Erection of a large metal hangar was completed last week on the Cochran county air field, Location of the airport is approximately one and one-half miles northeast of Morton.

County Commissioners in a recent commissioners meeting agreed to plant the airfield in grass. The local Soil Conservation and triple A office will cooperate

Construction of and improvements are a part of the nationwide airport program for the coming three years submitted to Congress February 8 by the Civil Aeronautics Administration. A total of 306 airports including Cochran county airport, were recommended for Texas.

These projects were among a list of 4,431 for the nation as a whole which the CAA feels should be built or improved during the three-year period if the needs of cities and of expanding aviation are to be met.

It is estimated that the program would cost a total of \$985,. 400,000, of which the federal govand sponsors \$544,200,000.

Cochran County Airports is rated by the CAA as class I, that is a field with usable unpaved landing strip length 1,800 to 2,700

Lea Discovery, Ready For Pump, Kicks Off, Flows

Devonian Oil Company No. 1 Federal, section 19-9-s-38e, northeastern Lea County, N. M., San Andres discovery, 20 miles northwest of the Landon pool of Cochran County, Texas, Wednesday had kicked off and flowed 147 barrels of fluid, 14 per cent basic sediment and water and the remainder oil, in 24 hours.

Bottomed at 5,012 feet, operator acidized several times, but the well never maintained flow and pump was installed for expected completion. When operator went in to run rods to pump, it kicked off and started flowing, with the 24-hour gauge being used as potential.

During the next 24 hours, it filled the 250 barrels of available storage and was shut in. Flowing pressure was 1,200 pounds and at the end of the 48-hour flow had dropped to only 700 pounds. The discovery is thought good for a daily flow of 75 barrels.

VA warned that failure to do so jeapordize the veterans training eligibility rights, and under the law he will be compeled to return the monies to which he was not entitled.

Congress, as soon as possible, should place a limit of \$30,000,000,000 above which federal spending may not go. Ultimately, a budget of \$20,000,000,000 ought to be ade quate to run our federal machin-

Most citizens claim little comprehension of these astronomical figures. Twenty billion may seem more like measurements characteristic of distances to the stars. But the figure is dollars. This orogram of \$37,500,000,000 is \$9,-330,000,000 more than we spert for non-defense items in 1946, not counting interest on the national debt. Merely this increase n peace-time expenditures, excluding debt interest, is equal to the entire federal budget for the fiscal year of 1939.

To Get Taxes Down

Burdens on the nation's economy from federal taxation are estimated to be ten times as high as they were ten years ago. Tax relief is desperately needed now as a stimulant to the whole economy. But in the face of our huge war debt which calls for the earliest possible retirement, the only way we can have tax relief and debt relief too is to limit federal spending.

This astronomical budget means that almost \$300 is asked from every living American. It is estimated that such a budget would cost the average family \$1,000 in taxes this year. Budget in hand, your pencil will show you in short order that we have no better way to get out from under our tax burdens than to limit our spending. We may cut

our taxes without paying any attention to federal spending, but the outcome will be deficit spend.




