### If Your Bank Account Doesn't Exceed \$552 Your Balance Is Below National Average Americans

-If you WASHINGTON. haven't got more than \$552 in bank account, your account's below average.

At least it's below the average for the more than 92,000,000 accounts in the 13,481 commercial and mutual savings banks whose depositor's accounts are insured by the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation.

And if it isn't at least \$308, it's below the average on the eve of war's outbreak in 1941.

Furthermore, those averages just apply to accounts under \$5,000.

If you're in the \$5,000 to \$10,000 class, you need \$6,600 to meet the average (which is no tougher to do in the postwar period than in the prewar days, since it hasn't changed much).

If you're a \$1,000-to-\$25,000 depositor, meeting the average is easier now than before the war. It takes a mere \$14.663. In the prewar days, it took \$15,160.

And if you're on over-\$25,000 man, you need only \$153.264 to be average. Par in the pre-Pearl Harbor days was \$161,421.

The FDIC's top-limit insurance of \$5,000 in any one account now gives full coverage to 96.4 per cent of the more than 92,000,000 accounts in insured banks, said the report, released by FDIC Chairman Maple T. Harl.

If the top limit were raised to \$10,000, full coverage would be provided for 98.7 per cent of all accounts, and the percentage would go to 99.5 per cent if the limit were upped to \$25,000, the report said.

Earlier, the FDIC had suggested that Congress consider increasing the \$5,000 limit, but had not suggested any figures for a new limit. Present coverage, the FDIC said,

is much greater in respect to numbers of accounts than to value of deposits.

Nevertheless, it said, 46 per cent (\$66.000.000.000) of the value of total deposits (\$141,000,000,000) was insured at the end of the war against 39 per cent of prewar deposits (which totaled seventy billion dollars.




