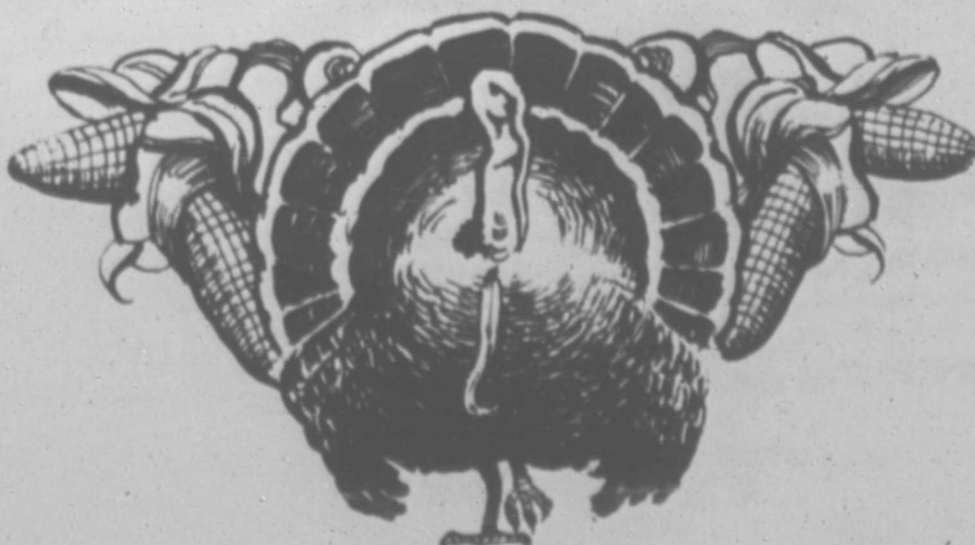

SPS Named Utility Of 1978

Southwestern Public Service Company, Amarillo, Texas has been selected as Electric Light & Power magazine's Outstanding Electric Utility for 1978, according to Robert A. Lincome, Editor.

The award presentation was held Friday, November 17 at a special luncheon at The Villa Inn, Amarillo, was made by Lincome. Accepting for Southwestern Public Service Company was Chairman Roy Tolk and President Berl M. Springer.

Southwestern currently serves approximately 275,000 customers in a service territory of over 45,000 square miles, located in the Texas and Oklahoma Panhandles, eastern New Mexico and Southwestern Kansas.

The selection of Southwestern as EL&P's 10th annual recipient of the Outstanding Electric Utility of the year was based upon the company's ability to cope with the "seemingly insurmountable obstacles which confront all electric utilities nationally," Lincome said. "Its success is a testimonial to the foresight, initiative and dedication of the entire corporate family, and that of its strong close-knit senior management team."

Southwestern Public Service was chosen for the honor by a panel of judges on the basis of its strong financial performance in the face of a difficult fuel supply situation, its innovative efforts to solve the fuel problem, and its success in bringing order to the rapid growth in its service territory.

Southwestern, which was virtually 100 percent fueled by natural gas, made a decision in 1972 to convert to low-sulfur Wyoming coal. In August 1976, the company brought on line the first of three 350-MW coal-fired units. The second unit went into service in mid-1978, and the third is due for completion in 1980. As a result, Southwestern has gone from a situation where the company had practically no coal generation in mid-1976 to approximately 25 percent coal generation this year.

By 1985, the company expects to generate approximately 75 percent of its kWh from coal, thus insuring its customers of a continuous, economic and uninterrupted electrical supply for many years to come. "Significantly," Lincome said, "the utility designs and engineers its own plants and has been able to hold the cost of new units to a level well below the national average."

Census Survey To Be Taken

Did you vote on November 7? Were you registered but did not vote?

The Bureau of the Census will ask these and other questions about voting in the 1978 elections in a sample of households in this area during the week of November 20-25.

Percy Millard, Director of the Bureau's Regional Office in Dallas, stressed that no questions will be asked about party affiliation or for whom a person voted. The survey will provide a profile of typical American voter and non-voter; age, sex, residence, education, labor force status, and

family income.

These voting questions are in addition to the usual ones asked in the monthly survey on employment and unemployment conducted nationwide by the Bureau for the U.S. Department of Labor.

Results of the monthly employment survey provide data on conditions in the labor force, prime indicators of the economic health of the country. For example, in September the survey indicated that of the 100.9 million men and women in the civilian labor force, 94.9 million were employed. The Nation's unemployment rate was 6.0 percent, virtually unchanged from 5.9 percent in August.

Information supplied by individuals participating in the survey is kept strictly confidential by law and the results are used only to compile statistical totals.
