Editorial Comment

The temptation to lump all elected officials into one category is a common urge today. But as voters, we need to take time to learn the truth about our good elected officials and keep them in government. In business, one can go broke by not carefully appraising employees, keeping the good ones and firing the bad ones. It's that way in government, too.

We see trends now that indicate voters are looking more deeply into issues and candidates. They want to know about solutions, not just problems. They seem to be interested in more facts about the people who are running for office. Are they bright enough with good motives? Do they have a record of work and effectiveness which indicates they will be successful in public office?

One young man who has done an outstanding job in government is State Senator Kent Hance, a candidate for the congressional seat being vacated by Congressman George Mahon. Kent deserves a lot of credit for his performance in the Senate. Most politicians say it is wise to keep quiet and listen during a first term in office, then begin work during the second term. Kent Hance demonstrated the obsolescence of that by becoming a leader in his first term of his first elective office.

As one of the Senate's youngest members, Kent Hance sponsored or co-sponsored 177 important

legislative measures and had a perfect attendance record. Ninety-three of his measures were passed, including important anti-crime legislation, tax relief measures, anti-bureaucracy laws, sunset bills, health care improvement, and legislation affecting water, insurance, banking, education, and agriculture.

He has attracted praise and respect from his fellow senators for his hard work, courage, and leadership.

But more important to us, he has wide support in West Texas from every cross section of people...farmers, businessmen, leaders in all fields, an a host of bright, young people who are actively participating in a political camp for the first time. They, too, represent many different types of people from all parts of the district.

With this type of broad support, Kent Hance is our favorite for the office of U.S. Congressman from this district. It assures us that he has managed to satisfy this broad constituency which represents all the people of this district, not just one particular interest group.

Kent Hance knows our area, too, having been raised in Dimmitt. He still operates farms in that area. He has gathered less than 15 percent of his financial support from outside the district. This indicates that Hance has broad support from the voters in this district.

Hornets Trampled

The Lazbuddie Longhorns opened their District opener on a high note Friday night as they defeated the Sudan Hornets by a 41-23 margin.

The win ups Lazbuddie to a 5-1 on the year and drops the Hornys to an even 3-3 mark.

In what at times resembled a track meet rather than a football game, the Hornets racked up 455 yards total offense and the Longhorns gathered 433 steps. Neither team was able to contain the others offense and the margin of difference was 4 crucial turnovers by the Hornets compared to 0 for the Horns. On Lazbuddie's initial possession, the Hornets forced the only Longhorn punt of the night, which was returned to the 50 yard line by Runningback, John Miles. From there the Hornets took only 4 plays to score, the tally coming on a 25 yard pass completion from QB Mike Jones to Odell Johnson. A 2 point conversion was successful on a sweep by Miles and Sudan had an 8-0 lead.

The Longhorns wasted little time catching up as they completed a 61 yard, 10 play drive on a 4 yard scamper by QB Andy Rodgers. The try for two was good and the game was tied at 8. Again on their next possession, Lazbuddie lit up the board, this time on a 53 yard run by Halfback, Charleson Steinbock, to take a 14-8 lead. It took the Hornets only 6 plays to regain the lead on a 40 yard dash by Fullback, Victor King and a 2 point conversion on a pass from Jones to End, Gary Brown. Less than 3 minutes later, the Longhorns regained the lead on a 44 yard pass completion from QB Rodgers to Tight End, Keith Hicks. The extra point was good and the Longhorns had a 21-16 lead at half time.

Lazbuddie increased it's lead to 28-16 with a recovery of a fumble in it's end zone by Steinbock and the successful extra point. The Hornets fought back to pull to 28-23 on a 1 yard plunge by Jones, and the extra point by Miles.

The Longhorns were not to be denied as they scored twice more in taking the victory. The first on a 15 yard run by Rodgers and finally with 57 seconds left, a 9 yard run by Steinbock.

The Hornets offense was lead by John Miles with 214 yards on 24 carries to up his season total to 1228 yards rushing on 125 carries.

Victor King pitched in with 101 yards on 10 carries and Michael Jones completed 5 of his 7 passes for an additional 92 yards and added another 12 on the ground for 104 total. Ray Dudgeon, Randy Scott, and Mike Hill had excellent performances on the offensive line.

Defensively, the Hornets were led by John Chester, Ivan Gipson, Odell Johnson and Mike Hill. Chester, filling in for injured Line Backer, Bob Graves, was in on 19 tackles while Gibson was close behind with 17.

The Hornet's next foe is the Whiteface Antelopes at Hornet Stadium here in Sudan at 7:30 p.m. Friday night.

THE SUDAN BOOSTER CLUB recently purchased this 10x14 foot lighted sign and had it erected on a ten foot pedestal at the corner of the City Park, facing Main Street. EMT Course

If you were in a crowd and someone fell to the floor unconscious and not breathing, would you know what to check for and then would you know what to do? If you had taken the Emergency Medical Technician (EMT) course at Springlake-Earth School this summer, you would know to check for a possible heart attack and then start cardio pulmonary resuscitation (CPR) as soon as possible knowing one can do without circulating oxygenated blood for only 4-6 minutes.

The EMT course was taught by T.T. Medical Student, Mike Wainscott and Bridgett Heinan from Lubbock sponsored by the Department of Human Resources through Lubbock Christian College. People of your community who were interested in spending over 100 hours of classroom and practical instruction and 40 hours of hospital rotations enrolled in this class. Toward the later part of instruction, an extrication instruction class from automobiles and buildings with stairways was held in Lubbock at LCC and the Lubbock Fire Training Station.

All of the training was utilized as students were grouped to remove injured people. EMT instructors, from cars with simulated injuries doing all the emergency treatments such as triage, bandaging and splinting, and proper removal from the wrecked autos to the ambulance.

The class reviewed training in using the giant can opener to pull the top off of an auto whose doors were jammed. The metal cutting saw was used to cut the door safety latch so the victims could be properly removed. Stretchers were used to carry victims up and down stairs and the lightest student was carried and lifted frequently.

The knowledge these people have was acquired at considerable expense and time and is available to the community. Three of the EMT's have gone or are planning to further their medical schooling. Several EMT's are interested in a paramedic program but driving to Lubbock for the training would be difficult.

The EMT's of your area are Diana Freedman, Mickey Price, Chris Elkins, Flossie Jones, Larry Hausemann, Verna Sadler, Cindy Sadler, Lonnie Wilson, Beverly Taylor, Beedie Welch, Jena V. Kollar, Susan Sadler, Ricky Byers, Jo Eddy Riley, and Malcolm Martin, Carl Burnett and Ronnie Gilbert of Sudan. Others taking part of the course were Laurinda Bullis, Hershell Hulcy, Gary Bulls.

Doug Byers and Davey Haberer took the course last winter and received their certification then are Senior EMT's.

All EMT's passed a state written test and tests given in CPR, bandaging and splinting, mechanical aids including airways, oxygen, oropharyngeal airway and Haire traction given by state examiners.

The Earth ambulance has a need for Haire traction set and a scoop stretcher. The Earth Springlake 4-H Club would be willing to split the cost of these two items with another organization or two. The cost of both items is about \$600 which is expensive but ask someone who has needed either item how much they are worth.

A meeting of the EMT trainees and all other interested people will be held October 23 at 8:00 p.m. at the Springlake-Earth cafeteria. All remotely interested persons are invited to attend to learn more about how to work with these trainees.
