enter upon the discharge of their duties on the first day of May next following.

No person shall be trustee who cannot read and write the English language intelligibly, and who has not been a resident of such district for six months prior to his election.

Providing no person shall be qualified as trustee unless he is property taxpayer in the district to which he is elected and said district.

They shall immediately organze by electing one of their number president and one secretary.

The term of office of said trusees shall be divided into three classes, and they shall draw for the different classes; and one drawing number one shall serve for one year, and the one drawing two shall serve for two years, and the one drawing number three shall serve for three years.

On the first Saturday in April of each year thereafter, one trustee shall be elected who shall serve for a term of three years.

Said trustee shall first take the official oath and shall, as soon as practicable, file same with the county superintendent or county

All vacancies shall be filled by the county board of trustees for the remainder of the term in which the vacancy occurs.

The polls at said election shall open at 8 a, m, and close at 7



Plans for the nation's most ambitious annual cotton research meeting, the eighth annual Coton Research Congress which will be held in Dallas July 16, 17 and tees in Dallas Saturday, March

Burris C. Jackson, Hillsboro, general chairman of the Statewide Cotton Committee of Texas, Congress sponsor, announced that this will be the first general meeting of the committees planning the annual research meeting since their appointment.

Absenteeism of workers in coal mines had risen to about 25 percent, and this was reduced to 18 percent only in January, when the coal famine was already a reality. Productiv-

ity remained inexplainably low. Because there was a lack of national discipline, that is, the normal self-discipline common in America's industrial workers, coal was not coming from the mines. Parliament was afraid to discipline the miners to get coal. Parliament feared results at the next election. This explains why the labor government calmly watched the coal crisis develop, step by step, fully aware that it

#### **Lubbock County** Led In State **Cotton Producing**

During the decade 1937-1946. Lubbock County led the South Plains and Texas in the average number of bales of cotton ginned per year, with an average gin of more than 75,000 bales.

Second highest county on ginning of 64,715 bales for the ten year period. Other high ranking South Plains counties are Lamb with a 46,348 average and Hockley with an average of 46,-121 bales. Lynn County led the state in 1942 when 98,243 bales of cotton were ginned there.

Lubbock county ranked among the ten top Texas counties eight times out of the ten years and was first in the state four of those years, 1937, 1941, 1943 and 1944. In 1946, the county ranked fifth within the state despite a

In five years of the past ten, Lubbock County has ginned in excess of 80,000 bales. Top year was 1937 when a total of 163,500 running bales of cotton were ginned in the county, more than has ever been ginned in any other county in the state.

#### TREASURER'S REPORT

In accepting the office of treasurer of a club, it is not necessary to be a financial wizard, but a person needs to have a pretty good sense of arithmetic. There is nothing so hard as trying to balance books when one's additions and subtractions are inaccurate.

The treasurer of a club has many responsibilities. Some of the jobs are not always rewarding, but anyone with a flair for finance will enjoy this office.

One important job is the collection of club dues. The treasurer should have a members' book, containing the complete roster of members and a record of dues paid, alongside each name. Remember to record the date as well as the amount.

The treasurer is the only officer who can pay the club's bills. All bills, before they are paid, must have an official O. K. either from the president or vice-president, or, in cases where a large sum is Cattle sold at prices as high or to be spent, a vote of the membership.

A good rule for a treasurer to follow is not to pay out money until a bill has been presented. Vouchers which club members can use for presenting bills are handy to have.

Most clubs have bank accounts where the president's and treasurer's signatures are authorized for withdrawals, All bills, if possible, should be paid by check.

At the end of each month, the treasurer should balance his books and report the state of the club's finances at the next meettonio; while spring lambs turned ing. This report should give the amount of money received, paid out, and the balance on hand.


