

A piece of mail we received this week had some disturbing possibilities. Therefore, we're passing it on to our readers, perhaps not so much as for its factual content as to spread the disturbing feeling around.

According to the "U.S. Consumer," a newsletter mailed from Washington, D.C., those of us who enjoy backyard cook-outs may be in for some bad news.

The latest research study -- as yet unpublished -- shows that the amount of benzo-a-pyrene (cancer-producing substance) in only one big juicy charcoal broiled steak "may" be equal to what you could get in 150 packs of cigarettes.

Before you swear off charcoal broiled steaks, however, there is a small consolation, for what it is worth: Benzo-a-pyrene, although a proven producer of cancer in animals, has not yet been proven as a producer of cancer in man.

These statements are to be contained in a report made by William Lijinsky, one of the leading cancer experts, and found in a series of studies financed by the National Cancer Institute at Chicago Medical School.

Previous studies by Lijinsky had showed only as much of the unwelcome hydrocarbon in a broiled steak as in 15 packs of cigarettes.

Benzo-a-pyrene is the same substance that is found in automobile exhaust and smoke from cigarettes. What Lijinsky claims to have done is to establish the presence of relatively large amounts of the substance in well-cooked meat.

Lijinsky's latest research, to be published in August in a British scientific journal, shows for the first time that the cause of the uninvited substance in cooked meat is not the charcoal but the fat that drips into it.

The fumes from the cooked fat rise into the meat and undoubtedly add greatly to the flavor.

The more fat there is in the meat and the longer it is cooked over the flames, the more the benzo-a-pyrene in the meat, according to Lijinsky. He reports that the key to the situation is whether the flames are above or below the meat being cooked. He found no hydrocarbons in meat cooked under flames such as in a gas or electric broiler.

Very little is known about exactly what benzo-a-pyrene does when it gets inside a person's stomach or lungs. It may be neutralized in the stomach and eliminated from the body without damage.

But there have been some disturbing reports of a high rate of stomach cancer among Icelanders and others who consume large amounts of smoked fish in their diets, the newsletter said. And, it continues, the statistical evidence showing a greater rate of lung cancer among cigarette smokers is well known.

In the interest of maintaining backyard harmony as well as health, Professor Lijinsky was asked if there were any way in which a person could "have his steak and enjoy it too."


Lijinsky says to tilt the grill, so that the fat from the meat runs down the grids to one side away from the coals. This will reduce the smoke and reduce the chance of hydrocarbons being cooked into the meat.

Another tip is to stand to the "windward," so you don't have to breathe the smoke.

As a life-long non smoker, we've thought ever since the U.S. Surgeon-General's report about lung cancer that we at least didn't have to worry about the smoking angle.

However, we can't plead "innocent" on the charge of having eaten charcoal-broiled meat, so if this fellow is right, we may have been "smoking" all along.

We're not going to give up the practice yet, though. In fact perhaps we should try to get as much charcoal-broiled steak eating in as possible, just in case they later decide that Prof. Lijinsky's theory applies to humans.

**Fund Drive Figures Released By Officials**

The Friona Industrial fund drive brought in a total of \$104,164.94, according to a report this week from the Friona Industrial Development Corporation.

Members of the non-profit corporation said they were making the announcement in the response to many inquiries as to the amount of the drive raised, and to the dispersal of funds. Only one check has been drawn from the account at Friona State Bank, and that was for the purchase of land for the Missouri Beef Packers' site, in the amount of \$95,000.

This leaves a balance in the fund of \$9,164.94, which mem-

bers of the corporation hopes will continue to grow, for possible future use by prospective industries.

Contrary to some reports, no personal expenses have been paid out of the fund, a spokesman for the corporation said. "All of the personal expenses of the industrial committee members who worked on the project were paid by the individuals," stated Dr. Loyd Shackelford, one of the committee members.

It was explained that no figures were announced during the fund drive, so as not to discourage prospective donors. It was thought that any amounts

over that needed for the Missouri Beef Packers' land might be used for future industrial needs.

"We do not have anything at the present time along this line, however," Shackelford said. Members of the industrial

committee express the hope that businessmen and individuals in the Friona area will continue the cooperative spirit exhibited during the fund drive, so that the community could get the maximum benefit from the location of Missouri Beef Packers in Friona.

**Spring Gives Bond Report**

Sales of Series E and H United States Savings Bonds are at an all-time high according to Frank A. Spring, chairman of the Parmer County

Savings Bonds Committee. Savings Bonds sales during the month of May in Parmer County totaled \$2,818. For the first five months of 1967 sales in this county amounted to \$44,893 which is 35 per cent of the yearly goal of \$130,000. Total purchases of Series E and H Bonds in Texas for the month of May totaled \$14,036,665 -- 9.7 per cent increase over May of 1966.

Nationally, during May new purchases of E and H Savings Bonds amounted to \$438 million -- a 22 year peak -- and an increase over May 1966 of 6 per cent.

**Pioneer Gas Asks City Rate Hike**

The Friona City Council, at its regular meeting next Monday, will be asked to consider a rate increase request from Pioneer Natural Gas Company for city gas customers.

The increase is also being asked by Pioneer in all of the 55 towns it serves in its West Texas distribution system.

According to Pioneer, the requested general service rate would result in an increase of 11.5 per cent to customers. The last general service rate adjustment was effective in January of 1961.

It was pointed out that the 1961 rate increase was due to increased field cost of gas. The current rate increase request is primarily attributable to the increase which has been experienced in labor, materials, general taxes and other operating costs, the company says.

"The revenue provided by the present rate does not yield the company a reasonable return on its investment. It is vitally important that the company be allowed to earn a reasonable return to enable it to attract necessary capital and adequately meet the needs of its service area," said a Pioneer dispatch. In a paper showing why the rate increase was being requested, Pioneer Gas showed how operating and maintenance expenses and general taxes per customer had increased 17.1 per cent since 1961.

Construction costs have increased an average of 15.5 per cent in the past six years, and the system's investment per customer has gone up by 12.5 per cent since 1961, the company says.

The average domestic gas bill is now \$74.64 per year, which would be increased to \$83.25 under the requested increase, which would amount to \$8.61 per year or 72 cents per month for this "average customer."

The Company does not plan to change the rates for industrial or irrigation service.

Dear Mary,  
Let me begin by saying that I shall always be grateful to have been in the audience when you first presented 'I AM THE NATION.' I can not add anything to Loumarion Sumner's fine article in the Amarillo News. She expressed what all of your listeners feel; however there is a member of every audience that you may never see.

Perhaps he is not visible to everyone; maybe I recognize him because he and I have been close friends for so long. We met first when I started to school in Baltimore, Maryland. I became aware of his presence during a huge military parade in which the beautifully uniformed regiments representing several states marched down a broad avenue. That was in 1914.

I saw him next in 1917 as I stood on the docks and watched our Doughboys embark for France in World War One. That was the war to make the world safe for Democracy; well, that's what the politicians said.

During the next twenty-odd years I happened to see him only spasmodically in such places as my schooling and work happened to carry me. He was at Fort McHenry, where Francis Scott Key wrote the Star Spangled Banner, and at the capitol in Washington, D.C. He showed up at Mount Vernon and at Jefferson's Montecello. He was much in evidence during the horrible years of World War Two. Lots of boys saw him in Korea. Today he stalks through war-torn Vietnam.

You might be a bit startled if you glanced over your shoulder and saw him standing behind you as you recite. He is a tall old man with white hair and a scraggly goatee. He is very slender and stands as erect as a flag pole. Wrinkles seam his face and sometimes a tear will course down between them. His quiet smile is often seen, his laughter never heard. His kindly old eyes light up at parts of your speech and flash fire when the audience applauds at the finish.

If you chance to see him, don't be alarmed at his eccentric mode of dress. His trousers are red, his coat blue, and his tall hat has a band of white stars around the crown.

Yes, Mary, he is your Uncle Sam and a very proud uncle he is. May the good Lord help you to keep his honor bright.

If even one child is damaged by not receiving an award, then I believe we need to give a great deal of thought to our present honor roll program.

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# Belinda Mabry Gives Girls State Report

(Editor's note: Belinda Mabry was Friona's representative to the Texas Bluebonnet Girls State convention this year. She gives her report on the session in the following story.)

First I would like to extend my sincere gratitude and thanks to everyone responsible for allowing me to go to Girls State. It was a great opportunity filled with unforgettable experiences.

Girls from the 18th district attended a tea at the American Legion Auxiliary Post in Amarillo on June 6. Mrs. Sam Williams of Friona, 18th district President, presided over the meeting. Becoming acquainted with each other as well as with the Girls State program was the function of the tea. At this time the mayor of Amarillo, J. Ernest Stroud, spoke to us.

On the evening of June 13 the "Panhandle Girls" were treated to dinner at the Silver Grill in Amarillo. Our chartered bus then took us to the Texas School for the Blind in Austin where this 23rd session of Bluebonnet Girls State was held.

There were 400 girls from all over Texas who became citizens during this 10-day session. Mexico sent two representatives to be with us also. Our staff consisted of more than 50 members; all of whom were willing and ready to help us in any way possible.

Work began immediately to establish city, county and state government. The excitement of having a part in elections gave each a sense of responsibility. Government was taught during assemblies. Later we put our learning to use when the House of Representatives and Senate convened. At these sessions we submitted and debated bills and resolutions which we ourselves wrote.

Guest speakers played an important role in conveying to us the importance of today's youth. Mr. Jack W. Flynt, Commander of Texas American Legion, was one of these. Mr. and Mrs. Jack Flynt are from Jimmott; Mrs. Flynt is Texas Department President. Marilyn Van Derbur, Miss America 1958 spoke on the topic, "Are You Willing to Pay the Price?" and Mr. Don Pratt, Assistant Director of the Texas Youth Conference, was another guest speaker.

The Honorable Robert W. Calvert, Chief Justice of the Supreme Court of Texas, spoke to us; Mr. Jack Cox gave a speech on "It's Your Country," and Mrs. Margaret B. Smith, President of Union Bankers Life and a member of the United States Foreign Trade Advisory Committee, talked on the subject, "Now is the Time." Mrs. Lyndon Baines Johnson paid Girls State an unexpected visit and spoke briefly about the future being in the hands of adolescents.

Girls State took over the capitol for one day with the House of Representatives and Senate convening and carrying on legislative matters. Mr. Ben Barnes, Speaker of the Texas House of Representatives, spoke to Girls State members of the House during a part of that time.

There is no exact definition for Girls State. In general terms it is a mythical 51st State, but to its citizens and staff there is no pretending. The government is real, and the leaders are great. The program which has been referred to as "A Laboratory of Government" is non-partisan.

The entire program employed the maxim, "Learn by Doing." A broader understanding of the responsibilities of citizenship in a democracy and a deeper appreciation for its great privileges resulted from active individual participation in governmental affairs of this mythical state.

The goals and aims of Girls State are many. One is to instruct the youth in the duties, privileges and rights of American Citizenship. The sole purpose is to enable today's youth to grasp the meaning of some of the responsibilities which will be called upon to assume when they become adults.



### On The Farm In Parmer County

RONNIE McNUTT

Soil moisture should be adequate at the tasseling to silking stage to insure maximum corn yields, says Ronny McNutt, Parmer County agriculture agent. Actually, sufficient moisture should be available seven to 10 days prior to tasseling and should be kept at or above 50 per cent field capacity through the period of ear formation, he advises.

Furthermore, soil moisture is necessary throughout the growing season to prevent wilting. Corn requires approximately 24 inches of total moisture during this time and uses less than one-tenth of an inch of water per day until the plant is eight to 12 inches high. From there, the water use rate increases to a peak of about three-tenths of an inch per day during the tasseling and silking stage. Thereafter, water requirements decrease rapidly.

Under optimum moisture conditions, silk emerges at the proper time for pollination. However, water stress during this period delays silking and, in severe stress, a large portion of the pollen may be shed before the silks emerge. This results in poorly filled or partially barren ears. Thus, moisture is critical at this period.

Research has shown that near maximum yields and maximum water use efficiency can usually be obtained with three well-timed irrigations. The first summer irrigation should be applied during the rapid growth

stage about a week or 10 days prior to tasseling. The second irrigation should follow near peak tasseling with the third being applied during silking.

If only two irrigations are planned, they should come prior to or in early tasseling and during silking.

Severe depletion of soil moisture after silking and before maturity may reduce grain yields. However, after the hard dough stage, lack of moisture has little or no effect on yields.


