

Effective last Monday, the ceiling prices for grains will be raised as follows:

Wheat, 3c a bushel; corn, 3c a bushel; barley, 4c a bushel; oats, 2c a bushel; grain sorghums, 9c a hundred pounds; ceiling prices for rye, which go into effect June 1, will be increased 4c a bushel. Porter, with approval of the Office of Economic Stabilization, are:

WHY DON'T WE HAVE LUMBER FOR HOME BUILDING?

There are Plenty of trees, plenty of lumber mills, but very little lumber for home building. WHY?

Here are the simple facts behind the lumber shortage—these facts are stopping Home Building:

1

Over 50% of our lumber was once cut by small mills. Thousands of these mills were put out of business during the war by OPA ceiling prices. OPA still clings to wartime policies and these mills are still out of business.

2

OPA's blind "hold the line" policies, plus lack of enforcement, have led to the development of a huge Black Market in lumber. "Black Market" lumber is lumber that costs the people more money than they would pay if lumber were flowing to them through the normal channels of distribution—the retail lumber dealer.

3.

Wartime ceiling prices made it profitable for the lumber manufacturer to cut sizes of lumber for war uses but not suitable for home construction. As OPA continues this unrealistic policy, manufacturers continue to cut lumber sizes which are unsuitable for home construction. In some cases premium prices granted by OPA encouraged production of lumber not usable for Home Building. Proper peacetime adjustments have not yet been made to encourag production of home construction lumber such as flooring, ceiling, siding, millwork, plywood – all essential items in home construction. This situation affects all lumber production.

4.

The manufacturers of lumber have been provided with a hidden premium on export lumber. The OPA has made it more profitable to produce lumber for export to foreign countries than to produce lumber for home construction.

These are merely examples from the lumber field which indicates the type of OPA action that is blocking the production of home building materials in many fields.

The fact remains that homes cannot be built by any industry or Government agency without materials.

Homes cannot be built without lumber whether that home be wood frame, brick, concrete, or stone.

The lumber and building material dealers, and the contractors of the nation can build all the homes needed—If they have the materials. But the flow of materials must be unblocked. Only increased production of building materials can solve the so-called housing problem and the unrealistic pricing policy of OPA is the biggest present block to increased production!

Any government program that does not FIRST remove the obstacles blocking production of materials will simply add additional difficulties to the problem facing the industry.

Reader approach and values in the news will highlight the second session of the course Monday when Lester Markel, Sunday editor of the Times, will discuss "How to Read a Newspaper." Nicholas Roosevelt, of the Times, is presiding at sessions held in cooperation with the Board of Education.

Historic Town Fears Bypass





- A. No; this conclusion was reached after extensive research at the Research Farm of Purina Mills in 1936, and has since been confirmed by work done at Cornell University.
- Q. Does the presence of large and numerous "milk veins" in the udder of a cow indicate that she will be a heavy milk producer?
- A. Probably not, says the U. S. Department of Agriculture. These external veins assist in carrying blood away from, and not to, the udder. Moreover, the internal veins are apparently large enough to return all the blood from the

After the heavy losses suffered the first months of the war in the Pacific, the situation seemed very dark. It is now no secret that we were for a time hard-pressed to keep even one aircraft carrier

in operation against Japan. Today, the picture has completely changed. By the end of August 1944 the Navy possessed roughly 100 aircraft carriers, either in or nearing action, and some 47,276 Navy and Marine fliers. And step by step we are regaining the enemy's conquests.

The magnificent story of the rebuilding of our fleet, and in particular the exploits of one carrier, the Yorktown, are described in "Carrier War" by Lt. Oliver Jensen, USNR.

A carrier serves her fliers as a grand combination of mother, wife, nurse and maid-of-

all-work. Air Group Five, during the many months it was aboard the new Yorktown, was the excuse and reason for the carrier's existence. One of the biggest air groups at sea, it mustered less than 300 men, a little more than a tenth of the Yorktown's total complement of over

"Carrier War" follows the Yorktown and her sister ships through the victories at Marcus, the Gilberts, Kwajalein, Truk, Palau, up through the two great battles of the Philippine Sea, off Saipan and Levte. Incidentally, that very fine documentary film, "Fighting Lady," although it never mentions the name of the Yorktown, is said to be based largely on her exploits.

The Marine fliers in the Solomons, reports Lieutenant Jensen, dis-

covered a very good use for such un-warlike objects as empty beer bottles. It began when they dropped a few near their comrades on the ground, as a rather heavyhanded joke, and discovered that a falling bottle sets up a weird whine just like a projectile coming down, and sends everyone to foxholes. The stunt was at once applied to the Japs. When they caught on and stopped running for cover every time they heard the noise, the Marines would surprise them with real bombs.

One of the drawings in "The Thurber Carnival" shows two of the humorist's mild little men having a duel. One of them has just severed the other's head from his body, and the caption reads "Touché!" This is one drawing for which Thurber did not think up the idea. It came into The New Yorker office from another artist, and while the editors liked the idea, the picture was too gory. They held a conference and decided to let Thurber re-do it, because, after all, the way he

draws people, a man who has his head cut off can just put it on again and go about his business.




