How It Looks From Here

WHAT ELSE IS NEW? Increased federal regulations, designed to increase safety, fuel economy and damage resistance, will add at least \$285 to new car prices by 1984, the Transportation Department said.

However, these figures are only half the story, and half the actual cost, according to industry spokesmen.

Although government officials claim the new regulations will only account for five percent of the new car prices, industry people argue that 1978 car prices are already ten percent higher due to existing regulations. By 1984, they say the percentage can only rise.

SIMPLE WRITE A CHECK. In an article in Harper's magazine, Sen. Hayakawa commented on the ease with which Congress allocates gargantuan sums of money. "The numbers you work with on this committee turned out to be very simple. You always deal with hundreds of millions or billions. Therefore when we say 1.0 that means \$1 billion. Then we have 1.1; that means \$100 million, and that's the smallest figure we ever deal with in the Budget Committee." As the senator wryly remarked, "I never realized it could be so easy, it's all simple addition. You don't even have to know subtraction."

Illustrating the loss of respect for the value of money that occurs after years of federal dispensation of public funds were the remarks of Senators Javits and Proxmire in a recent hearing on the subject of New York City's financial chaos. The Senators were pressuring several New York banks to lend several billion more dollars to the city—even though the city's credit rating had sunk so low that it is unable to borrow in the normal financial markets. Senator Proxmire asked, "Why can't you do better by your own city? I can't understand why you can't dig up a few million dollars for your own city." Sen. Javits shared Proxmire's incredulity. "Why don't you simply write a check?" he implored.

THREAT OR PROMISE? Long time observers of the bureaucracy will be familiar with that the Washington Monthly calls the "Firemen First" principle which states that any bureaucrat facing a budget cutback will threaten to cut the most essential services first in order to scare the taxpayers or budget authorities into submission. In California recently, taxpayers refused to listen to such threats when they voted overwhelmingly to slash property taxes by one third. Though temporarily stifled in California, the "Firemen First" game continues in Washington. Sen. Stevens recently suggested there would be dire consequences if Congress went along with President Carter's proposal to limit federal pay increases to 5.5 percent. Stevens warned that if federal blue collar workers are denied a raise that keeps up with inflation, they will, as he puts it, be "lost" to jobs in the private sector. One can only ask: IS THAT A THREAT OR A PROMISE??

These festivals are sponsored by the Sudan Fire Department and the Lions Club every fourth Saturday of each month.

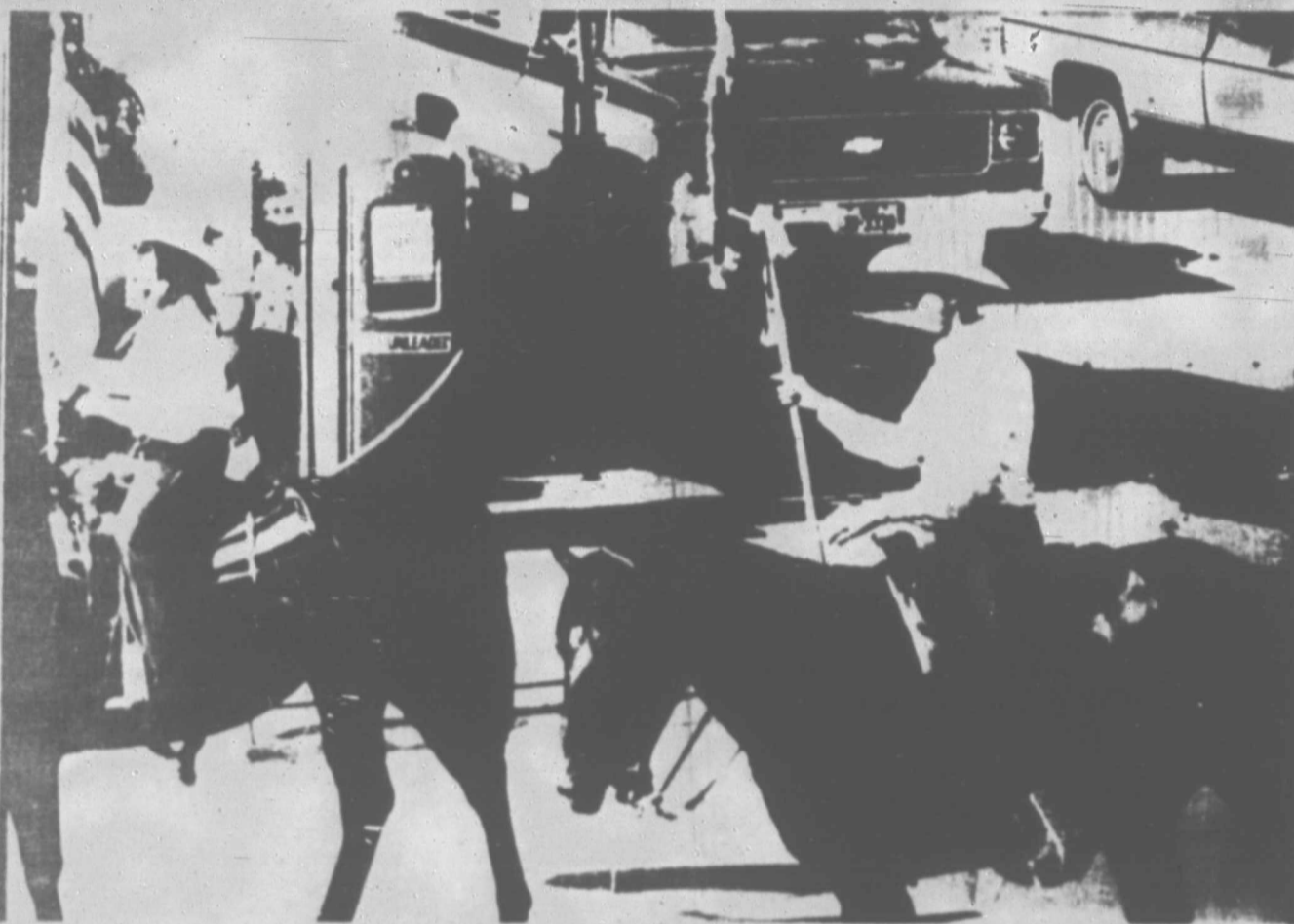
"TEXAS" Visited

Japanese Youth

to Visit South Plains

JAPANESE YOUTHS TO VISIT SOUTH PLAINS—Lamb County, Japan and the South Plains of Texas may have little in common, in many ways, but this summer they will share 13 citizens.

As part of the 4-H Labo International Exchange, 12 Japanese youths will become, for a month, the sons, daughters, brothers and sisters of 12 area families. The young people, between the ages of 12 and 18, will arrive Tuesday, July 25. They will be accompanied by two Japanese tutor-chaperones.

Three of the Japanese youngsters and one adult will stay with families in Lamb County.

The guests, their ages, and their host families in Lamb County are: Shuta Ueda, 13, Ray Joe Riley; Naoki Koseto, 13, Ray Brooks; Hiroto Shibuya, 17, Gerald Graham; Yukiko Kasahara, 42, Jimmy Craft.

The visitors are among 68 Japanese youths coming to Texas under auspices of the Labo Foundation, said Dr. John Pelham, state 4-H and youth leader with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. Over the past several years, the foundation has sent several thousand Japanese youths to the United States, primarily to the western states.

This is the first year Texas has been included in the program, Pelham said. It is one of 18 states which will be hosts to 1,700 Japanese youth this summer.

The Labo Foundation program is to help young people to learn another language and to become familiar with another culture firsthand, Pelham said.

Families in five of the 14 Extension districts in Texas will be hosts to the visitors this year. In District 2, host counties are Bailey, Castro, Floyd, Gaines, Hale and Lamb.

"We hope to host more youths next summer and be able to include additional districts," Pelham said.

Also, next summer we hope to join the reciprocal program and send Texas 4-H'ers to Japan for a month's stay with Japanese host families."

We discussed what is happening in Washington, D.C., for the benefit of the American Farmer and legislation that will effect the farmer and legislation proposed by A.A.M.

As farmers and agribusinessmen we must support our local A.A.M. office and its obligations. The farmers present voted to pay \$60.00 per year per member which may be paid monthly, semi-annually or annually. We need all the support we can get and would like to have each and every farmer join the A.A.M.

For the first time in history the loan price has been changed. Thanks to the American Agriculture Movement the loan was raised on cotton and feed.

The A.A.M. has a proposed bill now in the Legislature written by Congressman Noland. You are urged to contact your Congressman and Senators and request that they sign the Noland Bill No. HR 12689 so that it will come before the Conference Committee. This must be done NOW.

The A.A.M. is still in Washington working for the American Farmer and Mr. Sam White is also there working for the Texas Farmer. You may contact Sam White for information concerning the Noland Bill or

other farm legislation by calling 1-202-544-5760. I have spent a lot of time with Sam and we do not always agree but he is a farmer and definitely FOR the FARMER and has our problems always in mind.

The A.A.M. office will be open in Littlefield each Thursday from 9:00 o'clock A.M. till 3:00 o'clock P.M. The office has moved one door down and is located at 603 West Delano. You may call the office on Thursdays by dialing 385-3006. We will be selling window stickers and have stickers that will identify you as a member.

There will be a district meeting on August 3rd at Brownfield at 8:00 o'clock P.M. in the Southwestern Public Service Building. A commodity board will be set up at the meeting with five (5) farmers chosen for each commodity. We will also discuss what we need from the U.S.D.A. program. Each and every farmer and interested persons are urged to attend this very important meeting.

We need to move fast as Secretary Bergland will be setting loan targets this fall on commodities. We must save the family farms and to do that we must keep informed and keep our Representatives in Washington informed.

The A.A.M. needs your help. There will be a local meeting the last of August or first of September and we will let you know more about it later.

Motorcycle Accident

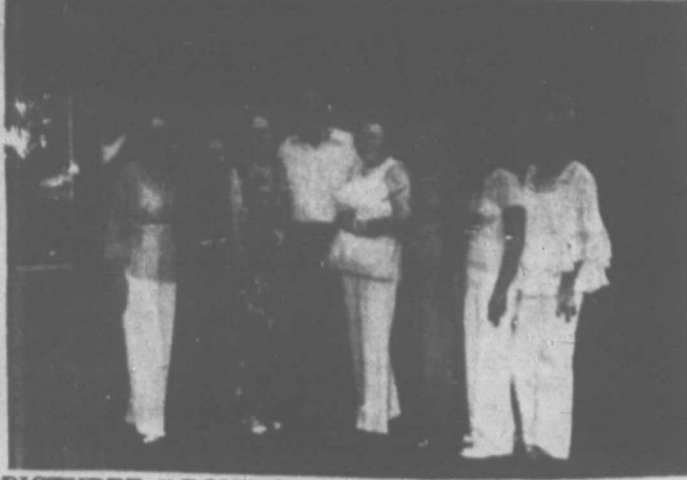
