The Sudan Independent School District held it's regular school board meeting, May 8. The invocation was given by Richard Black.

The minutes of the previous meeting were read and approved. The Superintendent's financial report for April was presented to the Board and approved as presented.

Mr. Brownd gave the Tax Collector's report for April.

A group of concerned parents consisting of Pudd Wiseman, Tommy Moss, Drusilla Moss, and Evelyn Ritchie met with the Board in regard to the 10 days leave of absence for students in a school year and presented a petition with some 31 names on it. After some discussion it was decided by the Board that the policy on school absences be left as it is with the exception that a student using days in excess of 10 days school time will be considered on its own merits as to the attempt the student has made to wisely use the 10 days selectively. The administration will have the authority to make adjustments in special-individual

Kenneth Carr was employed as the Vocational Agriculture Instructor for the 78-79 school year.

The Board approved renewing the contract for student insurance for the 19.78-79 school year with Keystone Insurance Company

The Board approved the resignation of Judy Lynch, the migrant teacher.

After discussing the disposition of the Migrant Program for the coming year the Board decided it feasable to discontinue the program.







Consolidated net income and earnings per share for Pioneer Corporation for the first quarter of 1978 were announced recently. Consolidated net income for the quarter was \$10,522,981, compared to \$11,594,368 for the same period in 1977. Earnings per share for the first quarter were \$1.13 compared to \$1.25 for the same

quarter of 1977. Net income from emergency sales made in 1977 to help alleviate the national gas shortage but not needed in 1978, was a substantial cause of the difference in first quarter earnings. In addition,

large industrial gas sales were reduced from 1977, while exploration and production and contract drilling income increased.

The quarterly report of Pioneer Corporation will be mailed to stockholders about the 20th of May.

WEEVILS-The alfalfa weevil was first detected in Texas in 1968 in several eastern counties. Since that time it has spread across the state, being first reported in the High Plains

Damage to alfalfa occurs in the spring when the larval (or worm) stage feeds on the foliage. The weevil is primarily a pest of first cutting. It overwinters as an adult, with a few eggs being laid on warm winter days. Eggs are laid in clusters in the stem. In the spring, with the advent of warm weather, females begin laying numerous eggs. The young larvae which hatch out are very small, yellow-green in color and feed in the growing tips and developing buds of alfalfa. Older larvae are green with a white stripe down their back. All larval stages have curved bodies

and shiney black heads. The alfalfa weevil has only one generation per year. After the larvae finish feeding, usually by mid May in our area, the larva spins a net like cocoon on the plant or in the soil debris. From this cocoon, the adult weevil emerges and leaves the alfalfa field. The adults stay out of the fields all summer and reenter them in the fall. The cycle then repeats itself.

Very small alfalfa plants which are attacked in early spring can withstand only limited feeding by the larvae. Larger alfalfa plants (12-18 inches in height) can support considerably higher numbers of weevil larvae. If populations of alfalfa weevil larvae are heavy, a damaged field will have a greyish appearance.

We expect to have our peak alfalfa weevil activity in late April or early May in the economic threshold, one properly timed application should give control. Chemical treatments are recommended if more than 25 percent of the terminals, or growing tips, are invested with larvae. Several effective insecticides are registered for alfalfa weevil

control Since the larvae are primarily a pest of first cutting, it is sometimes possible to cut a little earlier than usual and avoid chemical treatment. Cutting results in a lack of food and exposure to hot sunlight which kills many of the remaining larvae.
