



Sulphur Mixture **Effective Against** Cotton Fleas

College Station-Recent experiments with a DDT-sulphur mixgainst adult cotton flea hoppers for control of heavy infestations, according to J. C. Gaines, entomologist of the Texas Agricultural Eperiment Station. Sulphur alone is not quite as effective, it was aid, but will give economical control of light to medium infestations.

DDT has proven toxic to adult hoppers as well as immature forms, but it also reduces the

Participants learn how to care for and manage a well-planned garden, carry out a program of garden insect and disease control, and market surplus produce in an economical, approved manner. Planning gardens for a long season is encouraged so that nutritious vegetables and fruits can be produced for use throughout the year.

The State Extension Service will provide information and suggestions for carrying on this program and for helping 4-H Club members in attaining its objectives.

When both hoppers and wee vils are causing injury to cotton at the same time, DDT should not be used, but a calcium arsenate-sulphur mixture is effective against both of these pests.

The first application of sulphur should be applied when from 15 to 25 hoppers are found on 100 cotton terminals, but if the infestation increases rapidly, a 5 percent DDT-sulphur mixture should be used to stop the damage as quickly as possible, Gaines says

Q. May turkeys be raised to maturity on wire or slat-floored porches? A. Yes. Porches constructed of both

slats and wire are very serviceable. About six square feet of floor space should be provided per bird. Q. Is domestic rabbit meat increas-

ing in favor with the American public?

A. Yes. During the war, production of domestic rabbits increased from 400 to 500 percent. The demand for rabbit meat continues to be so great that many butchers now sell it dressed, cutup and ready for cooking. Numerous farmers have found domestic rabbit production a profitable side-line.

Q. Why should dairy calves be kept off pasture until they are four to six months of age?

A. This practice is recommended for the prevention of parasite infection, and to keep young calves from eating so much soft, watery grass that they can not eat the proper amount of growing ration for satisfactory growth.

Q. Is self-feeding of bred sows and gilts advised?

A No. Self-feeding results in excessive consumption of feed, even when bulky rations are used. Long-term experiments at the Research Farm of the Ralston Purina Company indicate that hand-feeding makes it possible to control both condition and feed consumption of sows and gilts, resulting in stronger, healthier litters, and lower

Q. What feeding and management methods for lambs have aided in the control of death losses caused by 'over-eating" disease?

A. In Colorado experiments, the adition of suphur to the grain mixture for fattening lambs has greatly reduced death losses from over-eating. The sulphur was added to the grain mixture at the rate of two pounds for each 100 pounds of grain for lambs on both self-feeding and hand-feeding. Under each system, the rate of death losses was greatly reduced, and the profit per head was increased by as much as 85c per head because of the lowered death







Austin—If every case of su-spected communicable disease could be promptly visited either by the family physician or the father of the slain youth testified local health officer, thousands that his son and the defendant of susceptible persons would be had left Texas together for Inprotected from disabling illness-

To quote Dr. Geo. W. Cox, "The old fashioned theory that it is a good thing for children to have a number of the catching diseases and get them over with, has long since been known to be a serious and sometime fatal error. The longer a child can keep from having these diseases, the better it is for him. Every child should be completely protected by vaccination or inoculation against these diseases where an immunity can be produced.'

Prompt diagnosis, isolation, good medical and nursing care give the patient the best chance for a satisfactory recovery without the serious complications that sometimes accompany even the mild forms of communicable diseases. Dr. Cox emphasized A. L. Ward of Dallas, director, that obeying the public health laws regarding isolation and quarantine of communicable diseases protects not only the patient, but helps prevent others from contracting the illness.

"The State Health Depart ment," Dr. Cox said, "is doing everything in its power to protect the health of the people of Texas. It is the duty of every man and women to do his share to maintain a high level of health and help prevent the spread of communicable diseas-






