Texas Suffering Worst Drouth In Ten Years

Texas is suffering its worst drouth in 10 years, the U.S. Weather Bureau says, and the picture over the state is one of dry farms, burning ranges, with. round 800. ering crops and thinning livestock.

The summer will go down as one of the hottest in history with temperatures eight and nine degrees above average. Spring brought no general rains to West Texas and the Panhandle. Except in southeastern and coastal bend counties it has been an arid summer-weeks of searing sun ernment print shops. and cloudless skies and teasing spotted rainfall.

With poor range conditions and critical lack of protein feeds, West Texas ranchers are culling their cattle herds and sheep flocks heavily. Many ranchmen are disposing of breeding animals. In the past nine months San Angelo has had two and onehelf inches of rain.

High summer temperatures are threatening to curtail further the state's second shortest cotton crop in 57 years. Last year's short crop of 1,784,000 bales was the lowest since 1889. There they are met by the south and southwest winds from Texas and this opposition causes day morning from George Mahon them to slip off to the east or to disappear entirely.

"Texas' main hope," said a forecaster at the Dallas weather bureau, "is that a tropical disturbance will form in the Gulf of Mexico and break up that high pressure area over Florida. Then we would get rain, plenty of

"A loan guarantee by the Veterans is a valuable credit privillege. Veterans should use it wisely. Only in extreme emergencies should a veteran consider using his loan guarantee at this time, since he has ten years in which to take advantage of it.

"Our office is at present operating under pressure of a reservoir of loans pending VA guarantee; however, in all cases it shall be our policy to see that the interests of the veteran are fully protected," Harvin concluded.

AUSTIN-In discussing the possible danger of inflation to the American way of life, Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer, has declared that he believes one phase of this menace which should not be overlooked is the danger of inflation in the incidence of disease.

"Just because we have won a war is no reason why we should allow the disease and death rates in the country to become higher than in recent peacetimes," Dr. Cox said. "Indeed, it is an urgent reason why we should sharply reduce these rates among our people and use every effort to keep the health levels among our civilian and military population at their highest possible peak."

WAA Will Collect Sales Taxes On Surplus Property

War Assets Administration will collect sales taxes from purchasand local governments which im-Robert M. Littlejohn, WAA Administrator, ruled today.

In the decision which settled a long-standing tax problem, Maj. Gen. Littlejohn pointed out, however, that the principle that WAA as a federal agency, cannot be constitutionally subject to direction by any subordinate governmental authority "must be recognized as remaining unimpaired". The ruling affects approximately 15 states.

Emphasizing that collection of sales taxes by WAA was a matter of assistance and cooperation rather than a requirement, Gen. Littlejohn reached his conclusion in the following statement:

"Such an undertaking on our part would entail considerable administrative difficulty with respect to our disposals. We have weighed our own burdens a gainst the benefits which the in terested local governments would derive and have come to the con clusion that we will subordinate our own difficulties in the inter est of maintaining good Federal State relationships and avoiding oss of this revenue to local gov ernments. To that end, we are prepared to undertake to collect applicable local sales or use tax es from purchasers of surplus for each local taxing property authority which feels that such collection is needed for its pro-

The ruling does not apply to state or local taxes which are imposed on sellers because WAA cannot be subject to such taxes. Procedures for tax collections







Increased movement resulted in lower prices for San Luis Valley peas and cauliflower and northern Colorado potatoes during the past week. Louisiana sweet potatoes also declined with heavy haulings in slow demand. Watermelons and cantaloups are at the lowest point of the season.

More liberal supplies of other meats reduced demand for poultry, but offerings continued liberal as farmers continued to cull out their flocks. Markets generally developed irregularities and slight easiness but most southvest buyers paid fairly steady orices. Eggs strengthened under good demand, shrinking receipts and moderate export shipments.

Grains eased slightly with most weakness on sorghums. Uncertainity regarding price control regulations after August 20 restricted trade in all gains. Prospects for record-breaking crops of corn and wheat also tempered the demand somewhat, though some anxiety developed over the continued drought in southwest areas. Early rice, about ready for harvest in the Louisiana-Texas area, is expected to meet a good demand with old stocks practically exhausted.

Oklahoma and Kansas growers sold a good volume of prairie hay to feeders throughout the southwest seeking supplies to supplement drying pastures. Where possible, however, farmers did without mixed feeds. This intensive resistance to the recent high price level, together with uncertainity about future ceilings, resulted in some downward adjustments.

roposing an Amendment to Arcle III of the Constitution of the tate of Texas by the addition of new Section to be known as and Board and establishing a leteran's Land Fund; providing or an election and the issuance f a proclamation therefor.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article III of he Constitution of the State of hereto a new Section to be hall read as follows:

Section 49-b. There is hereby reated a Board to be known as he Veteran's Land Board, which shall be composed of the Governor, the Attorney General, and the Commissioner of the General Land Office. The Legislature shall provide by law for the issuance by said Board of not to exceed Twenty-five Million Dollars (\$25,000,000) in bonds or obligations of the State of Texas for the purpose of creating a fund to be known as the Veteran's Land Fund. Such bonds shall be executed by said Board as an obligation of the State of Texas in such form, denominations, and upon such terms as shall be prescribed by law, provided, however, that said bonds shall bear a rate of interest not to exceed three per cent (3%) per annum.

"In the sale of any such bonds a preferential right of purchase shall be given to the administrators of the various teacher retirement funds, the Permanent University Funds, and the Permanent Free School Funds; such bonds to be issued only as needed, in the opinion of the Veteran's Land Board under legislative authorization.

"The Veteran's Land Fund shall be used by the Board for the sole purpose of purchasing lands suitable for the purpose hereinafter stated, situated in this State (a) owned by the United States, or any governmental agency thereof; (b) owned by the Texas Prison System, or any other governmental agency of the State of Texas; or (c) owned by any person, firm, or corporation.

'All lands thus purchased shall be acquired at the lowest price obtainable, be paid for in cash, and shall be a part of the Veteran's Land Fund.

itals now are working under the new program of cooperation with eading medical schools, accordng to a report of the VA Medical Director. Within six months the program will be operating in 65 to 70 of the hospitals. The new program consists chiefly of using he VA hospitals as "teaching hospitals" for grade A medical schools. The Medical Director cited the known fact that best medicine is practiced in such ospitals.

One million of the 1,600,000 eterans who came from farms vill return to the farm, 900,000 of hem as farm operators, according to a VA estimate. Citing the many pitfalls in trying to obtain farms at this time which would support veterans and their families, alternatives of formal education in agricultural schools or on-the-farm training under the VA program were suggested. A department of Agriculture estimate which throws a brighter light on the long run outlook for farmer-veterans is that 160,000 farm vacancies per year will occur during the next five years. This means 800,000 farm vacancies by the end of five years.

This week marks the first anniversary of V.J Day as well as the anniversary of the day General Omar N. Bradley took over the reins of the VA. On V-J Day there were 2,500,000 veterans of World War II, and it was evident that demobilization could turn into a flood. This was borne out by the fact that the number of World War II veterans has reach. ed the 13,000,000 mark during the past year. The first job faced by the General was to ready the VA to handle the tremendous load of work created. General Bradley states that he has spent a great part of the past year in this task.
