

Santa To Appear In Friona On Saturday

Do you remember four years ago last Wednesday? Four years ago, November 22 came on a Friday, and it was "Black Friday" as far as the state of Texas and the nation was concerned. That was the day the president of the United States, John F. Kennedy, was assassinated.

For some time we have intended to put on paper what we were doing at the time, and what our reactions were to the announcement of the tragedy. Since we all like to relate ourselves to important dates, maybe you'll enjoy comparing your recollections to ours.

The noon hour that Friday was drawing to a close, and we were preparing to go back to the office. I had joined Carol in catching up on the latest episode of that great noon-time soap opera "As the World Turns," whose ending usually signals the return to the work.

However, like most Fridays after we have published a paper, I had gotten off to work in a rush that morning, and hadn't taken time to shave. I decided to do so before returning to the office.

It was while tending this menial task, while I still had some of the shaving cream on my face, that the first announcement was made on television. The announcer broke into the program, about 1:10 p.m., and we knew by the tone of his voice that it wasn't an ordinary "bulletin." Being aware of the president's current good-will visit to Texas, we were fearful of what we were about to hear.

And our fears were quickly verified as the announcer said "Ladies and gentlemen, we have received word that President Kennedy has been shot by a sniper while riding in a motorcade in downtown Dallas. He has been rushed to a Dallas hospital."

Immediately we began praying "Lord, grant that this not be a fatal wound. Let it not happen here in our home state."

But it happened, and President Kennedy was dying, or perhaps already dead at Dallas' Parkland Hospital. We switched channels on the TV set in search of later news. The other networks were just putting on their first bulletins. It seemed that CBS had "scooped" the others by a few minutes.

We stayed with the television set, rather than going back to the office. Our first impression about the tragedy was soon reflected on TV. The program in progress had stopped for all practical purposes, and the moderator and his guests discussed the awful announcement.

One of the guests was from Texas, and the announcer said, perhaps for all Americans "We know that this is disturbing news to you, since Texas is your home state." And the TV guest replied "Yes, and we can only hope that it will not be a bad wound, and that the president will be all right."

All of our hopes were soon dashed, however, as the announcement of the president's death was not long in coming. We've forgotten just how long, in the intervening years.

We went on back to the office, and from thence to the office of Plains Publishers, which had an Associated Press news wire for use of the Lovington Leader, which it printed.

In that manner we followed the bulletins, which were coming thick and fast by this time. Shortly a bulletin told of the fatal shooting of a Dallas police officer, and then of the capture of Lee Harvey Oswald in the Dallas movie theatre.

We remember how upset the townspeople were, as we went for a cup of coffee at Bi-Wize Drug. Several were still gathered around the TV set there, as news was still coming from Dallas and the assassination events were falling into place. The next two days were like a nightmare, with all the TV coverage of the event. I had planned to go to a bi-district football game at Muleshoe that night, Muleshoe vs Denver City. But Carol, caught up in the anxiety of the event, urged me to stay home.

It was as if we had been under attack by the Martians. She was fearful that something else dreadful might happen. So we

Wilson Paces Tech's Champion Judgers

Mickey Wilson, 1964 graduate of Friona High School, paced the Texas Tech crop -- judging team to wins in the National Collegiate and International Crops contests last week at Kansas City and Chicago.

Wilson, the son of Mr. and Mrs. Elvin Wilson of Friona, is a senior Agronomy major, at Tech, where he also has been on the Dean's Honor Roll each semester.

At the International Crops Contest at Chicago last Saturday, Wilson emerged as high-point individual in the meet. It marked the sixth straight year for Tech Judgers to win both the National Crops Contest at Kansas City and the International Crops contest.

Finishing behind Tech at the International contest were Minnesota, Penn State, Oklahoma State, West Texas State, Wyoming and Purdue. Coach of the Tech team is Prof. Cecil Ayers.

As a team Tech graded first in the seed analysis division, with Wilson as second high individual; first in grain grading, with Wilson third; and second in seed identification, as Wilson was fourth individually.

Other members of the Tech team are Bill Trospher of Higgins, who was the second high-point individual in the International meet, and Johnny Kuback of Lubbock, who placed fourth. Ronnie Duncan of Hereford is the team alternate.

At the National Collegiate Crop Judging Contest earlier in the week, the Tech team swept to first place by finishing first in each of the contest's three divisions. Oklahoma State University was second in the contest, University of Minnesota third, and West Texas State University fourth.

Competing on the West Texas State judging team were Harrol and Carroll Redwine, twin sons of Mr. and Mrs. J.C. Redwine of Lazbuddie.

Tech's crop judging team has won the National Collegiate contest 10 straight years and 17 times in the last 20 years. The team has won the national and international contests 28 of the last 32 contests. They have never placed lower than third in the 16 years that Prof. Ayers has served as coach.

As a junior last year, Wilson was a member of Tech's livestock judging team. While in high school at Friona, Wilson was a member of the FHS land-judging team in 1961 and 1962 that won first place at the Texas Tech invitational judging contests.

United Fund Drive Stalled At 80 %

O.J. Beene, chairman of Friona's United Fund campaign, announced this week that the 1967 drive is still some \$1,200 short of its goal of \$5,864.00.

"Some of our workers in the rural areas still have not made their reports. Also, there are some areas or businesses in town which have not reported," Beene stated.

Beene urged residents of the area who had not contributed to either bring their check to Friona State Bank, or to call himself or Charles Allen and the gift would be picked up.

As of Tuesday morning, some 80 per cent of the 1967 goal had been reached. Several institutions reported 100 per cent contributions by their employees, including the school, the city office and Friona State Bank.

"Everyone has had a good year, but at the same time, they have been busy," Beene said. He urged residents to help the drive go over the top for the second straight year.

First Snow Halts Area Cotton Harvest

Snow, sleet and rain in the Friona area Monday and Monday night brought the area its first measurable moisture for the month of November, and halted the cotton harvest, the last crop to begin harvest operations. The snow yielded a moisture content of .11 inches, not much by most standards, but the snow was estimated by the City of Friona as being about an inch. It was difficult to estimate, since most of the snow melted as it fell.

Mostly the snow halted the cotton harvest, and according to ginners, prevented an early windup to that crop's harvest. Friona ginners seemed to think on Tuesday that the cotton was from 70 to 75 per cent harvested.

"Our total run is going to be closer to last year's than we

would have liked," one ginner remarked. It appeared that bale to the acre cotton would be an excellent yield for the 1967 crop.

It was pointed out that there were a lot of hilled-out acres, and then, too, the yields were generally not as high as farmers had thought they might be.

Another ginner hazarded the opinion that if it had stayed clear the balance of the week, farmers could just about have finished with their 1967 crop.

is two birds per day and four in possession. Hunters must have permission of landowners in order to hunt on their farm.

"Hunters should refer to their state hunting and fishing rulebook since game wardens will be checking the county pretty thoroughly," Brown said.

Providing the prize money for hunters entering the Friona contest are Friona State Bank, first prize; Production Credit Association, second; and Friona Consumers, third.

Similar contests are being conducted in Bovina and Farwell.

Milner Stumbles In Football Contest

John Wilson, who was near the bottom after the first week of the contest, completed a season-long rally to take the grand prize Cotton Bowl trip away from Raymond Milner who had held the lead in the race since the third week of the contest.

Wilson came through with a score of 11 in the final week, to edge Milner in the overall standings, 142-141. Milner tied with Joyce Veazey for second place, but gets the Sun Bowl trip thanks to his tie-breaker scores for the season.

The grand prize race went right down to the final game on the last week's contest slate.

After the first 15 games had been completed, Milner and Wilson were tied at 141. In the Seagraves-Sonora game, played Saturday night, Wilson had picked Seagraves, with Milner choosing Sonora. That gave the contest to Wilson outright.

After the first week of the contest, Wilson had only seven

points, and was standing at just 17 after two weeks. However, his scores began to pick up in the third week of the contest, and he averaged 12.5 correct games the last 10 weeks of the contest.

Milner on the other hand, seemed about to run away with the contest at one point, holding as much as a five-point lead. But his scores took a disastrous nosedive the last three weeks, which saw him get nine, eight and eight, after averaging 13 correct games for the first nine weeks.

A check of the tie-breaker scores for the 12 weeks gave Milner the second grand prize of the Sun Bowl trip. Mrs. Veazey was awarded \$15 in cash, equivalent to two season passes to the Friona Chieftain games.

Finishing close to the top with season scores of 140 were Mrs. W.R. Mabry, C.H. Veazey and Mrs. Albert Johnson. Mrs. Ma-

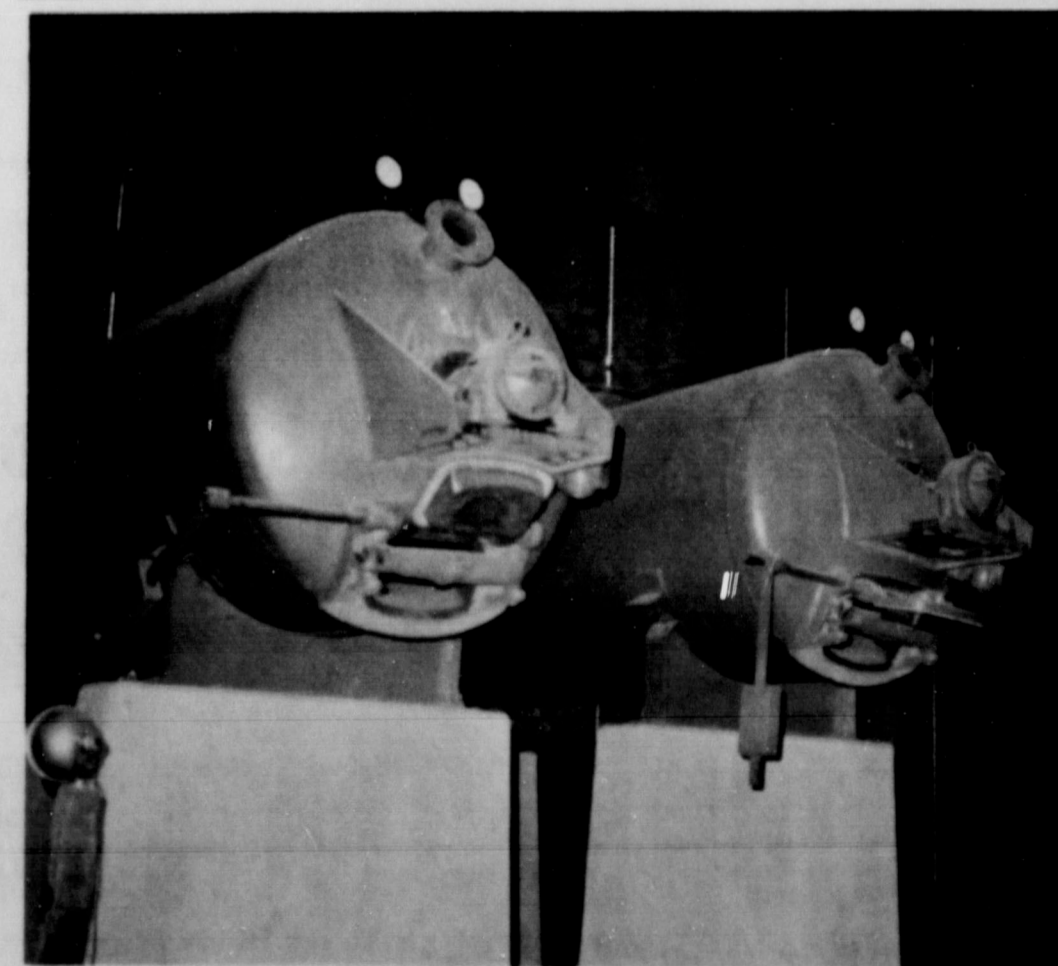
bry was the only one of the contenders to correctly pick Texas Tech over Arkansas.

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COOPERATION URGED

Williams Solicits Help In Christmas Mailing

Postmaster Wright Williams this week is issuing a reminder of mailing dates for Christmas gifts and parcels.

Special attention will again be made on delivery of mail to service men in Vietnam and the surrounding area and be sure you use the correct APO and EPO numbers on all overseas mail. "If you are going to mail a parcel to a serviceman be sure that it is packed good and if you can, keep the weight below five pounds and mail the parcel before Dec. 11th., as that is the deadline we are reasonably sure it will be delivered by Christmas" Williams said.

Always write or print address carefully and use Zip Code, if you have trouble reading the address the people at the post office will have the same problem. I would like to stress the use of first class postage on greeting cards with your return address. This will make sure your mail is forwarded or returned to you if undeliverable, otherwise mail sent as third class will wind up in "Heartbreak Hotel," the dead letter office," he continued.

A card or piece of paper in-

side the parcel carrying your name and address and that of the person to whom the parcel is addressed will insure delivery in case the wrapping comes loose. A list of the contents will help postal "rewrap" clerks in the event your parcel is poorly wrapped and should burst.

During the Christmas rush the postal service carries more mail in a month than most countries do in a year." We expect a record breaking 9 billion pieces of mail to be delivered across the country this Christmas and cooperation by the mailing public in shopping early and mailing early and the use of ZIP CODE will mean there is virtual assurance that all holiday mail will be delivered on time," Williams said.

Postmaster Williams would like to ask that all mail that is being sent out of town be assorted with a rubber band around them and handed into the window as it will save a lot of time, also local mail should be separated and handed and handed in at the window if possible.

"Mail as early in the day as possible so that we will have

more time to get the mail worked into proper channels before our mail is sent out for the day. Your cooperation was excellent last year and I am sure it will be the same this year, so may I thank you in advance for your continued cooperation" he concluded.

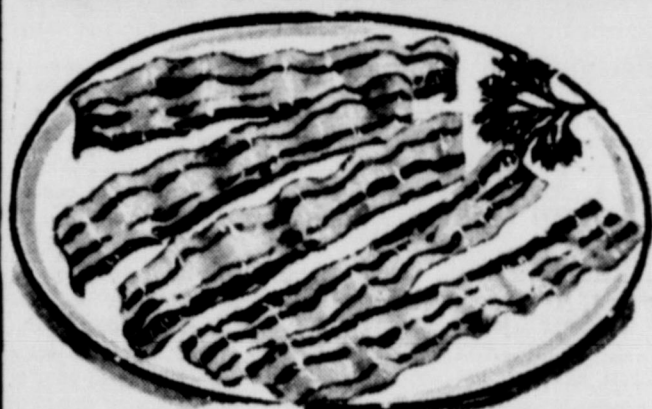

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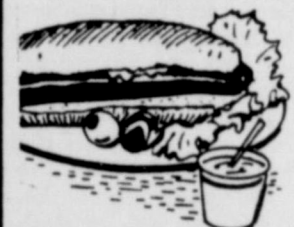

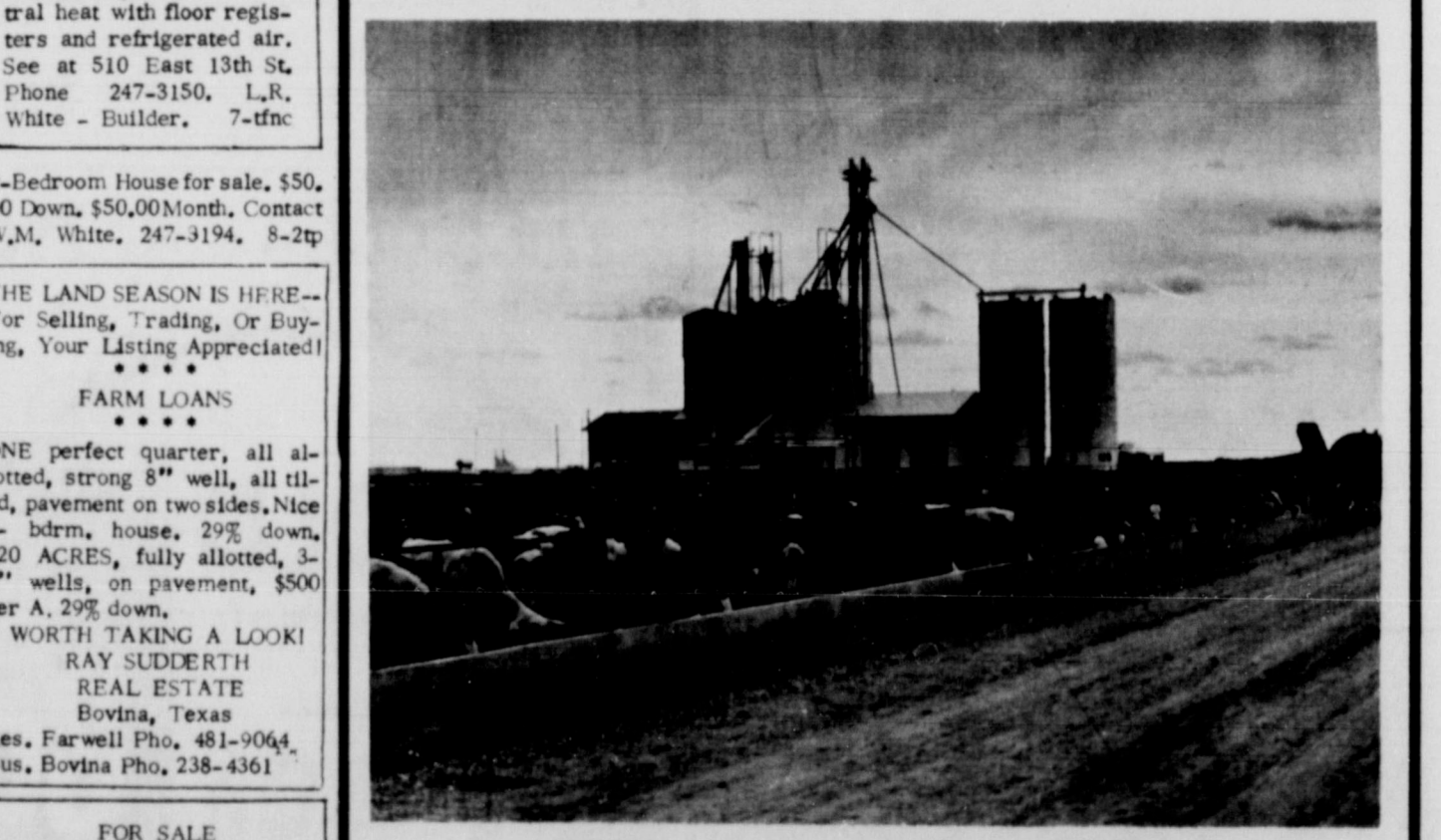

Hunts Deer— Settles For Bear Instead



WHO IS THE MIDDLE MAN? He is the only one in the picture we are unable to identify. This 200-pound black bear was killed by Leroy Johnson, left, who may become known as "The Daniel Boone of Hub." Johnson and one of his hunting companions, Harold Harriger, Lubbock, right, posed with the dead bear before taking him to Monte Vista, Colorado, to have him skinned and dressed. The two men were hunting deer on the Tres Piedras Ranch in southern Colorado when Johnson and the bear happened to meet on top of a hill.

Leroy Johnson knew there were bears around the Tres Piedras Ranch in Colorado where he was hunting deer, but what he didn't know was that he would stumble onto one.

Johnson, along with a group of five other hunters, was stalking deer and elk on the same ranch where two years earlier, Johnson had downed a nice trophy elk. But no such luck this year. All Johnson will have to show for his recent exploit is a 5 1/2 foot square rug from a 200-pound Black Bear.

Johnson was by himself walking up a slope when the animal appeared about 50 yards ahead of him.

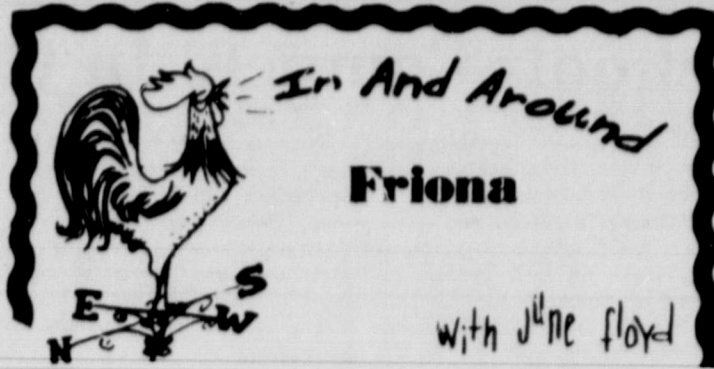
"Just as I raised my gun to shoot, the bear looked straight at me," Johnson explained, "I didn't have time to get scared." The first shot from the 308 rifle killed the animal.

Johnson noted that bears walk a lot quieter than deer, and also have a better sense of smell and sight. Johnson said he was quite surprised when the creature happened across his path.

"It was only afterwards that I started to think what might have happened if I hadn't killed him with the first shot," said the local hunter, "A wounded bear can be pretty mean."

To get the 200-pound animal back to the pickup, Johnson and a hunting companion who came along after the incident, tied a rope around the bear's neck and hauled him down the slope.

Johnson is waiting for the rug to be processed by a taxidermist in Monte Vista, Colorado, who says it should be ready sometime in February.

Survivors besides his wife, Trula, include one daughter, Mrs. Pat Sissell and one son, George W. Lawton, Louisville,

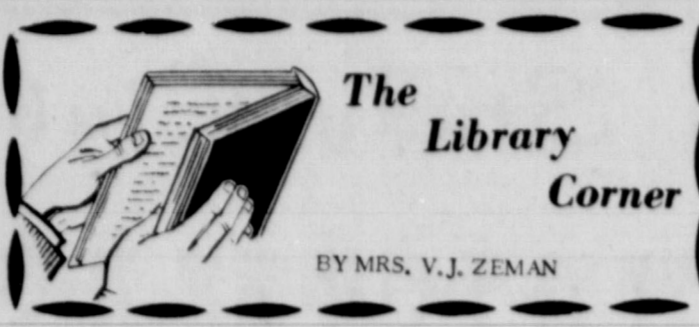
Kentucky; three sisters, 10 grandchildren and 10 great-grandchildren.



J.H. Boyle Finds Paper Dated 1831

J.H. Boyle, who lives south of Friona, recently found a 136-year-old newspaper in a package he received from a relative.

How the newspaper came to be in the package, and how it survived for more than a century is a mystery.

The paper, called "The Genius of Liberty", was published in Union Town, Pa., dated December 27, 1831. It is remarkably well-preserved, printed on paper made of high grade content, not at all brittle, and highly readable.

The newspaper's advertising rates were given as \$1 for three insertions not exceeding a "square", and 25 cents for each subsequent insertion.

It was the maiden issue under new ownership, and the new editor apologized for the delay in the current issue, saying "Having been disappointed in the receipt of the new type, which is on the way frozen up somewhere on the Ohio river, we are compelled this week to issue the paper on the old type."

He gave a report of a "Democratic meeting" which was "Large and respectable and composed of the stoutest hearts and strongest patriots of the party. There were no Tories, no perjured villains, no cut-throats; they were as far as we can judge, honest men."

An obituary was carried, steeped in the flowery style of the times. It stated in part: "In the 74th year of his age, after a severe illness of two weeks, which he bore with silence and Christian fortitude." "While his family mourn his loss, they sorrow not as those that are without hope, having

the consolation of knowing that he died with the full assurance of enjoying a blessed immortality beyond the grave through the merits of the blessed Redeemer," the story continued.

"We understand that the National Republican Convention held at Baltimore, has nominated Henry Clay of Kentucky, as a candidate for the Presidency of the United States, and John Sargent of Pennsylvania for the Vice Presidency," one item said.

One of the advertisements was B.A. Fahnestock's Vermifuge, a guaranteed cure for worms, which listed sworn statements with customers' names who certified that the medicine has rid their children of the worms.

One user stated "I do certify that a child of mine aged 3 years, had been for some time afflicted with worms, and having tried every remedy without effect, at length used B.A. Fahnestock's Vermifuge, three tea spoonfuls of which caused it's discharge of 133 worms."

Another advertisement was for a Saturday newspaper in Philadelphia, the Saturday Courier. This paper was said to "comprise 28 columns of the largest class, which is renewed every week, and includes light reading, internal improvements, commerce, agriculture, domestic manufactures, prices current of stocks, the grain and flour market, public sales of groceries, as well as foreign and domestic intelligence received during the week."

The paper carried an editorial tribute to President Andrew Jackson, whom it recommended in the 1832 presidential election, saying Jack-

son had "gained for us many things which former administrations had lost."

Apparently, a large accounts receivable is not a thing common only to our present day, as evidenced by another notice in the 136-year old newspaper. The notice said in part:

"It is seldom that we have been under the necessity of calling publicly on our customers for money, but there is not an article in our line but it requires cash to purchase it and without promptness on the part of those who are indebted to us, we will be unable to keep up our stock as we would desire."

"It is of the utmost importance for us that this notice be attended to. It is not our wish to be under the necessity of pursuing any rigorous means, and hopes that those who are indebted will not make it necessary by their long delay and non-attention," the notice concluded.
