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Bush, Price To Be Honored

Congressional candidate, George Bush, along with State Senator and former Congressman, Bob Price, will tour five West Texas Counties, Saturday, August 12th.

Bush is a candidate for the Congressional seat being vacated by George Mahon.

Bush and Price will be honored at 5:30 reception at the Pizza Inn, 1910 Hall Ave., Littlefield.

Price, in making the campaign swing for Bush said, "George Bush has shown me he is the right person to fill the shoes of retiring Congressman, George Mahon."

Having served in the Congress, I know what it takes to be effective. George Bush has the ability and knowledge to represent West Texans. He understands problems facing West Texas and would be free to represent the views of his constituents without having to

bow to pressure from the White House and the Democratic leadership in Congress," said Price.

Bush praised Price for his long leadership to West Texas.

PCA To Meet

Directors of Plainview Production Credit Association join PCA officials throughout Texas August 11 in Tyler for the Production Credit Associations' director conference.

Plainview PCA director participants include A. W. Anthony, Jr., Friona, and Ray Robertson, Dimmitt. James A. Rogers, the association's general manager, said the conference emphasizes credit policy and management of the Production Credit System of Texas and will bring directors up-to-date on services provided to PCAs by the Federal Intermediate Credit Bank of Houston, source of most PCA loan funds.

A special feature of this year's conference will be "PCAs Meet the Press." The media forum will present a panel of agricultural editors and broadcasters to discuss some of agriculture's major problems and their solutions.

The panel will include Charles Scruggs, vice president and editor, Progressive Farmer; Joe Brown, farm editor, Wichita Falls Times and Record News; and farm director, KFDX-TV, and Jack Dillard, farm director, KWKH-TV, Shreveport.

Boys Ranch Rodeo

At Cal Farley's Boys Ranch, thirty-six miles northwest of Amarillo, 285 pint-sized cowboys are getting ready for their thirty-fourth annual Boys Ranch Rodeo.

Practice rides on the broncs and bulls have been going on since June with only about 150 riders expected to appear in the Ranch's rodeo arena over the Labor Day weekend. They will be competing in bareback bronc riding, Brahma bulls, steers, calves and even stick horses for the three-to-six-year-olds. It is the only rodeo of its kind in the nation in which boys riding professional rodeo stock under RC A rules are the only contestants.

Approximately 3,000 boys have lived at the Ranch since it was started in 1939, and the rodeo is also a traditional homecoming for the Boys Ranch Alumni Association. Some of the graduates and their families travel long distances to attend.

An added attraction will be Texas-sized barbecue beef plates that will be prepared and sold by the boys for only \$1.50. Reserve box seat tickets at \$2.50 will be on sale at the Boys Ranch Office, 600 West 11th Street in Amarillo. General admission will be \$1.50 for adults and \$1.75 for children under twelve. Performances are scheduled for 3:00 p.m. each afternoon, September 3 and 4.

Growers Seed Assn. Field Day

Growers Seed Association has set Thursday, August 24, 1978 as the date for their annual field day and research tours. Activities will get underway at 9:30 a.m. at the Association's Research Farm on U.S. Highway 62-82 four miles east of Idalou, Texas.

Guided tours will begin each half-hour from 9:30 a.m. and continue until 2:00 p.m. Stops on the tour will feature our research and breeding programs in hybrid grain and forage sorghums, cotton, hybrid corn and hybrid sunflowers. New hybrids and varieties for the coming season plus a look at what's two or three years down the road will be included.

Growers Seed Association is a regional cooperative, headquartered in Lubbock, Texas, and serving dealers in Texas, New Mexico, Oklahoma, Colorado and Kansas. In addition they produce under contract for many regional markets and numerous international outlets. The association expects to serve lunch to more than five hundred visitors and guests.

Education At LCC

Reginald W. Duncan has been appointed the new director of Lubbock Christian College's Industrial Technologies Division. Dean Steven Lemely has announced.

Before accepting his new position, Duncan served for two and one-half years as Assistant State Supervisor for Trade and Industrial Education in New Mexico, with his headquarters at Santa Fe.

A 20-year Navy veteran, Duncan worked for Sears-Roebuck for 9 years, was a minister at two congregations and taught vocational education-electronics for three and one-half years in the Clovis, New Mexico, school system before moving to Santa Fe.

There's a tremendous field for vocational-technical education at a Christian school, Duncan explained. "Approximately three-fourths of all high school graduates don't attend college. But they need some sort of training. LCC is the only Christian school I know of to offer a degree in such a program. Plus, the students in this program can live right on campus. The LCC Board of Trustees recently approved an associate in Arts in Occupational Sciences (machine trades, drafting, electronics, welding, auto mechanics) which Duncan feels will help the program even more.

"Right now, we're starting a new class in machine trades every Monday. We have five full-time day classes in auto mechanics and electronics and night-time classes in all five. We're running three nights a week in drafting and electronics and four nights a week in the other three areas. Presently, J. S. Eddy and B. L. Hearn are auto mechanic instructors, Norman Johnson and A. R. Naylor in machine trades, Joe Mims in welding, Kent Johnson, Griff Griffin, Bob Matthews, Yusuf Shiref in electronics and Mickey Chambliss in drafting. Plus, Duncan said he is looking for additional instructors in welding and auto mechanics.

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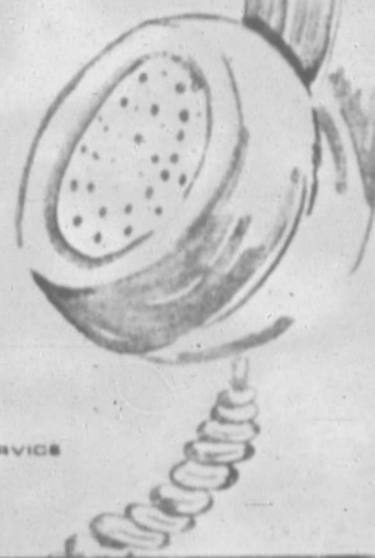
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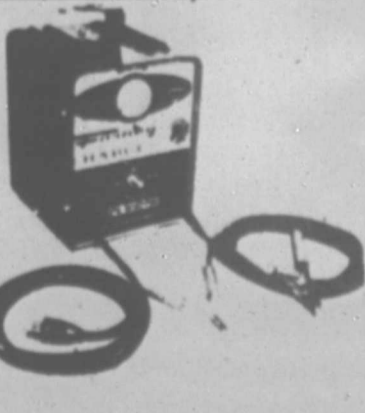


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
