Sale of Government-owned surplus high-voltage X-ray machines to educational and public health institutions at 3 per cent of their fair value was authorized J. Files, John G. Read, Marjorie today by Lieutenant General E. B. Gregory, War Assets Administrator

Various hospitals and universities have already indicated interest in acquiring these machines for purposes of research and treatment, especially in the field of cancer, the order said.

Two million-volt X-ray machines which cost the government between \$25,000 and \$35,-000 have already been declared

These super-voltage machines were originally used to detect flaws in iron and steel castings in industrial manufacturing tanks, boilers, turrets, fly-wheel gears and other war equipment and machinery. The fair value of the machines for purposed of resale has been established at 60 per cent of acquisition cost.
