How It Looks From Here By: Ray Freedman

Speaking of taxpayer revolts and hands-up attitudes by some public officials, from New York comes an interesting commentary on how things got the way they are. It is an audit performed on New York City's highway crews by the state's comptroller.

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The audit found crews taking an hour and a half for lunch, taking frequent coffee breaks, wasting time by using circuitous routes to and from job locations and quitting early. Day shift workers were found to be loafing 37 percent of the time and night shift workers 52 percent of the time.

Auditors figured the added cost to the taxpayers of this non-productive effort was slightly under \$3 million.

To put it another way, 700,000 more potholes could have been patched at no additional cost if the workers had worked the hours for which they were paid. It wouldn't be surprising if other cities and towns could produce similar horror stories if anyone took the interest to look. If the taxpayers have any say in the matter, someone might.

It was strictly coincidental, but almost simultaneously with the demand by California voters for property tax relief came the word from Washington that the reason new housing costs are rising so fast is government red tape. That was the word from Patricia Harris, Secretary of Housing and Urban Development, who announced a new program to try to do away with some of the bothersome and expensive regulation in the housing industry.

In the unlikely event anyone is under the illusion costs of new housing are levelling off, the Federal Home Loan Bank reports that the average new home in the United. States now costs \$61,600. A year ago it was \$53,400.

Citing a study made of housing costs, Mrs. Harris said: "In the area of land supply, the task force report singles out government action - through regulation and investment decisions - as a major cause of limited land supply

"As far as land development is concerned, the increasing cost again is due primarily to costly regulations." It also was found that at the local level one of the major pressures on housing costs was shifting to developers and homeowners the costs of streets, sewers and other improvements formerly absorbed by the community

All of this and more contributed to the California taxpayer revolt. Costs caused by government and obstacles raised by government must be reduced or eliminated.

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Any day now, President Carter will announce his plan for a national health insurance program for all of us. His words will trigger vigorous debate in Congress that will make the energy dispute look like a back-fence squabble.

Battlelines are already forming. In fact, organized medicine is determined to defeat anything that smaks of health care reform or national health insurance. It will have a powerful ally in the insurance industry.

Old Ruins

Between Earth and Sudan on the James Ranch, where archaeologist from Wayland Baptist College are carefully digging artifacts from some old ruins, members of the Lamb County Historical Committee were given a tour Friday of what might have been an outlaw hideout in the 1870s.

Archaeologist Eddie Guftee and his crew from Elano Estacado Museum in Plainview have been digging at the western Lamb County site for several weeks and have uncovered a circular corral, a half dug-out type structur and possibly another room or two.

Lamb County Historical records reveal that an outlaw's hideout existed somewhere in the sandhills where the crew is digging. Guffee has found bottles, poker chips, tobacco ends, numerous shell cases, and a collar stud, which might have been worn by a gambler.

We are still doing a lot of speculating on who lived at this site," Guffee told the committee. "We do have Mexicans, cowboys, outlaws, Buffalo hunters. We are finding tons of .44 shell cases and some.32. These are the center fire type cases which came into this area in the 1870s. I estimate these dwellings were occupied from the 1870s until the XIT came into exsistance.

Guffee said the worst thing about excavating a "blow was that you find the oldest artifacts on the same level as the more recent; because of the wind shifting the sand around. Thus it is hard to tell what period of time you are digging into.

New Facilities To Serve Clients

Central Plains Comprehensive Mental Health and Mental Retardation Center proudly announces the opening of two new facilities to serve clients living in Parmer, Castro, Swisher, Briscoe, Bailey, Lamb. Hale, Floyd and Motley Counties.

These homes and the programs with which they will interface are designed to prepare each client resident for independent community living over a period of several weeks to months. Many of the residents will be returning from state hospitals, where practically all individual needs are taken care of by the institution. Other residents will be persons who would probably need to go to state hospitals if these facilities were not available closer to their homes.

We will be attempting to teach the residents such basic "daily living" skills as how to plan and prepare simple meals, how to do laundry, how to open and maintain a bank account, how to complete applications and interview for jobs, how to get along better with other people, ways to use leisure time, and many other specifics that add up to increasing each client's personal responsibility and independence.

One facility will house up to twelve (12) adult residents, the other will house up to twelve (12) adolescent residents. Each house will have a full time live-in manager and a relief manager for weekends. Other service units of the MH/MR Center will be involved with residents as planned on an individual basis to provide such other services as individual or group therapy, medication, job placement assistance, music therapy, occupational therapy, and recreational therapy.

This is the first program of its type for this area and required over three years to plan and complete. Funding for the majority of the construction was provided by a federal mental health grant.

The public is invited to attend Open House ceremonies to be held from 2:30 to 4:30 p.m. Sunday, June 25, 1978, at the 405 Ennis Street Home in Plainview The other home is located at 404 Floydada Street. Private Medical Care Foundation, Inc., sent mailings to thousands of the nation's doctors urging them to open their checkbooks and contribute to the fight against 'socialized medicine," although no one is suggesting socialized medicine as the American health care industry has come to characterize, for example, the British health care system.

The Foundation told physicians: "The Congress of County Medical Societies, Private Practice and the Foundation have hired the renowned advertising agency of Young and Rubicam to design a TV, newspaper and direct mail campaign about national health insurance and all the harm it will do.

That hints strongly that millions of dollars will be used to wage war against any changes in the present health care program. The millions are there, all right. In its April edition, Journal of the AMA tells us of AMA's financial growth: \$60.9 million operating revenue and income at the end of '77 compared to \$40 million at the close of 1975.

On the other side of the issue are some of the nation's most prestigious physicians (Dr. Charles Mayo, for one), many Nobel Prize winners in medicine, as well as leaders of religion and labor and consumer, minority and public interest groups. This coalition spells a formidable array of pressure for the health cause.

How do people on the street feel? Every national pool taken thus far seems to show that Americans definitely want something done about higher and higher health care costs. They no longer flee at the word "socialism" - and the doctors and their high-powered ad agency would be foolish to crank up that old '50s refrain.

Partly because doctors' and hospitals' bills lead the inflation parade (even exceeding the annual increase in fuel prices). Americans believe the nation should have a governmental health program of some kind. And President Carter is not above reminding us that the United States is alone - with South Africa - of all industrialized nations that do not have a national health caré plan.

We'll all be interested spectators, because we'll all be affected by the outcome.

He showed the committee glass buttons, nails, pieces of animal bones, steel rods, which are still a mystery, and even a fiddle string. One bottle he found had "vegestable pain killer" stamped on it.
