



## Plans Complete For Top O' Texas Rodeo At Pampa Scheduled For August 15-18

PAMPA—Plans are about complete for the Annual Top O' Texas Rodeo and Quarter Horse Show to be held in Pampa, Texas on August 15th, 16th, 17th and 18th.

The four day show will get underway Thursday night, August 15th at 7:30 p. m. with the Kid Pony Show to be followed by the Palomino Show, which is sponsored by the Texas Palomino Breeders Association, J. T. Booth-

man of Fort Worth and Secretary to the Association is the judge of the show. Animals entering the Palomino show need not be registered to be eligible.

Friday morning at 9:00 a. m. the judging of Quarter Horses will take place in the main rodeo arena. A record of horses is expected this year. Mr. Quentin Williams is Superintendent of the Quarter Horse division. Special loving cups will be presented to the Grand Champion Stallion and Mare in addition to the cash prizes offered.

The Grand Parade will take place at 3:00 p. m. Friday, August 16th, with bands, floats, and all kinds of organization and individual entries taking part. The Khiva Shrine Drum and Bugle Corps of Amarillo, the Shamrock Irish band, the Harvester Band from the Pampa High School and one or more Army bands will add

to the color of the big parade. Over five hundred horses are expected in the parade this year, surpassing the four hundred of last year. The Army will make up a section of the parade presenting all types of modern Army equipment.

Rodeo performances will be held on Friday night, Saturday afternoon, Saturday night and Sunday afternoon with the awarding of special prizes at the final performances.

Special Rodeo dances will be held in the Junior High School Gym on Friday and Saturday nights at 10:00 p. m. after the Rodeo performance with Rip Ramsey and his Texas Wanderers furnishing the music.

Special attractions at this year's show will include Dandy Fly-Way, educated stallion, presented by Bud Thies of Dallas, Texas, the Childress mounted quadrille, "Pancho" the Cowboy monkey and Louis Blair and his clown mule, "Gunpowder."

Advance entries in the various contests indicates the biggest show in the history of the Top O' Texas.

## Mansfield And Fort Will Be Featured At Championship Roping Match August 11

LEVELLAND—Toots Mansfield and Troy Fort, two of the world's best known calf ropers, will be featured in the Levelland rodeo arena on August 11. The long awaited contest is expected to attract roping fans from a several state area.

Slated to get underway at 2 p. m. on Sunday, August 11, the match roping will be sponsored by the Levelland Rodeo Association.

Association President W. J. Robertson, long-time friend of the two ropers, was responsible for arranging the contest of champions in Texas' largest rodeo arena.

Mansfield, whose hometown is Rankin, Texas, is the present world champion calf roper—a title the Texan has held for five out of the last eight years. At 32 years, the champ roper stands six feet, one and a half inches and weighs 187 pounds.

Fort, New Mexico's champion roper who has challenged the world champion, is from Lovington, N. M. The challenger is three years younger than Mansfield (29) and is two and a half inches shorter in stature (five feet, 11 inches). Fort's weight is 168 pounds.

Robertson pointed today to the roping as one of the greatest events in history of match roping. Fort and Mansfield have been matched before, but for a variety of reasons—going through illnesses, the war and others—postponement has resulted.

This time there will be no postponement. These two world famed ropers will match their skill and time, Robertson declared.

No hard feelings exist between the two ropers and regardless of which wins the men will remain friends. Both are high-type gentlemen with sporting minds. Both Mansfield and Fort knows he is meeting the best roper he has ever contested. Each is getting in shape for the topflight sporting event, Robertson commented.

As a sidelight to the local appearance of the two top ropers, both Mansfield and Fort have listed three reasons why they chose the Levelland arena as the setting for the championship roping match. The reasons, of which all local citizens are duly proud, were given as follows:

Fort—The Levelland arena is the best place in the world to rope; Levelland contests have the best people in the world behind them; the Levelland arena is a lucky place for this Lovington roper.

Mansfield—Levelland has a large arena with good ground; Levelland is in the heart of match roping country; the people of Levelland are always behind good Western sport and are fair and hospitable to the visiting cowboys.

Getting down to actual cases so far as the two ropers are concerned, Robertson has furnished interesting data on the two individually. Backgrounds of the famed cowboys hold spotlight attention as the eve of their championship match approaches.

Fort is a native of Lovington, New Mexico. He has tied the fastest calf in the Texas Exposition and Fat Stock show through all years of the Fort Worth rodeo performances.

In match roping Fort has met and defeated such ropers as Jack Shipworth, Clovis, N. M.; Homer Pettigrew, Grady, N. M.; who has been world champion steer wrestler for the past four years as well as the world champion all-around cowboy in 1941; Royce Seawalt, King, Tex.; Sonny Edwards, Big Springs, Tex.; Walton Poage, Rankin, Tex.; and James Kenney, Marathon, Tex.

Early roping for Fort was a hobby, but he soon found it to be as natural with him as "for a Brahma calf to steal Jersey milk." So, with the help of the late Jake McClure, one-time world champion calf roper, he soon found himself pitted against the best. Fort has never refused an offer to meet any roper in match event and has defeated almost all of them regardless of age or size.

Getting back to the man who holds the world champion calf roping title now, Robertson pointed out that Toots Mansfield began roping professionally at the age of 22 years. World champion titles won by the Bandera-born Texan have been for the years 1939, 1940, 1941, 1943 and 1945.

## Texas Will Have Its Own Weekly Newsmagazine

AUSTIN—For the first time in its journalistic history, Texas will have its own weekly newsmagazine when "Texas Week", published here, makes its initial appearance on newsstands throughout the state, August 9.

Editor and publisher of the new publication is Raymond Holbrook, alumnus, class of 1936, Texas A. & M. University, who, prior to his enlistment in the Marine Corps in 1942, was State Editor of the Amarillo Globe-News. Bruce Collier, also of Plainview, is the magazine's advertising manager. Business manager is Harry Seelgerson, Dallas, where he will be in charge of one of the magazine's branch business offices.

Early this year, Holbrook, Collier and Seelgerson banded together a group of veteran Texas newspapermen who, like themselves, were all veterans of World War II, and formed a closed corporation. They then leased an old residence at 2005 Gaudalupe St. in Austin, equipped it with the best available furniture and typewriters and set up shop. Holbrook tells the story: "It seems we had all been nursing the same newspaperman's dream for a long, long time—a weekly newsmagazine of its own to record its own activities in its own way and each of us felt that Texas was probably the only state in the union that required and could and would support such a publication. So, we pitched in the savings we couldn't spend on South Pacific atolls, on beachheads and in fox holes—and the result is "Texas Week."

In size and format, Holbrook said, the new magazine "will resemble 'Time' but will be more profusely illustrated with the week's outstanding news photographs, and like everything else Texas produces, it will have a unique character all its own."

"In 'Texas Week', we plan to cover every phase of the economic, governmental and cultural life of Texas and evaluate the effects of Texas' activities upon the rest of the nation," Holbrook said. "Our editorial staff in Austin, supported by correspondents and photographers strategically situated in key cities throughout the state and in Washington, will enable us to present graphic analyses of the week's vital news of state and local government, labor, industry, business, ranching, books, art and the theatre, plus news from surrounding states and Washington that affects Texas."

Holbrook emphasized "Texas Week" is an "economically and politically independent publication owned by the men who publish and edit it, and that its news presentation will be objective and impartial—a magazine written and edited by Texans, for Texans and dedicated to the welfare of every inch of Texas expense."

Other members of the magazine's staff include: John McElly, College Station, associate editor; Alfred Rosenthal, Austin, staff photographer; James A. Lundell, Amarillo, staff photographer; Robert "Windy" Winn, staff artist; Vance Johnson, Washington correspondent; Clifford Maitland Sage, Dallas, book editor; and a corps of field correspondents.

**HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION**  
proposing an Amendment to Article 16 of the Constitution of the State of Texas, by adding thereto Section 62 providing a Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation Fund for the appointive officers and employees of the State; limiting the amount contributed by the State to such Fund; providing for investment of Fund with certain exceptions; prohibiting recipients of benefits hereunder from receiving other direct aid from the State; authorizing counties to provide and administer such a Fund for appointive county officers and employees after favorable vote in a county election for such purpose; limiting the amount contributed by the county to such Fund; providing for investment of Fund with certain exceptions; prohibiting recipients of benefits from said Fund from receiving other direct aid from the State; and providing for an election, necessary form of ballot, and publication on the question of adoption of this Amendment.

### Be It Resolved By The Legislature Of The State Of Texas:

**Section 1.** That Article 16 of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto Section 62, which shall read as follows:

"Sec. 62 (a) The Legislature shall have the right to levy taxes to provide a Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation Fund for the appointive officers and employees of the State; provided that the amount contributed by the State to such Fund shall equal the amount paid for the same purpose from the income of each such person, and shall not exceed at any time five per centum (5%) of the compensation paid to each such person by the State, and shall in no one year exceed the sum of One Hundred and Eighty Dollars (\$180) for any such person.

"All funds provided from the compensation of such person, or by the State of Texas, for such Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation Fund, as are received by the Treasury of the State of Texas, shall be invested in bonds of the United States, the State of Texas, or counties or cities of this State, or in bonds issued by any agency of the United States Government, the payment of the principal of and interest on which is guaranteed by the United States, provided that a sufficient amount of said funds shall be kept on hand to meet the immediate payment of the amount likely to become due each year out of said Fund, such amount of funds to be kept on hand to be determined by the agency which may be provided by law to administer said Fund; and provided that the recipients of benefits from said Fund shall not be eligible for any other pension retirement funds or direct aid from the State of Texas, unless the Fund, the creation of which is provided for herein, contributed by the State, is released to the State of Texas as a condition to receiving such other pension aid."

**Section 2.** The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified voters of this State at an election to be held throughout the State in November, 1946, (being the 5th day thereof \*) at which all ballots shall have printed thereon:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment authorizing the Legislature to provide a Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation System for the officers and employees of the State of Texas, and authorizing counties to provide such system for the appointive officers and employees of the counties of the State of Texas," and

"(b) Each county shall have the right to provide for and administer a Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation Fund for the appointive officers and employees of the county; provided same is authorized by a majority vote of the qualified voters of such county and after such election has been advertised by being published in at least one newspaper of general circulation in said county once each week for four consecutive weeks; provided that the amount contributed by the county to such Fund shall equal the amount paid for the same purpose from the income of each such person, and shall not exceed at any time five per centum (5%) of the compensation paid to each such person by the county, and shall in no one year exceed the sum of One Hundred and Eighty Dollars (\$180) for any such person.

"All funds provided from the compensation of each such person, or by the county, for such Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation Fund, as are received by the county, shall be invested in bonds of the United States, the State of Texas, or counties or cities of this State, or in bonds issued by any agency of the United States Government, the payment of the principal of and interest on which is guaranteed by the United States, provided that a sufficient amount of said funds shall be kept on hand to meet the immediate payment of the amount likely to become due each year out of said Fund, such amount of funds to be kept on hand to be determined by the agency which may be provided by law to administer said Fund; and provided that the recipients of benefits from said Fund shall not be eligible for any other pension retirement funds or direct aid from the State of Texas, unless the Fund, the creation of which is provided for herein, contributed by the county, is released to the State of Texas as a condition to receiving such other pension aid."

## County Premiums For South Plains Fair Increased

LUBBOCK—County and community premiums for the 29th Annual Panhandle South Plains Fair to be held in Lubbock October 7-12, have been increased, officials of the Fair Association announced today.

In the county classification cash prizes have been upped as much as \$35 with both third and fourth awards jumping from \$40 to \$75 and from \$25 to \$60 respectively. First and second prizes are \$100 and \$85 this year, an increase of 25 each. Fifth place got a similar increase to \$50. The county ranking sixth will receive a \$40 prize, \$15 more than heretofore. Those ranking seventh through fifteenth receive \$25 apiece.

With the exception of seventh and eighth places, which received \$5 increases this year, premiums for the best community display remain the same. First prize is \$25, second is \$20, third receives \$15, and fourth through eighth get \$10 apiece.

Community exhibits must be obtained from within the bounds of the eight school districts in Lubbock County and are confined to those districts only.

Floyd County became the first to reserve a booth for an agricultural exhibit and try for the \$100 first award in the county contest at the Panhandle South Plains Fair which will be held in Lubbock October 7-12.

Fair officials said the reservation was made by A. L. Hartzog, Floydada, county agent for Floyd County.

## 1,750 NEW BOX CARS WILL BE ACQUIRED BY SANTA FE

One thousand seven hundred and fifty new box cars will be acquired by the Santa Fe, according to an announcement made by Fred G. Gurley, president of that company. These cars, with 750 now on order, will give the Santa Fe a total of 2,500 new cars to augment its present supply of this class of equipment for high grade commodities such as wheat, flour, etc., produced in Santa Fe territory.

## OPA Removes Controls On Fifty-Two Delectable Delicacies Monday

WASHINGTON—OPA removed price controls Monday from another 52 items, including twist chewing tobacco, evaporated goat milk and such food-stuffs as imported crepes suzette.

OPA said that any of the items specifically decontrolled under the new price law will not be placed back under ceilings even though controls on major food items from which they are derived should be ordered re-established.

Monday's order made permanent price control suspensions previously ordered for three animal feeds—clam shells, oyster shells and mineral mixed feed.

Imported items included in Monday's list are:

Angelica and angelica root, apricot kernels, rum cakes, berry sauce, dehydrated sweet potatoes, bordelaise sauce, carbo-bean-honey bread or algarroba, chicken fats, crystallized flowers, dried

currants, goose fat, canned peeled grapes, canned green beans, haricot verts, Holland cheese sticks.

Pickled limes, Newburg sauce, Norwegian flat bread, canned pumpernickel, canned pumpkin, baled stockfish.

These domestic or imported items also were included:

Canned caponato, chopped egg plant relish, case hardening bone, chicken paste, fish pastes, salted sardine filets, sardine and tomato paste, canned trout, canned turtle meat and canned vine leaves.

Other items affected were:

Animal glands, bile and hog stomach linings, brewers' wet grains used for animal feeding, canned ground fish and pickled cantaloupe, pearl barley in three-pound packages or less, steamed bone meal, and frozen tamales made from poultry, rabbit or any meat except beef, veal, pork, lamb or mutton.

Also included were these food-stuffs: Frozen peaches and apricots in packages of 10 pounds or more, imported processed citrus and imported canned or frozen spinach.

**Diabetes Took Toll Of Lives In Texas The Past Year**

AUSTIN—Despite the fact that modern medicine can do much to help the diabetic live out a normal life span, nevertheless diabetes took a toll of several hundred lives in Texas during the past year, according to Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer.

"While the communicable diseases such as typhoid fever, malaria, diphtheria and smallpox are annually causing a decreasing number of deaths in this country, diabetes is still taking a tragic number of human lives each year, especially in the middle aged group," Dr. Cox said. "Until recent years diabetes was not noted as a major health problem, but it became accepted as such in direct ratio to the development of medical laboratory procedures, which made the disease more easily diagnosed."

Dr. Cox said that diabetes is generally recognized as a class disease. It seems to attach the

white collar class of indoor men and women much more frequently than it does the outdoor person whose work is more vigorous and calls for more exercise. Whatever the actual cause of the disease may be, vocational and economic conditions are factors, since it seems a fact that those who do not indulge in luxurious living and whose occupations call for manual labor are not frequently affected.

Dr. Cox stated that simple, wholesome diets, sufficient exercise and sleep are factors in the prevention of diabetes, and an annual physical examination, especially in middle aged persons, is important so that if the disease is present, competent treatment can be instituted while the disease is in its early stage.

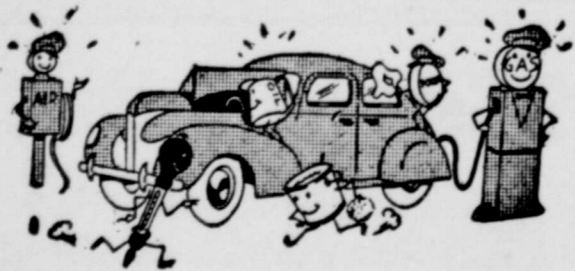

**LOOKING AHEAD**

By George S. Benson, President, Harding College, Searcy, Ark.

**PARTNERSHIP**

Did you ever have a joint checking account with somebody? They can be handy things sometimes. So can a tin of gasoline in the basement, but both are extremely dangerous. All parties concerned must, of necessity, have a cooperative understanding about how a joint checking account is to be used, how fast and for what purposes. Otherwise, one party's error might cause the other one trouble, no end.

I wish all the taxpayers in the United States could realize that they have a joint checking account with Uncle Sam. Moreover I wish they might suddenly wake up to the fact that everything they have is in this joint account. If Uncle Sam's stubs are not balanced, or if Uncle Sam's checks are not all numbered, Mr. Taxpayer is certain to have to make it good personally when something "bounces."

**A Joint Account**

It is high time now for some constructive thinking about the taxpayer's partnership with government. America has no mysteriously far-away colonies from which savage natives send precious metals, pelts and gems in return for dime-store jewelry. The only way any administration in the United States can increase treasury income is by taxation. They spend and we pay. That's the story.

Government can assess taxes to the amount of what government needs, or thinks it needs, and that's a matter of judgement. During the war our executives spent money faster than it came in, running the country's debt to 268 billion dollars. However wisely the debt was contracted, it will never be any smaller until government officials begin spending less than they collect from the people by taxation.

**Balance the Budget**

There is considerable doubt whether those who spend and those who pay have a cooperative understanding about their joint account. They ought to see eye-to-eye. Victory was cheap, whatever it cost in money, but the unpaid portion still has to be met. Moreover the country's best economists think now is the time to start paying off the debt, while nearly all of us are earning good pay.

Recently I saw a summary of proposed federal spending for the next 12 months; a work-sheet from the 1947 budget, currently being considered. This budget can be balanced as certainly as figures can be depended upon to tell the truth. It calls for an outlay of 35.1 billion dollars to come from 31.5 billion of revenue—just 3.6 billion dollars in the red. Such a shortage need not exist.

**Stay in the Black**

The deficit can be offset two or three times by economy. Most of the expense items can be deflated some. Such obligations as social security, veterans' benefits, refunds and the interest on public debt are fixed. They can't be cut. But there are seven other general classifications of expenses that ought to be deflated about 50 per cent, all told. If this over-draft can be avoided it's a duty.

### Pension Checks Cut for Aged in State

AUSTIN—Old age assistance checks mailed to 185,258 aged persons this month were each cut \$2.30 under the authorized amount.

John H. Winters, executive director of the State Department of Public Welfare, said today that the addition of 732 recipients in July resulted in reducing the average payment to \$23.43.

Winding funds necessitated a first cut last April when old pension rolls expanded beyond the number that could be paid in amounts of full grants the appropriation of the last session of the legislature.

Progressive reductions of 50 cents have pyramided monthly all this month when the additional reduction was held to 30 cents.

Applications continue at approximately 650 per week, Winters said. There were 2,213 persons added to the rolls but death reduced the number by 929 and permanent ineligibility dropped another 552.

### Tech Officials Having Problem

Texas Tech officials, swamped with applications from students wishing to enroll for the fall term starting in September, have a new problem. Applications are coming in from persons wishing to enroll for the 1947-48 term, over a year away.

Each of the prospective students writing in for future registration says he wants to make certain there will be a place to stay and room in classes when he finishes high school.

W. P. Clement, registrar, is telling each 1947-48 applicant the major problem is housing. He is suggesting contact be made with persons in charge of dormitories or having rooms off the campus—if citizens with rooms to rent can be found.

Room applications mainly are for places in the four new dormitories under construction and scheduled to open in September, 1947. The new structures will be the best in the Southwest, Tech officials say. No assignments other than for the fall semester starting next month will be made in dormitories until next year.

Enrollment this fall is expected to pass 5,000, with a further increase expected a year later. All qualified applicants are expected to be enrolled this fall.

### Swing Of Southwest Farm Markets

Cotton and hogs made the largest gains last week while most other southwest farm products moved at steady to easier prices, according to USDA's Production and Marketing Administration.

Cotton advanced more than two cents a pound last week following earlier declines. Spot market activity increased in south Texas markets but was moderate elsewhere. Export demand was good and domestic mill demand is expected to increase with clarification of price ceilings. Sales in the 10 spot markets totaled 56,000 bales for the week ended August 1, 57,200 bales for the preceding week and 83,200 bales for the same period last year.

Higher feed prices continued to send liberal poultry supplies to southwest markets. However, hens held about steady with heavy weights quoted 22 to 24 cents a pound, Dallas and Ft. Worth; 23 to 25 cents, Denver and 27 to 31 cents, New Orleans. Fryers were down from recent high levels and ranged from 30 to 35 cents a pound at most markets.

Eggs remained about steady with most dealers buying strictly on a candled basis. Hot weather reduced supplies. Demand continued fair at most southwest consuming centers.

Cattle receipts were heavier at most southwest markets last week. Trading was fairly active at erratic prices. Most top quality cattle were steady, but lower grades were weak. Houston sold common and medium steers and yearlings at \$11.50 to \$14.50 and common and medium cows at \$8.75 to \$11 a hundred pounds.

San Antonio moved medium grass steers at \$15 to \$16.50 and medium and good cows \$10.25 to \$12.50. Ft. Worth quoted medium to good steers and yearlings \$13 to \$17.50 and medium to good cows \$10 to \$13. Common and medium cows brought \$11 to \$12.25, Oklahoma City; \$9 to \$12, Wichita and \$10.50 to \$13.50, Denver.

Hogs gained one to four dollars a hundred last week over the previous week's close at most

southwest markets. Top butchers were quoted Friday at \$24.50 a hundred pounds, Ft. Worth; \$24.25, Oklahoma City and Denver; \$23.24, Wichita and \$22 San Antonio.

Most southwest sheep and lamb markets reported steady to higher prices compared to the previous week's close, except Ft. Worth where common and medium springers were down 50 cents to a dollar a hundred at \$12.50 to \$15.25. Medium spring lambs realized \$13.50 to \$14, San Antonio; and medium and good, \$13.50 to \$17, Oklahoma City. Common to good springers brought \$21 down at Denver.

Prices were a trifle easier on peaches and potatoes and lower for onions at most southwest markets last week. Liberal potato supplies far exceeded the slight improvement in the commercial demand. Shipments continued heavy with the government buying potatoes to support prices to farmers. Peak movement of southern peaches has passed but heavy supplies started moving from intermediate producing areas. Summer onions were in excess of what markets could absorb. Plenty of local onions around big consuming centers competed strongly with long-distance supplies.

Sales of domestic wools were very scarce in the Boston market. Demand was strong for all sorted mohair.



### McMurry College Enlarges Housing Facilities For Vets

Construction of five temporary dormitories for single students and 30 four-room modern cottages for married veterans is now in progress on the campus of McMurry college, bringing the total facilities for veteran students who will enroll next September to more than 275. Dr. Harold G. Cooke, president, announced this week.

The new dormitories will be 150 feet long, with the exception of one two-story building 80 feet long, housing 40 men. The others house 32, with two students in a room. Each dormitory will have adequate showers and toilet facilities, and a large living room for lounging and study.

The structures are being brought to the campus as a part of the buildings allotted to McMurry from Camp Berkeley by the FPHA. They are being redecorated and completely renovated to provide comfortable and adequate quarters, Dr. Cooke said.

"We are making every effort to provide housing for all students this fall. So far we have been able to keep slightly ahead of the demand for rooms, and we hope to continue to be able to do so, Dr. Cooke declared. "The new four-room cottages will be ready in September, and in addition, 20 trailer homes are now being made ready for married veterans and their families."

### H. J. R. NO. 49 HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION

proposing an amendment to Article VIII of the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding thereto a new section to be known as "Section 7-a"; providing that subject to legislative appropriation, allocation and direction all net revenues derived from the taxes, except gross production and ad valorem taxes, levied on motor fuels and lubricants and motor vehicle registration fees shall be used for the sole purposes of acquiring rights-of-way for and constructing and maintaining public roadways; for the administration of laws pertaining to traffic and safety; and for the payment of principal and interest on county and road district bonds or warrants voted or issued prior to January 2, 1939, and declared eligible for debt service prior to January 2, 1945; providing that one-fourth (1/4) of such net revenue from the motor fuel tax shall be allocated to the Available School Fund; providing and insuring that each county shall never derive less revenue from motor registration fees than the maximum amounts and percentages of such fees allowed to be retained by each county under the laws in effect on January 1, 1945; negating any interpretation of this amendment as authorizing the pledging of the State's credit for any purpose; providing for the submission of this amendment to the voters of this State; prescribing the form of ballot; and providing for the proclamation of the election and the publication thereof.

### Be It Resolved By The Legislature Of The State Of Texas:

Section 1. That Article VIII of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto a new Section to be known as 7-a and to read as follows:

"Section 7-a. Subject to legislative appropriation, allocation and direction, all net revenues remaining after payment of all

refunds allowed by law and expenses of collection derived from motor vehicle registration fees, and all taxes, except gross production and ad valorem taxes, on motor fuels and lubricants used to propel motor vehicles over public roadways, shall be used for the sole purpose of acquiring rights-of-way, constructing, maintaining, and policing such public roadways, and for the administration of such laws as may be prescribed by the Legislature pertaining to the supervision of traffic and safety on such roads; and for the payment of the principal and interest on county and road district bonds or warrants voted or issued prior to January 2, 1939, and declared eligible prior to January 2, 1945, for payment out of the County and Road District Highway Fund under existing law; provided, however, that one-fourth (1/4) of such net revenue from the motor fuel tax shall be allocated to the Available School Fund; and, provided, however, that the net revenue derived by counties from motor vehicle registration fees shall never be less than the maximum amounts allowed to be retained by each County and the percentage allowed to be retained by each County under the laws in effect on January 1, 1945. Nothing contained herein shall be construed as authorizing the pledging of the State's credit for any purpose."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Amendment to the Constitution shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at the General Election to be held in November, 1946, at which election each ballot shall have printed thereon the following words:

"FOR the Amendment to the Constitution of the State providing that subject to legislative appropriation, allocation and direction all net revenues derived from taxes, except gross production and ad valorem taxes, levied on motor fuels and lubricants and motor vehicle registration fees shall be used for the sole purposes of acquiring rights-of-way for and constructing and maintaining public roadways; for the administration of laws pertaining to traffic and safety; and for the payment of principal and interest on county and road district bonds or warrants voted or issued prior to January 2, 1939, and declared eligible for debt service prior to January 2, 1945; providing that one-fourth (1/4) of such net revenue from the motor fuel tax shall be allocated to the Available School Fund; providing and insuring that each county shall never derive less revenue from motor registration fees than the maximum amounts and percentages of such fees allowed to be retained by each county under the laws in effect January 1, 1945; and negating any interpretation of this amendment as authorizing the pledging of the State's credit for any purpose.

"AGAINST the Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas providing that subject to legislative appropriation, allocation and direction all net revenues derived from taxes, except gross production and ad valorem taxes, levied on motor fuels and lubricants and motor vehicle registration fees shall be used for the sole purpose of acquiring rights-of-way for and constructing and maintaining public roadways; for the administration of laws pertaining to traffic and safety; and for the payment of principal and interest on county and road district bonds or warrants voted or issued prior to January 2, 1939, and declared eligible for debt service prior to January 2, 1945; providing that one-fourth (1/4) of such net revenue from the motor fuel tax shall be allocated to the Available School Fund; providing and insuring that each county shall never derive less revenue from motor registration fees than the maximum amounts and percentages of such fees allowed to be retained by each county under the laws in effect on January 1, 1945; and negating any interpretation of this amendment as authorizing the pledging of the State's credit for any purpose.

"Each voter shall strike out with pen or pencil the clause which he desires to vote against so as to indicate whether he is voting FOR or AGAINST said proposed amendment."

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for said election and to have same published as required by the Constitution for Amendments thereto.

**VA Regional Office Receives Large Number Of Claims For Compensation**

More than 250,000 veterans of World War II living in Texas, Louisiana, and Mississippi have filed pension claims, of which 118,752 were awarded pensions and 121,638 had their claims disallowed.

During the past three months the VA, on a nation-wide basis, has been adjudicating about 365,000 disability claims per month. Over 2,225,000 claims are expected to be adjudicated this year.

The VA has already paid out over \$500,000,000 to disabled veterans of World War II.

Disability pensions range from \$11.50 a month for 10 percent disability to \$115 a month for total disability.

There are also statutory awards for certain specific total disabilities, such as blindness in both eyes, loss of the use of both hands, or paraplegia (spinal cord injury) which may be as high as \$300 a month.

VA urges veterans who believe they are entitled to a disability pension to file their claims within one year from date of discharge.

Payments on disability claims filed within the one-year period begin from the date of the veteran's discharge. Payments on claims filed after that period start from the date the claim is filed.

Since the opening of the Veterans Administration Regional Office in Lubbock, June 1, the adjudication Division has received 4,488 claims for compensation pension. Of this number 3,042 have been acted upon to date, Benjamin O. Murph, Chief of Adjudication, announced.

This means that 3,042 West Texas veterans, or their beneficiaries, will soon know whether they are going to receive pension or compensation check from the Veterans Administration.

About two-thirds of the claims pending adjudication are awaiting additional information from the veteran, physical examination, or service records.

One out of every four veterans of World War II has filed a claim with the VA for disability pension, VA records show.

**HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION** proposing an Amendment to Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas by the addition of a new Section to be known as Section 49-b, creating a Veteran's Land Board and establishing a Veteran's Land Fund; providing for an election and the issuance of a proclamation therefor.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article III of

Tribune, Morton, Cochran County, Texas, Thursday, August 8, 1946

the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto a new Section to be known as Section 49-b which shall read as follows:

**Section 49-b.** There is hereby created a Board to be known as the Veteran's Land Board, which shall be composed of the Governor, the Attorney General, and the Commissioner of the General Land Office. The Legislature shall provide by law for the issuance by said Board of not to exceed Twenty-five Million Dollars (\$25,000,000) in bonds or obligations of the State of Texas for the purpose of creating a fund to be known as the Veteran's Land Fund. Such bonds shall be executed by said Board as an obligation of the State of Texas in such form, denominations, and upon such terms as shall be prescribed by law, provided, however, that said bonds shall bear a rate of interest not to exceed three per cent (3%) per annum.

"In the sale of any such bonds a preferential right of purchase shall be given to the administrators of the various teacher retirement funds, and the Permanent Free School Funds; such bonds to be issued only as needed, in the opinion of the Veteran's Land Board under legislative authorization.

"The Veteran's Land Fund shall be used by the Board for the sole purpose of purchasing lands suitable for the purpose hereinafter stated, situated in this State (a) owned by the United States, or any governmental agency thereof; (b) owned by the Texas Prison System, or any other governmental agency of the State of Texas; or (c) owned by any person, firm, or corporation.

"All lands thus purchased shall be acquired at the lowest price obtainable, be paid for in cash, and shall be a part of the Veteran's Land Fund.

"The lands of the Veteran's Land Fund shall be sold by the State to Texas Veterans of the present war or wars, commonly known as World War II, in such quantities, and on such terms, and at such prices and such rates of interest, and under such rules and regulations as may be prescribed by law; provided, however, that any such lands remaining unsold at the expiration of eight (8) years after the effective date of this Amendment may be sold to anyone as shall be prescribed by law.

"All moneys received and which have not been used for repurchase of land as provided herein by the Veteran's Land Board from the sale of lands and for interest on deferred payments shall be credited to the Veteran's Land Fund for use in purchasing additional lands to be sold to Texas Veterans of World War II, in like manner as shall be provided for the sale of lands purchased with the proceeds from the sales of the bonds, provided for herein, for a period of eight (8) years from the effective date of this Amendment; provided, however that so much of such moneys as may be necessary to pay interest on the bonds herein provided for shall be set aside for that purpose. After eight (8) years from the effective date of this Amendment, all moneys received by the Veteran's Land Board from the sale of the lands and interest on deferred payments, or so much thereof as may be necessary, shall be set aside for the retirement of said bonds and to pay interest thereon, and any of such moneys not so needed shall be deposited to the credit of the General Revenue Fund to be appropriated to such purposes as may be prescribed by law."

**Sec. 2.** The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held throughout the State of Texas on the first Thursday in November, 1946, at which election all voters favoring the proposed Amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the following words:

"FOR the Amendment to Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding Section 49-b creating a Veteran's Land Fund for the purchase of lands in Texas to be sold to Texas Veterans of World War II."

Those opposing said proposed Amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the following words:

"AGAINST the Amendment to Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding Section 49-b creating a Veteran's Land Fund for the purchase of lands in Texas to be sold to Texas Veterans of World War II."

If it appears from the returns of said election that a majority of the votes cast were in favor of said Amendment, the same shall become a part of the State Constitution and be effective from the date of the determination of such result and the Governor's proclamation therefor.

**Sec. 3.** The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election, and shall have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

**Sec. 4.** The sum of Ten Thousand Dollars (\$10,000) or so much thereof as may be necessary, is

hereby appropriated out of any funds in the Treasury of the State not otherwise appropriated to pay the expenses of such publication and election.

**S. J. R. NO. 5. A JOINT RESOLUTION**

proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas authorizing the Legislature to appropriate Seventy-five Thousand (\$75,000.00) Dollars, or so much thereof as may be necessary, to pay claims incurred by John Tarleton Agricultural College for the construction of a building on the campus of such college pursuant to deficiency authorization of the Governor of Texas on August 31, 1937.

**Be It Resolved By The Legislature Of The State Of Texas:**

**Section 1.** That the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding a new section, as follows:

"The Legislature is authorized to appropriate so much money as may be necessary, not to exceed Seventy-five Thousand (\$75,000.00) Dollars, to pay claims incurred by John Tarleton Agricultural College for the construction of a building on the campus of such college pursuant to deficiency authorization by the Governor of Texas on August 31, 1937."

**Sec. 2.** The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at the next general election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, A. D., 1946, at which all ballots shall have printed thereon:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment authorizing the Legislature to pay for building constructed for John Tarleton Agricultural College; and

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment authorizing the Legislature to pay for building constructed for John Tarleton Agricultural College."

Each voter shall mark out one of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed amendment.

**Sec. 3.** The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this state.

**Sec. 4.** The sum of Five Thousand (\$5,000.00) Dollars, or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the treasury of the state, not otherwise appropriated, to pay the expenses of such publication and election.
