The Voter's Responsibility

The best assurance Americans can have of a democratic and efficient form of government—local, state and national—is that brought about by intelligent citizens who take pride in the right of the ballot and who select the candidate who represents their views.

That good government is a benefit resulting proportionately with the amount of intelligent voting has been proved. Too many officials are elected by voters who fail to take time to learn anything about the issues.

Too many voters can be swayed by one strong sentence from the tongue of a political henchman. Too many can be swayed by various other means. A voter who has kept himself informed and knows the records of past years will have opinions, and will vote his conviction on election day.

However, thousands tramp to the polls never knowing the issues, never knowing the candidate's platform or his past record. Eliminate that element of voters and many politicians would find it harder to fool most of the people, even some of the time.

With only two days left before the second Democratic primary, citizens are urged to study the qualifications of the various candidates who are in the runoff races in order that each may cast an intelligent vote. There are few races to be decided in the runoff; however, all are important offices and citizens should express their opinions.

At this time there seems to be little interest in the coming election, but it is hoped that a large vote will be cast on August 24th. It is each citizen's own responsibility.

SOUTH PLAINS HAS NO FEAR OF BIG BLOW

Cochran county rainfall from January 1 to present totals about 5 inches, according to reports from the Soil Conservation office. In normal years a total of 17 inches or more is usually expected.

"Tied down" also is the report from the South Plains, so far as soil erosion conditions are concerned.

Blowing of soil is not impossible, but highly improbable, according to a summary of crop and rain conditions in that area south of Amarillo, following a like survey on the North Plains on the previous day.

Not one instance of soil blowing, reminiscent of the dust bowl days of the 1930's, has been reported, despite the prevalence of drought.

In most cases, moisture is sadly lacking and crops are suffering, but in all cases reported the soil is holding due to modern farming methods following lessons learned during the dust bowl era.

Swisher County reports a rainfall of 3.4 inch on July 28 and 1.24 inches on Aug. 4, both considered a fair average throughout the county.

"There is no blowing of soil, since all fields without crops have been worked since the last rains," says the report. "Cotton and row crops, both irrigated and dry land, are above average fair condition. Crops will not suffer in the next two weeks without rain."

Lamb county reports no general moisture in the last few weeks, with only scattered showers in the north and west portions of the county. There has been no blowing of soil. Irrigated cotton and row crops are better than average. Dry land farms need

Heavy Absentee Voting Reported By County Clerk

Based on the number of ballots already received for absentee voting, County Clerk, J. B. Knox believes the second-primary absentee total may approach the first primary mark. Votes cast up to midnight Tuesday, total 85.

Actual absentee voting did not begin until Wednesday, August 14, altho ballots were delivered to county clerk's office late Tuesday for that purpose. The ballot committee of the Cochran county democratic primaries pointed out that it could not have official ballots printed until the state committee certified candidates at its meeting in Austin Monday, August 12.

If the ballots had been printed earlier, a change in the official tabulation would have thrown the entire absentee voting set-up in a turmoil, according to W. B. Evans, Cochran county democratic chairman.

Hot Check Artists Circulating In Texas

Mr. W. W. Williamson, president of Morton's First State Bank, has issued a warning to merchants and businessmen in and around Morton to be on the lookout for hot check artists who are circulating throughout Texas and who recently have passed forged checks in the Plains area.

Tucumcari, New Mexico, Amarillo, Childress and Memphis, Texas, report that merchants in each of those cities have been defrauded of money through the passing of bogus checks.

The checks used were regular commercial bank book checks, stamped with a rubber stamp and signed with a "company" name and "payroll" was also stamped on the check. Theoretically the "company" was supposed to have an account in a local bank in each of the towns but actually had no account in any of the banks.

Mr. Williamson warns all who accept checks to make the proper investigation before cashing checks for unknown persons with out the proper identification.

Irrigated Truck Farm Paying Off

The irrigated truck farm of Mr. J. I. Blanton, three blocks north of the square and covering 52 blocks, is paying off in the way of choice tomatoes, potatoes, onions, cantaloupes, beans, peas and cucumbers.

Mr. Blanton is assisted by his wife and son, Guy, in the operation of the truck farm.

Early in the spring the Blantons sold a large quantity of strawberries grown by them in their irrigated gardens.

The Blanton well was drilled last fall, with water being found at 202 feet. An electric pump pumps 450 gallons of water a minute through eight inch pipes to the garden that covers approximately ten acres, according to government tests.

In addition to the vegetables grown Mrs. Blanton has a beautiful yard with a wide variety of flowers in a mass of bloom at the present time.

In a recent interview Mr. Blanton stated, "I believe irrigation will more than pay for its self and I would like to see many more irrigation wells in this area."

Much irrigation interest is being shown in Cochran county with 18 wells scheduled for drilling by 1947 according to reports from the county agents office.

Deep well pumping pays off under proper management, says county agent Roy Hickman, Jr.

Management in all irrigation involves knowing when to water, what and how much in relation with the rainfall received, Hickman stressed. "It is impossible to determine how much crop a well will water, since rainfall is variable," he said.

Tubercular Cattle Test Being Made

There is a government veterinarian testing cattle in Cochran County at the present time for tuberculosis in order to re-accredit the county for T. B.

He will notify all of the farmers and ranchmen in the county as to the time and date he will be able to test their herds.

There will be no charge for this service, according to Roy Hickman, Jr., County Agent.

H. J. R. NO. 49 HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION

proposing an amendment to Article VIII of the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding thereto a new section to be known as "Section 7-a"; providing that subject to legislative appropriation, allocation and direction all net revenues derived from the taxes, except gross production and ad valorem taxes, levied on motor fuels and lubricants and motor vehicles registration fees shall be used for the sole purposes of acquiring rights-of-way for and constructing and maintaining public roadways; for the administration of laws pertaining to traffic and safety; and for the payment of principal and interest on county and road district bonds or warrants voted or issued prior to January 2, 1939, and declared eligible for debt service prior to January 2, 1945; providing that one-fourth (1/4) of such net revenue from the motor fuel tax shall be allocated to the Available School Fund; providing and insuring that each county shall never derive less revenue from motor registration fees than the maximum amounts and percentages of such fees allowed to be retained by each county under the laws in effect on January 1, 1945; negating any interpretation of this amendment as authorizing the pledging of the State's credit for any purpose; providing for the submission of this amendment to the voters of this State; prescribing the form of ballot; and providing for the proclamation of the election and the publication thereof.

Be It Resolved By The Legislature Of The State Of Texas:
Section 1. That Article VIII of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto a new Section to be known as 7-a and to read as follows:

"Section 7-a. Subject to legislative appropriation, allocation and direction, all net revenues remaining after payment of all refunds allowed by law and expenses of collection derived from motor vehicle registration fees, and all taxes, except gross production and ad valorem taxes, on motor fuels and lubricants used to propel motor vehicles over public roadways, shall be used for the sole purpose of acquiring rights-of-way, constructing, maintaining, and policing such public roadways, and for the administration of such laws as may be prescribed by the Legislature pertaining to the supervision of traffic and safety on such roads; and for the payment of the principal and interest on county and road district bonds or warrants voted or issued prior to January 2, 1939, and declared eligible prior to January 2, 1945, for payment out of the County and Road District Highway Fund under existing law; provided, however, that one-fourth (1/4) of such net revenue from the motor fuel tax shall be allocated to the Available School Fund; and, provided, however, that the net revenue derived by counties from motor vehicle registration fees shall never be less than the maximum amounts allowed to be retained by each County under the laws in effect on January 1, 1945. Nothing contained herein shall be construed as authorizing the pledging of the State's credit for any purpose."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Amendment to the Constitution shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at the General Election to be held in November, 1946, at which election each ballot shall have printed thereon the following words: "FOR the Amendment to the Constitution of the State providing that subject to legislative appropriation, allocation and direction all net revenues derived from taxes, except gross production and ad valorem taxes, levied on motor fuels and lubricants and motor vehicle registration fees shall be used for the sole purposes of acquiring rights-of-way for and constructing and maintaining public roadways; for the administration of laws pertaining to traffic and safety; and for the payment of principal and interest on county and road district bonds or warrants voted or issued prior to January 2, 1939, and declared eligible for debt service prior to January 2, 1945; providing that one-fourth (1/4) of such net revenue from the motor fuel tax shall be allocated to the Available School Fund; providing and insuring that each county shall never derive less revenue from motor registration fees than the maximum amounts and percentages of such fees allowed to be retained by each county under the laws in effect January 1, 1945; and negating any interpretation of this amendment as

Elliott W. Adams, manager of the Social Security Administration in Lubbock will be in Morton at the U. S. Post Office at 11 a. m., Thursday, August 29, for the purpose of assisting persons who have questions regarding Social Security; discussing possible benefits and taking claims from persons who seem to be entitled to benefits; and taking applications for Social Security account number cards.

It has been found through developing information pertaining to claims for old-age and survivors insurance that some employers do not understand that wages may include other items than cash. authorizing the pledging of the State's credit for any purpose.

"AGAINST the Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas providing that subject to legislative appropriation, allocation and direction all net revenues derived from taxes, except gross production and ad valorem taxes, levied on motor fuels and lubricants and motor vehicle registration fees shall be used for the sole purpose of acquiring rights-of-way for and constructing and maintaining public roadways; for the administration of laws pertaining to traffic and safety; and for the payment of principal and interest on county and road district bonds or warrants voted or issued prior to January 2, 1939, and declared eligible for debt service prior to January 2, 1945; providing that one-fourth (1/4) of such net revenue from the motor fuel tax shall be allocated to the Available School Fund; providing and insuring that each county shall never derive less revenue from motor registration fees than the maximum amounts and percentages of such fees allowed to be retained by each county under the laws in effect on January 1, 1945; and negating any interpretation of this amendment as authorizing the pledging of the State's credit for any purpose."

"Each voter shall strike out with pen or pencil the clause which he desires to vote against so as to indicate whether he is voting FOR or AGAINST said proposed amendment."

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for said election and to have same published as required by the Constitution for Amendments thereto.

Lubbock County Gins First Bale Of 1946 Cotton

Rucker brought the bale to Jones and McCoy Gin Company, Lubbock, where it was ginned at 3:30 p. m., August 15, three weeks earlier than last year's first bale. Rucker has about 90 acres of "dry land" cotton, it was said, and planted about April 9. He lives two miles south of Roosevelt school.

Last year's first bale was brought in September 5 by Ernest Exum from the J. E. Vickers farm, Lubbock, route 3. Exum received a \$50 reward and the bale was sold at auction in Lubbock for 21 cents a pound.

It is expected that Rucker will win his prize-winning bale around August 20.

Crimes In Rural Districts of Texas Are Increasing

AUSTIN—Criminals are preying upon the rural population of Texas at nearly double the rate of two and a half years ago, Director Homer Garrison of the Department of Public Safety declared today.

Garrison said rural crime increased 85.27 per cent from the first six months of 1944 to the first six months of 1946.

Biggest gain was in robbery, up 158 per cent. Another staggering gain was shown in burglary, up 112 per cent. Auto theft jumped 96 per cent; felony theft 61 per cent; murder and homicide 55 per cent; and rape 48 per cent.

During the same period crime increased 42 per cent in the cities. The overall gain for both rural and urban jurisdictions was 54.54 per cent.

Garrison said law enforcement officers are "holding their own against long odds," for arrests have increased in direct proportion to the gain in crime.

Convictions, however, are lagging behind. The penitentiary system received 930 new prisoners in the first half of 1944; 862 in the first half of 1945; and 1221 in the first half of 1946, Garrison said. This represented an increase of 31 per cent from the 1944 to the 1946 period.

H. J. R. NO. 62.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION

proposing an Amendment to Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas by the addition of a new Section to be known as Section 49-b, creating a Veteran's Land Board and establishing a Veteran's Land Fund; providing for an election and the issuance of a proclamation therefor.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto a new Section to be known as Section 49-b which shall read as follows:

Section 49-b. There is hereby created a Board to be known as the Veteran's Land Board, which shall be composed of the Governor, the Attorney General, and the Commissioner of the General Land Office. The Legislature shall provide by law for the issuance by said Board of not to exceed Twenty-five Million Dollars (\$25,000,000) in bonds or obligations of the State of Texas for the purpose of creating a fund to be known as the Veteran's Land Fund. Such bonds shall be executed by said Board as an obligation of the State of Texas in such form, denominations, and upon such terms as shall be prescribed by law, provided, however, that said bonds shall bear a rate of interest not to exceed three per cent (3%) per annum.

"In the sale of any such bonds a preferential right of purchase shall be given to the administrators of the various teacher retirement funds, the Permanent University Funds, and the Permanent Free School Funds; such bonds to be issued only as needed, in the opinion of the Veteran's Land Board under legislative authorization.

"The Veteran's Land Fund shall be used by the Board for the sole purpose of purchasing lands suitable for the purpose hereinafter stated, situated in this State (a) owned by the United States, or any governmental agency thereof; (b) owned by the Texas Prison System, or any other governmental agency of the State of Texas; or (c) owned by any person, firm, or corporation.

"All lands thus purchased shall be acquired at the lowest price obtainable, be paid for in cash, and shall be a part of the Veteran's Land Fund.

"The lands of the Veteran's Land Fund shall be sold by the State to Texas Veterans of the present war or wars, commonly known as World War II, in such quantities, and on such terms, and at such prices and such rates of interest, and under such rules and regulations as may be prescribed by law; provided, however, that any such lands remaining unsold at the expiration of eight (8) years after the effective date of this Amendment may be sold to anyone as shall be prescribed by law.

"All moneys received and which have been received and which have not been used for repurchase of land as provided herein by the Veteran's Land Board from the sale of lands and for interest on deferred payments shall be credited to the Veteran's Land Fund for use in purchasing additional lands to be sold to Texas Veterans of World War II, in like manner as shall be provided for the sale of lands purchased with the proceeds from the sales of the bonds, provided for herein, for a period of eight (8) years from the effective date of this Amendment; provided, however that so much of such moneys as may be necessary to pay interest on the bonds herein provided for shall be set aside for that purpose. After eight (8) years from the effective date of this Amendment, all moneys received by the Veteran's Land Board from the sale of the lands and interest on deferred payments, or so much thereof as may be necessary, shall be set aside for the retirement of said bonds and to pay interest thereon, and any of such moneys not so needed shall be deposited to the credit of the General Revenue Fund to be appropriated to such purposes as may be prescribed by law."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held throughout the State of Texas on the first Thursday in November, 1946, at which election all voters favoring the proposed Amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the following words:

"FOR the Amendment to Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding Section 49-b creating a Veteran's Land Fund for the purchase of lands in Texas to be sold to Texas Veterans of World War II."

Those opposing said proposed Amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the following words:

"AGAINST the Amendment to Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding Section 49-b creating a Veteran's Land Fund for the purchase of lands in Texas to be sold to Texas Veterans of World War II."

If it appears from the returns of said election that a majority

of the votes cast were in favor of said Amendment, the same shall become a part of the State Constitution and be effective from the date of the determination of such result and the Governor's proclamation thereof.

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election, and shall have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

Sec. 4. The sum of Ten Thousand Dollars (\$10,000) or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the Treasury of the State not otherwise appropriated to pay the expenses of such publication and election.

S. J. R. NO. 5. A JOINT RESOLUTION

proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas authorizing the Legislature to appropriate Seventy-five Thousand (\$75,000.00) Dollars, or so much thereof as may be necessary, to pay claims incurred by John Tarleton Agricultural College for the construction of a building on the campus of such college pursuant to deficiency authorization of the Governor of Texas on August 31, 1937.

Be It Resolved By The Legislature Of The State Of Texas:

Section 1. That the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding a new section, as follows:

"The Legislature is authorized to appropriate so much money as may be necessary, not to exceed Seventy-five Thousand (\$75,000.00) Dollars, to pay claims incurred by John Tarleton Agricultural College for the construction of a building on the campus of such college pursuant to deficiency authorization by the Governor of Texas on August 31, 1937."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at the next general election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, A. D. 1946, at which all ballots shall have printed thereon:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment authorizing the Legislature to pay for building constructed for John Tarleton Agricultural College; and

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment authorizing the Legislature to pay for building constructed for John Tarleton Agricultural College."

Each voter shall mark out one of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed amendment.

Sec. 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this state.

Sec. 4. The sum of Five Thousand (\$5,000.00) Dollars, or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the treasury of the state, not otherwise appropriated, to pay the expenses of such publication and election.

AUSTIN—Recognition of Americans who were prisoners of war was requested Thursday in Gov. Coke Stevenson's proclamation, setting aside Aug. 22 to 29 as Prisoner of War Week. ORDINANCE ORDERING STREET IMPROVEMENTS BY PAVING AND GUTTERING CERTAIN SECTIONS OF UNITS OF CITY STREETS, AND SETTING A DATE FOR PUBLIC HEARING ON CITY'S PROPOSAL TO FIX LIENS ON THE PROPERTY OF ABUTTING PROPERTY OWNERS FOR THE PURPOSE OF DEFRAYING A PART OF THE EXPENSE OF SUCH STREET IMPROVEMENTS.

This the 16th day of July, 1946, the City Commission of the City of Morton, Inc. convened in Special Session with all members of the Commission present, to-wit: Paul Arnold, City Mayor, T. L. McAlister, City Commissioner, and Lewis M. Smith, City Commissioner.

together with W. K. Whitman, City Clerk, when along with other business coming on for consideration there came the following:

WHEREAS, on the 15th day of November, 1945, the City Commission of the City of Morton, by Ordinance duly passed, called a Special Election to be held in and for said City, for the purpose of letting the resident property tax payers who were qualified voters of such City say by their vote whether or not the State Paving Laws should be adopted by the City of Morton, as such laws are contained in Articles 1086 to 1096, both inclusive, and Articles 1104 and 1105, Title 28, Cities, Towns, and Villages, revised Civil Statutes of the State of Texas, 1925, as amended; and,

WHEREAS, on December the 8th, 1945, at the Special Election called for such purpose, a majority of the votes at such election voted FOR the adoption of the Paving Laws, the returns of such election having been duly made to the City Commission of the City of Morton, and canvassed by that body, and an ordinance duly entered upon the minutes of such City declaring the result of such election, and adopting the paving laws in and for the City of Morton, Incorporated.

NOW THEREFORE, be it ordained by the City Commission of the City of Morton, Texas, in Special Session sitting on this the 16th day of July, 1946, that certain sections or units of certain streets in this City be paved and guttered in accordance with the plans and specifications of the City Engineer. Be it further Ordained that a certain part of the expense of such street improvements be assessed against the property, and the property owners, abutting on the streets herein ordered to be improved with paving and gutters. Be it further Ordained that the following 12 Paving Units shall be, and they hereby are, ordered improved with paving and guttering according to the City Engineer's plans and specifications:

UNIT NO. 1: Main Street from the S. E. corner of the Public Square to its intersection with Fillmore Ave.

UNIT NO. 2: Main Street from the S. E. corner of the Public Square to the N. E. corner of the Public Square.

UNIT NO. 3: Main Street from the N. E. corner of the Public Square to its intersection with Madison Ave.

UNIT NO. 4: West 1st St. from the S. W. corner of the Public Square to its intersection with Fillmore Ave.

UNIT NO. 5: Washington Ave. from the S. E. corner of the Public Square to the S. W. corner of the Public Square.

UNIT NO. 6: West 1st St. from the S. W. corner of the Public Square to the N. W. corner of the Public Square.

UNIT NO. 7: Wilson Ave. from the N. W. corner of the Public Square to the N. E. corner of the Public Square.

Veterans' Questions & Answers

Q. How can a veteran get assistance with his unemployment problems?

A. The veteran may consult a veterans employment representative in a local office of the employment service, a local service organization, a school or a community veterans center.

Q. Are there any penalties in the veteran accepts readjustment allowances to which he is not entitled?

A. Any veterans who knowingly accepts an allowance to which he is not entitled shall be ineligible to receive further readjustment allowances. Also, the law provides for fine and imprisonment for anyone who fraudulently obtains payment or makes a false statement in order to receive the act.

Q. Can a veteran have a loan guaranteed or insured to buy or construct more than a single-family home?

A. Yes, but one veteran can-

not get a guaranteed or insured loan to buy or build more than a four-family home. If more than one veteran is buying, then the basic four-family home is allowed for the group and this may be increased by one additional family unit for each veteran participating; thus two veterans can buy or build a six-family home, three veterans a seven-family home, etc.

Q. Does a veteran who is partially unemployed have a right to cause allowances to be issued to readjustment allowances?

A. Yes, a veteran who works less than his normal number of hours and who receives less than \$23 per week should inquire at the nearest public employment office of the state unemployment compensation agency as to his eligibility for partial readjustment allowances.

LEGAL NOTICE

H. J. R. NO. 10. HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION

proposing an Amendment to Article 16 of the Constitution of the State of Texas, by adding thereto Section 62 providing a Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation Fund for the appointive officers and employees of the State; limiting the amount contributed by the State to such Fund; providing for investment of Fund with certain exceptions; prohibiting recipients of benefits hereunder from receiving other direct aid from the State; authorizing counties to provide and administer such a Fund for appointive county officers and employees after favorable vote in a county election for such purpose; limiting the amount contributed by the county to such Fund; providing for investment of Fund with certain exceptions; prohibiting recipients of benefits from said Fund from receiving other direct aid from the State; and providing for an election, necessary form of ballot, and publication of the question of adoption of this Amendment.

Be It Resolved By The Legislature Of The State Of Texas:

Section 1. That Article 16 of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto Section 62, which shall read as follows:

"Sec. 62 (a) The Legislature shall have the right to levy taxes to provide a Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation Fund for the appointive officers and employees of the State; provided that the amount contributed by the State to such Fund shall equal the amount paid for the same purpose from the income of each such person, and shall not exceed at any time five per centum (5%) of the compensation paid to each such person by the State, and shall in no one year exceed the sum of One Hundred and Eighty Dollars (\$180) for any such person.

"All funds provided from the compensation of such person, or by the State of Texas, for such Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation Fund, as are received by the Treasury of the State of Texas, shall be invested in bonds of the United States, the State of Texas, or counties or cities of this State, or in bonds issued by any agency of the United States Government, the payment of the principal of and interest on which is guaranteed by the United States, provided that a sufficient amount of said funds shall be kept on hand to meet the immediate payment of the amount likely to become due each year out of said Fund, such amount of funds to be kept on hand to be determined by the agency which may be provided by law to administer said Fund; and provided that the recipients of benefits from said Fund shall not be eligible for any other pension retirement funds or direct aid from the State of Texas, unless the Fund, the creation of which is provided for herein, contributed by the State, is released to the State of Texas as a condition to receiving such other pension aid.

"(b). Each county shall have the right to provide for and administer a Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation Fund for the appointive officers and employees of the county; provided same is authorized by a majority vote of the qualified voters of such county and after such election has been advertised by being published in at least one newspaper of general circulation in said county once each week for four consecutive weeks; provided that the amount contributed by the county to such Fund shall equal the amount paid for the same purpose from the income of each such person, and shall not exceed at any time five per centum (5%) of the compensation paid to each such person by the county, and shall in no one year exceed the sum of One Hundred and Eighty Dollars (\$180) for any such person.

"All funds provided from the compensation of each such person, or by the county, for such Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation Fund, as are received by the county, shall be invested in bonds of the United States, the State of Texas, or counties or cities of this State, or in bonds issued by any agency of the United States Government, the payment of the principal of

and interest on which is guaranteed by the United States, provided that a sufficient amount of said funds shall be kept on hand to meet the immediate payment of the amount likely to become due each year out of said Fund, such amount of funds to be kept on hand to be determined by the agency which may be provided by law to administer said Fund; and provided that the recipients of benefits from said Fund shall not be eligible for any other pension retirement funds or direct aid from the State of Texas, unless the Fund, the creation of which is provided for herein, contributed by the county, is released to the State of Texas as a condition to receiving such other pension aid."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified voters of this State at an election to be held throughout the State in November, 1946, (being the 5th day thereof *) at which all ballots shall have printed thereon:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment authorizing the Legislature to provide a Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation System for the officers and employees of the State of Texas and authorizing counties to provide such system for the appointive officers and employees of the counties of the State of Texas," and

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment authorizing the Legislature to provide a Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation System for the officers and employees of the State of Texas and authorizing counties to provide such system for the appointive officers and employees of the counties of the State of Texas."

Each voter shall scratch one of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed Amendment.

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and shall have the same published as required by the Constitution for Amendments thereto.
