Southwestern Public Service Company announced today that it has filed for a general retail rate increase in the cities and counties served by the company in

The request was made with the cities and the Public Utility Commission of Texas on or about May 12, 1978 and the company is requesting that the increase become effective 35 days after the filing date.

It is expected that the proposed new rates will result in an increase of approximately 10 percent for residential, commercial, industrial and school customers. This would result in an increase of about 8.8 percent in the company's total revenues from Texas, or about \$22 million annually. Rates to wholesale customers and for retail service to municipal customers would not be affected.

The last base rate increase in Southwestern's rates for residential, commercial and industrial service was granted in 1974 and amounted to about 10 percent.

Increased costs of building new power plants, as well as the increased costs of labor, materials, money and taxes were cited by the company as the major reasons for the proposed increase.

In 1972, SPS made the commitment to switch from gas to coal as the primary fuel for their generating plants. This decision was made due to a long-range forecast which indicated increases in the cost of gas and diminishing availability. The present cost of new gas is about 70 percent higher than the cost of coal. Government regulations have restricted the use of gas as a

Southwestern's first coal plant, a \$100 million, 356.7 megawatt facility located in the north part of the company's system, went of the line in 1976. The total cost of this plant was almost three times more than a gas fired plant of the same size. The second 356.7 mw coal unit is scheduled to go on the line in June of this year. This new unit will also help stabilize fuel costs.

But he noted that rainfall for the area was below normal at the end of April and much of the recent rain will go to replenishing the soil moisture. "If we had had the usual amount of moisture in the soil, a twoinch rain would have been worth a lot more," Wigner

said. The rains also reduced the soil temperature, a vital factor in seed germination, the meteorologist said.

In Lubbock, the 10 day average minimum soil temperature reached 60 degrees on April 6. "That's the second earliest date ever recorded here, Wigner said. Those records have been maintained since 1951 and the earliest date among the entries was April 4, 1967.

Just prior to the recent ains the 10 day average minimum soil temperature had risen to 65 degrees. "But in the last few days this has reversed and is now down to 61 degrees,"

Wigner noted. Even when the fields dry out enough to begin planting, it may be a few more days before the soil temperature rises enough to provide optimum germination, he said.

But he also noted that the last part of May and the first of June is when crops usually go into the ground in this area.

MEDICAL DIAGNOSTIC SERVES LAB PRODUCERS-Texas livestock producers have the Texas Veterinary Medical Diagnostic Laboratory at Texas A&M University working for

The laboratory, opened in 1969, was established so that tests on animal specimens could be done promptly to reduce the cost of animal diseases in Texas. This, in turn, increases the efficiency of livestock production and reduces the cost of animal products to consumers.

The services of the laboratory are available to any citizen of Texas, but about 99 percent of the cases are sent in by the veterinarians. Specimens sent or brought to the laboratory for testing might include sick or dead animals, pieces of tissue or blood samples.

The laboratory includes departments of pathology. toxicology and microbiology, with the department of microbiology divided into sections of virology, serology and bacteriology. Pathologists evaluate lesions and organs for changes in tissue. Toxicologists run tests for poisons while microbiologists look for viruses, bacteria and fungi that cause disease.
