

V. S. S. O. Set Up In VA Lubbock Regional Office

The Veterans State Service has established an office with the VA Lubbock regional office, with Charles L. Morris, a World War II veteran, as its representative. Morris arrived June 3 with Charles A. Osborn, assistant director of the V.S.S.O.

Created in 1927 by the State legislature, the Veterans State Service office has as its purpose the assisting of veterans in filing and perfecting claims against the US government incident to service in the armed forces. It acts as their personal representative, or attorney, in presenting their claim to the Rating Boards, reviewing the action taken by the Rating Boards, and otherwise protecting the interest of the individual veteran the same as an attorney guards the interest of his client.

At present there is a representative of the V. S. S. O. in each VA regional office and hospital in Texas, for the sole purpose of rendering such assistance to the veterans and their dependents in cooperation with the Veterans administration.

A. O. Willman is director of the Veterans State Service office, with headquarters in the Land Office building, Austin, Texas.

One Motor Vehicle Limit Authorized By War Assets

Hamilton Morton, regional director of War Assets Administration, Fort Worth, announced Thursday that Lt. Gen. E. B. Gregory, WAA Administrator, had authorized all regional directors of the WAA to extend at their discretion, the limit of one motor vehicle to any veteran purchasing for use in his small business, agricultural or professional enterprise.

The instructions apply to all motor vehicles except passenger

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cars and station wagons, for which applications are no longer being accepted.

The regional director's action, Morton said, will be based on the quantity called for on veterans' certificates already issued and the available supply.

Gregory's instructions, Morton added, emphasized that no sales are to be made to veteran dealers who have not established satisfactory evidence to the WAA veterans division of their legitimate small business dealer status. The instructions do not affect current procedures that permit all certified veterans to buy vehicles for

their personal use. The new order becomes effective immediately.

Recently Published Book "Soil Erosion and It's Control" Adopted By Tech

COLLEGE STATION—Adoption of a recently published book, "Soil Erosion and It's Control," written by Luther G. Jones and Louis M. Thompson of the Texas and M. College agronomy department, has been announced by Louisiana State University and Texas Technological College, authors revealed today.

"Soil Erosion and It's Control," organized and prepared for senior courses in soil conservation, covers the entire field of soil erosion and soil conservation in the southwestern part of the United States. It has been widely acclaimed by professional men as well as teachers, and its adoption at other colleges and universities is expected, according to Thompson.

Dr. M. B. Sturdis, head of the agronomy department at L. S. U., said, "I consider it the best text available in the United States." W. E. Lee, district conservationist at Kentwood, Louisiana, also is of the opinion that "Soil Erosion and It's Control" is the best available publication on that subject.

Dr. Jones and Thompson began working on "Soil Erosion and It's Control" in 1936, completing it shortly before Thompson went into the Army in 1942.

Covering the entire field of soil erosion and conservation, "Soil Erosion and It's Control" covers in detail such topics as the physical factors influencing soil erosion, the relation of erosion to the development of parent materials, the soils of the United States, contour tillage, terraces, water conservation, crop rotation, range conservation, flood control, wildlife, and an appended glossary of agronomic terms.

Price Daniel Honored At Press Banquet

Price Daniel, Liberty attorney who is running for Attorney General, was among ex-servicemen honored last Friday in Corpus Christi at a banquet given by the Texas Press Association. Gov. Coke Stevenson and Mrs. Oveta Culp Hobby, executive vice president of the Houston Post, spoke at the dinner.

Daniel, past Speaker of the Texas House of Representatives and co-publisher of the Liberty Vindicator, entered the Army in 1943 as a private. He was discharged less than two months ago. His candidacy for Attorney General was filed in his absence with a petition signed by more than 1,000 of his friends throughout Texas.

In his hard-hitting campaign to become the people's lawyer, the 35-year-old candidate covered the Rio Grande Valley the first half of this week and traveled up the State to East Texas.

Daniel contends that Texas needs an Attorney General who not only possesses legal qualifications but also has a well-rounded knowledge of the State Government in general. He is citing his experience as a lawyer, his service in the Legislature and his record as Speaker as evidence that he will be able to serve the people well as Attorney General.

"I am running on my own name and my own merits," Daniel said in a statement this week. "My campaign will be vigorous and, so far as is possible, I shall carry my appeal directly to the voters in every town I visit."

THE SPEARMAN REPORTER headlines the fact a state visitor predicts Hansford County will lead the wheat yield of Texas. It also showed a better grade grain by a recent survey for this Bread Basket of the World.

RISING STAR has organized a Veterans of Foreign Wars Post.

SHAMROCK, far short its emergency food quota, plans to make the city headquarters of Taster Panhandle for rodeo and livestock show. The city also announces receipt of \$100,000 to build REA lines.

ODONNELL area reports wheat averaging from 13 to 25 bushels per acre despite pessimistic reports of two weeks ago.

CROSBYTON plans a Harvest Jubilee, underwritten by local merchants, for June 27; the city

also called for water and sewer extension bids on June 19.

FIVE COCHRAN COUNTY boys from Morton attended Boy's State in Austin this month. Surveyors have also checked about 16,000 acres of ranch land near Morton to allow GI's farm plots in the future.

TUCUMCARI, N. M., has a new swimming pool but won't fill it with water until a good rain comes along to insure the city's supply.

BOB EUBANKS is the new prexy of the Clovis Chamber of Commerce.

McLEAN will stage its annual Legion Rodeo June 28-29.

GIRARD'S Baptist Church, Spur, Tex., held an all-day Father's Day celebration attracting great crowds.

DIMMITT reports the Castro County Chamber of Commerce committees have mapped a gigantic program for the balance of the year to capitalize on the water and soil possibilities, industrialization and improvements afforded by nature that adjoining counties have used almost exclusively for years. Castro

County is rated by scientists as being one of the nation's outstanding areas.

BOOKER, TEX., was the scene of a freak accident last week when a road maintainer broke a gas main, setting a wheat field on fire and injuring a driver seriously.

ALBANY, TEX., features news on a new shallow sand found in the west side of its county, predicting a new oil boom for that area.

LEVELLAND is a busy Texas city preparing for its annual July 3-4 rodeo, its equalization board working on current taxes, staging a Clean-Up holiday and holding a community hospital meeting within the week.

BROWNWOOD'S City Council has taken options for a municipal airport and accepted bids for the Plaska highway pavement this week.

L. E. SOLEMAN of Carlsbad, N. M., is the new manager of the Lovington Municipal airport. The Lovington Leader is also being sued for \$50,000 by Horace B. Owens, Democratic nominee for sheriff of Lea County, charging libel in pre-election campaign.

LOCKNEY voted June 17 to abolish the independent district as the first step in consolidating six districts in that area.

BE IT RESOLVED AND ORDERED BY THE BOARD OF COMMISSIONERS OF THE CITY OF WHITEFACE, TEXAS:

Section 1: That a Special Election shall be held in the City of Whiteface, Texas, on the 6th day of July, 1946, at which election there shall be submitted to the duly qualified resident electors of said city who own taxable property within said City and who have duly rendered the same for taxation, for their action thereupon, the following propositions:

PROPOSITION NO. ONE
Shall the Board of Commissioners of the City of Whiteface, Texas, be authorized to issue the bonds of said city in the amount of \$20,000, maturing serially within twenty-five years from their date and bearing interest at a rate not exceeding 3 1/2 per annum, for the purpose of constructing a water system in and for said city, and to levy taxes upon all taxable property within said city annually sufficient to pay the interest on said bonds as it accrues and to create a sinking fund to pay the principal of said bonds as they mature.

PROPOSITION NO. TWO
Shall the Board of Commissioners of the City of Whiteface, Texas, be authorized to issue the revenue bonds of said City in the amount of \$40,000, maturing serially within twenty-five years from their date, the maximum maturity date to be not later than July 15, 1971, and bearing interest at a rate not exceeding 3 1/2 per annum, for the purpose of building a water system for said city; said bonds to be issued in accordance with and secured in the manner provided in articles 1111 to 1118, both inclusive, revised Civil Statutes of Texas, 1925, as amended; and to secure the payment of the interest on said bonds as it accrues and the principal of said bonds as it matures by pledging the net revenue from the operation of said water system, each bond to be conditioned that the holder thereof shall never have the right to demand payment of said obligation out of any fund raised or to be raised by taxation.

Section 5: That notice of said election shall be given by posting and publication of a notice containing a substantial copy of this resolution; said notice shall be posted at the United States Post Office and one other public place within such City not less than fourteen (14) days prior to the

date on which said election is to be held and shall be published on the same day in each of two successive weeks in the Morton Tribune, a newspaper of general circulation published in Cochran County, Texas, in the City of Morton, Texas, there being no newspaper published in the City of Whiteface, Texas, the City of Morton being the nearest place in Cochran County where a newspaper is published, the first of said publications to be made not later than fourteen (14) days prior to the date set for said election.

Texas A. And M. To Present Ten Scholarships

COLLEGE STATION—Ten Texas boys who have very slim hopes of obtaining a college education because of financial limitations are going to be able to realize their ambition at Texas A. and M. College.

Ten Texas A. and M. College Opportunity Awards, four-year scholarships, beginning in September and running through 1950, were announced here today by President Gibb Gilchrist of the College. A. F. Mitchell, Corsicana, chairman of the board of the Texas A. and M. Development Fund, and Carrol Gaines, San Antonio, president of the Association of Former Students.

The ten fortunate boys will be selected through statewide competition, and each will receive between \$200 and \$300 per year, an amount which may be supplemented by student employment on the campus. Details of the selection are being handled by Registrar H. L. Heaton.

Under sponsorship of the A. and M. Development Fund, the Opportunity Awards are a joint project of the College and its Association of Former Students, and it is hoped to increase the number of the awards each year.

"These first ten awards are merely the beginning," Mr. Mitchell declared. "Each year more than half of the Texas boys who finish high school are unable to attend college for financial reasons.

"In that group we believe there is as much potential leadership and ability to pursue a college education as there is in the group who are financially able to attend college.

"The Opportunity Awards program is our answer to this tragic waste of one of the finest and most valuable resources of Texas—its young manhood. We intend

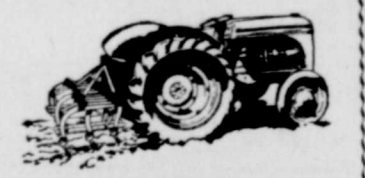

Veterans' Questions & Answers

Q. Who may be designated as beneficiaries of National Service Insurance?

A. The insured has a right to designate a beneficiary or beneficiaries of the insurance within the following classes: Wife or husband, child, parent, brother or sister.

Q. May a veteran called into service under the Selective Service Act, and discharged before December 7, 1941, receive a course of education or training under the GI Bill?

A. Yes. Any person who served in the active military or naval service on or after September 16, 1940, and prior to the termination of the war is entitled to apply for a course of education or training at the school or college of his choice.

Q. When a veteran gets married can he change the beneficiary of his National Service Life Insurance from his mother to his wife?

A. The insured may change the beneficiary at any time by notice in writing signed by the insured and forwarded to the Veterans Administration.

Q. Does the veteran's right to obtain guaranty or insurance on

loans continue indefinitely?
A. No, but guaranty or insurance may be had when obtaining a loan if within 10 years from the officially declared termination of World War II, so the right will continue for a long time.

Do Not Hoard Old Medicine In Any Form

AUSTIN—There are many persons who naturally hoard anything and everything including old clothes, boxes, and other useless articles, some of which constitute no greater danger than a possible fire hazard, but a very real danger is present when this tendency is applied to hoarding old medicine in any form.

Most medicine finds itself into the home through a doctor's prescribing it for some specific illness. For the sake of safety, left-over medicines should be destroyed immediately when they have fulfilled their purpose and never be stored in the medicine cabinet for future unprescribed use in case of another illness, according to Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer.

"Self-medication with the use of left-over drugs which were of great benefit to some previous illness can sometimes turn a simple ailment into a very serious condition of actual poisoning," Dr. Cox said. "This is particularly true of the indiscriminate use of sulfa drugs which have been prescribed for some previous specific condition.

"It is wise to use medicines as indicated for the illness for which they are prescribed by your doctor, and when they are no longer needed, destroy the remaining medicine immediately," Dr. Cox said. "Even if you expect a return of the same condition at some future date, it would be better to obtain new medicine if the condition recurs than to retain this old medicine in the cabinet and subject the members of your family to the danger of using it unwisely."

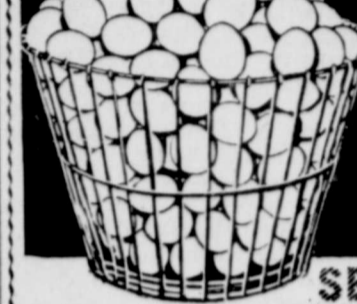

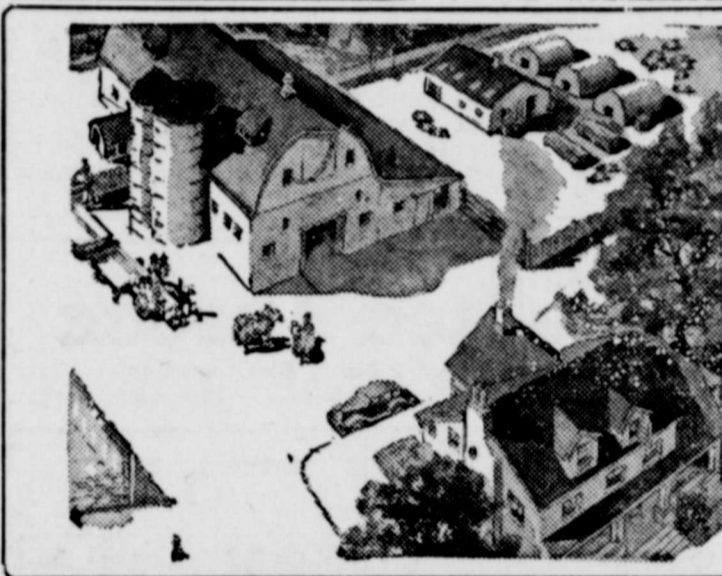
