term financing with a low rate of interest.

This is to take care of our low water supply now and anticipated growth of the City of Sudan by Southwestern Public Services new Tolk Coal Fired Generating Plant being located in the Sudan School District.

## Property Added To City

Additional property has been annexed in to the Sudan City Limits. The Final Ordinance was passed at the March 9th regular Commission meeting.

This includes two blocks owned by the Sudan School and includes part of the football field and Little League Ball Field and the property joining the Dean Addition on the South.

This is property owned by F.M. and Margaret Smith. This will extend Barron Street on West to Highway 303.

The invocation was given by James Withrow. The minutes of the previous meeting were read and approved, as was the Superintendent's financial report for the month of February. The Tax Collector's report was presented with a 97% tax collection being reported for the current tax roll.

Bids were examined on the school bus that was up for sale. The bid was accepted from Texas School Bus Sales Center, Inc. for \$808.80; this being the highest bid.

It was reported to the Board that Truman Johnson of the First Baptist Church would give the Commencement Address at the Senior Exercises.

The purchase of a metal feeding barn that belongs to Dexter Baker was discussed and if possible this barn was to be purchased for additional feeding facilities for the FFA of Sudan.

The Texas Department of Health Resources will hold a Crippled Children's Services Nursing Clinic in Littlefield on Tuesday, March 21, 1978. The clinic will be held at the Texas Department of Health, 410 Littlefield Drive, Littlefield, Texas, from 9:00 a.m. to 3:00 p.m. Billie Moore, R.N., Public Health Nurse from the Region 2 office in Lubbock will be in Littlefield to conduct the clinic. Texan Writes 2nd Book

Escape From Evil is the title of a recently published book by Preston Taylor, pastor of the First Baptist Church of Carrizo Springs, Texas near the Rio Grande. The 200 page writing has its roots deeply embedded in the dramatic events of Exodus and the life of Moses, but it breathes fresh air from our contemporary world. The book may be obtained for three dollars postpaid from the author, or from Christ For The World Publishers. A few chapter titles reflect the flavor of this down-to-earth book: "The Puzzle of...Suffering," "What's God Really Like?" "Lose Your Dread-In The Sea Called Red," "Why Do Folks Fuss and Fume?" and "How To Be A Leader." Taylor expresses himself in a crisp, flowing style that is easy-to-read and thought provoking. The life-oriented book is not designed for the critic, but for the average person who wants new courage and inspiration for living. The reader soon discovers that the God who lifted the ancient Hebrews from hopelessness and despair wants to help man today. The author grew up on a farm and served as a missionary in South America. He draws upon his varied background for illustrations and humor which gives a sparkle to every page of his writing. Taylor's first book released by Moody Press in 1976 deals with a New Testament letter.

"his country," the Dalhart farmer and rancher said a stronger export market "has to help the price in the market place for our products." In Chandigarh, India, the group will meet with top officials of the agriculture ministry. On March 16, Grant will address the faculty and students of the Punjab Agricultural University at Ludhiana. In Bombay, the Indo-American Chamber of Commerce will meet with members of the trade delegation and also host a dinner with Indian industrialists and buyers. The mission will return to the U.S. by way of Los Angeles after stopovers in Jakarta, Indonesia; and Hong Kong, the British crown colony on the Southeast coast of the China mainland. Seven other state Farm Bureau leaders are in the delegation.

Farm Bureau Report

Texas Farm Bureau President Carol Chaloupka is participating in a trade expansion mission of Farm Bureau leaders and staff which left New York City March 10 for India, Indonesia and Hong Kong. The group, headed by Allan Grant, president of the American Farm Bureau Federation, is seeking to stimulate agricultural exports, especially to India, now considered one of this country's prime trading partners. Chaloupka pointed out that the developing countries comprise a much larger potential farm export market than Russia or Europe. These emerging nations now buy about 40 percent of all U.S. grain exports, he said. Noting that India has become "a major buyer of wheat from the U.S.", and that Indonesia "is right now purchasing wheat from

## Photographic Inventory Accurate Record

Photographic or written inventories offer accurate records of household possessions, says Mrs. Dorothy Powell, Lamb County Extension Agent.

Prepare a complete and precise inventory, and, avoid relying on memory alone to list possessions in case of a total loss of property, she suggests.

### PHOTOGRAPHIC INVENTORY

When preparing a photographic inventory, photograph each wall over-lapping areas, the agent explains.

Take close-ups of special possessions. Open cabinet and desk drawers, and photograph special collections separately.

Keep the negatives in a safe deposit box, along with photographs.

Save the negatives in case the insurance company wants to have a special blow-up of some of the photographs.

### WRITTEN INVENTORY

When preparing a written inventory, include everything in the home, on walls, in pantries and in the garage, Mrs. Powell advises.

Write down the date, year of purchase and the cost. If the exact purchase cost is not known, figure out the cash value minus depreciation to date.

For example, furniture can be written off on a 10-15 year depreciation schedule and clothing three to seven years. China and silver do not depreciate.

Also, for inventory purposes, mark possessions by engraving social security number or drivers license number on large possessions, the agents adds.

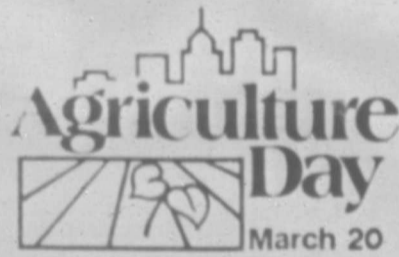

## New Puppies?

It usually takes a mother dog approximately nine weeks to have a litter of pups. In general, smaller breeds take less time to have their litters than the larger breeds.

On the day that she has the puppies, she may not eat her food. Some dogs remain to themselves by hiding under the bed or the closet. Others may make a nest. Be sure the mother has a clean, warm environment. Her rectal temperature usually becomes subnormal prior to delivery (that is, it may drop from the normal of 101 degrees F to 98 degrees or 99 degrees F).

The puppies usually appear in a sack filled with fluid the mother breaks. The mother also chews apart the umbilical cord. She will lick the pups which cleans, dries and stimulates the body to start breathing. If she doesn't clean the pup, take a dry bath towel

and vigorously rub the puppy. Sometimes placing the puppy in a downward position helps remove the fluid that may have accumulated in the mouth and nose. If there is visible fluid over the nostrils, clean this off with the towel.

Puppies must have an adequate intake of nutrients and a warm environment. Puppies need to nurse every one to two hours. The first milk produced by the mother contains colostrum which is high in antibodies that help the newborn resist infection. Without proper nourishment, the pup could get a low sugar level in the blood stream and might die, if not treated promptly. If the mother neglects the pup and it is unable to nurse, the puppy's body temperature will fall since a newborn puppy cannot control its body tem-

perature. Feeling the cold skin, the mother may cull the pup. Without the warmth and nourishment, the pup can die within a matter of hours.

It is best to take the mother and her puppies to be examined by a veterinarian the day after delivery. Your veterinarian will check the puppies for birth defects and their general health. The mother will be checked to see that she is healthy and able to nurse her litter.

The mother needs to be kept clean especially around the nipples and the rectal area to help prevent transmission of disease to the pups. Also, it would be wise to examine the breasts daily to make sure that they are not engorged. This may be a sign of infection in the glands which would need medical attention.

When weaning, try not to take all the pups from the mother in one day. If you gradually wean the pups over a week or so, then her milk also is gradually weaning her litter.

This gradual weaning may prevent large, swollen breasts that could become a problem.

At six weeks of age, the first puppy vaccinations and exam will be due. Your veterinarian will then set up the entire health program for your pups.

Remember that a healthy puppy is similar to a baby. If they sleep and eat, then one can generally say that they are healthy. By having an observant, concerned owner, many health problems in newborn pups can be prevented.

From two to twenty-one days, the puppies are usually kept at home allowing the mother to do most of the work. One usually notices that the eyes and ears will be opening around the 14th day.

Even though the pups have been kept in a clean environment, it would be good to have your veterinarian check a stool sample for intestinal worms when the pups are 18 to 20 days old. The puppies can be infected with worms from the mother through the transfer of the baby worms through the uterus and milk. Some worms can cause a loss of blood, so the pup becomes very anemic and may even die.

At approximately three days of age, the tails on certain breeds are docked

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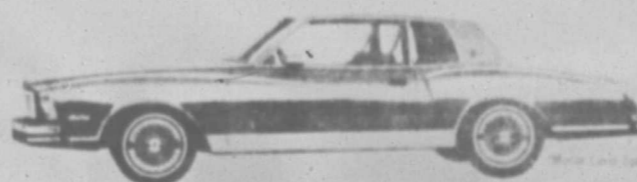

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## From Your Agent To You

**TEST SOYBEAN SEED FOR GERMINATION**-Wet, humid weather last fall in some states and certain plant fungus diseases are causing lower than normal soybean germination in preliminary checks in several areas. Thus it's important that soybean seed growers test their seed for germination and that producers check seed labels and buy only high quality seed.

The fungus causing the most damage is pod and stem blight, but downy mildew and purple stain are also causing poor germination. Good germination of soybean seed is normally between 85 and 95 percent. If germination falls below 80 percent, the seed cannot be certified in most states.

If soybean seed growers cannot test their own seed, they can have it checked for germination at any of a number of testing laboratories across the state. Lower germination could mean no certification and could lead to higher planting rates in order to get a good stand of beans.

Pod and stem blight is a weak parasite that grows on plants in the field during wet, humid fall weather as the crop reaches maturity. This fungus also infects soybean pods and seed coats. Some soybean varieties are more susceptible to fungus diseases than other varieties.

Soybean seed may be treated with fungicides to increase germination by as much as 23 percent in some varieties.

**BUY GARDEN SEED, FERTILIZER NOW**-Don't wait until the last minute to buy seed and fertilizer needed for your spring garden.

The demand for garden goods and supplies increases sharply as the spring season approaches and may make some supplies short. This is particularly true for seed of some of the more popular home garden vegetables.

Good viable seed for recommended vegetable varieties for Lamb County is one of the most important aspects of successful vegetable gardening. Proper varieties is one of the keys to a successful backyard garden. Many gardens are failures simply because poor seed of non-recommended varieties are used.

A list of recommended varieties for Lamb County is available at the county Extension office. Varieties recommended by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service are based on commercial as well as garden plantings and are the results of several years of testing.

With regard to garden fertilizers most gardeners could probably use less fertilizer and still do well. However, fertilizer usage should not be cut back without taking a soil test. A soil test is the best basis for garden fertilization and will go a long way toward insuring success of a home vegetable garden. A soil

test kit can be obtained from the county Extension office.

For a productive garden in 1978, fertilize properly and plant recommended varieties.

**CONSERVE ENERGY WITH WINDBREAK PLANTINGS**-Rising energy costs and unseasonably cold weather have focused attention on ways Texans can economically make their homes more comfortable. Living windbreaks have been used for many years but their value has increased with higher fuel bills. Fringe benefits of windbreaks can be protection for cattle and refuge for birds and other wildlife.

Evergreen windbarrier plantings on the north and west sides of the house can cut 10 to 40 percent off winter fuel bills. The location of windbreaks is the key to their effectiveness. Since most cold winter winds come from the north or west, place plantings on those sides with an extension on the eastern side if space permits. Experiments have shown that maximum wind reduction occurs at a distance from four to six times the height of a windbreak, so place plantings at this distance from the house. Choose rapid growing species which will reach from one-to-one-and-a-half times the height of the house at maturity.

Thus a 20 foot tall house would benefit most from a hedge of tall evergreens located 80-120 feet from the north side of the house. Six to eight-foot spacings are appropriate for most evergreen plants used for windbreaks. Two or three rows about 12 feet apart are much more effective than single rows. Of course, it is important to select plant species that are well adapted to soil, climate and water conditions on the site.

Oriental Arborvitae Thuja orientalis  
Eastern Red Cedar Juniperus virginiana  
Austrian Pine Pinus nigra  
Ponderosa Pine Pinus ponderosa  
Scotch Pine Pinus sylvestris  
Russian Olive Elaegnus angustifolia

For North and West Texas, recommended species include the following:

Eastern Red Cedar Juniperus virginiana  
Rocky Mountain Juniper Juniperus scopulorum

Aleppo Pine Pinus halepensis  
Oriental Arborvitae Thuja orientalis  
Arizona Cypress Cupressus glabra  
Russian Olive Elaegnus angustifolia

Late winter and early spring are ideal planting times since adequate moisture and cool weather can promote root growth before hot dry weather. Milching newly set out plants helps prevent excess moisture loss and heat gain.

For more information on transplanting and fertilizing woody plants, contact the county Extension Office.

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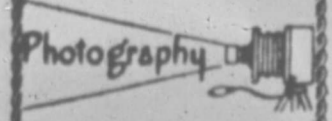
