Services Offers Film Tips

Camera buffs are urged to properly prepare film being sent through the mail for processing to help preserve those precious summer photographic memories

Each year, according to Postmaster Joan Ford, thousands of film packages end up in dead letter offices throughout the country because of careless wrapping and addressing, often resulting in a missing pictorial record of vacation trips.

The following tips will help ensure safer handling of film while in the mail stream.

Place film cartridges in sturdy envelopes. When possible use the envelopes usually supplied by film processing companies.

Make sure that the processor's mailing address as well as a return address are written legibly on the outside envelope. Use Zip Codes.

As an extra precaution, tape your name and address to the film roll or cartridge before inserting it in the envelope. Your name and address should be written also on the back of any photographs being sent in for retouching, copying or other purposes, Postmaster Ford




