"The objective of the Chapulepec Declaration is to provide for the maintenance of continental peace and security of the United States and the twenty other American Republics of the Western Hemisphere. It aims at the solidarity of the Western Hemisphere. In order to maintain continental peace, it is proposed hat an attack upon any one of the American Republics shall be egarded by all of the other naions as an attack upon its own ntegrity and security. This apolies both to attacks from without the hemisphere and within the hemisphere.

"A further purpose of the conerence is to protect democratic institutions and free government in this hemisphere and to prevent interference, infiltration or aggression by any nation of Europe or any other foreign power. The United States lifted high the torch of liberty in this hemisphere. With the revolutions of the Latin-American countries from Spain, governments were set up in this continent based upon a republican form of government and largely modelled upon the




