Likely Purchasers For Famuliner **Farms Selected**

Thursday, June 20, the people selected by the county committee recently graduated from Texas as likely purchasers of the Famuliner farms met in the courthouse where Sam McMillian farm managing division, Dewitt and John Barbee, chief appraisor, all from Dallas, explained the necessary steps to get the loan.

It was brought out at the meeting that the Farm Security does not own this land. Mr. W. R. Tilson of Meadow bought the land from the Famuliners.

Farm Security Administration financing of veterans in Region VIII (Texas, Oklahoma, and New Mexico) reached new levels during the first five months of 1946, when 3,051 loans were made to ex-servicemen for the purchase of farm operating equipment or family-type farms, E. Lee Ozbirn, Regional Director, said today.

The loans constitute almost two-thirds of the total number the agency has approved for veterans during the past two years McCasland who farms 3¹/₂ mil. "We expect this record lending to continue," Mr. Ozbirn said. "More than 7,800 veteran applications, most of them of recent date, are now on hand in our county offices and are getting preferential attention. Applications are coming in heavily each month, and there is no indication that the peak has been reached. Nearly 5,000 veterans have aleady received FSA assistance in When interviewed McCasland Texas, Oklahoma, and New Mexico. Of these, nearly 500 obtained farm purchase loans under the terms of the Bankhead - Jones Farm Tenant Act from earmarked funds set up by Congress for this purpose. The rest have loans to buy Farm machinery, livestock and other operating needs. In all, veterans have received \$9,720,2481 in loans in Region VIII alone. In Cochran County \$85,079 has been loaned to veterans. Of this amount \$73,149 was for the purpose of buying farm machinery, livestock. etc., according to Mr. At the regular Masonic meet-Davis E. Benham, local FSA Supervisor. This amount was loaned to 38 veterans who are now operating farms in Cochran county Veterans have had to overcome handicaps before obtaining loans especially in the farm purchase program. Plans are being completed whereby 10 veterans of this and nearby counties will be set up with family-type farms on the Famuliner Ranchland, Southwest of Morton. "Real estate prices in most areas have risen far above prewar levels," Mr. Oxbirn said. 'Veterans are having a hard time finding farms for sale at a price that the productivity of the land will justify. Moreover, in some sections, veterans are having difficulty finding productive farms available for rent.'
