F. F. Roberts, C. B. Williams, J. V. McKay and J. S. Crockett Petition **District Court To Deliver Possession** Of County Hospital From Coop **Association to Commissioners' Court**

In a suit filed in District Court on Saturday, August 16, F. F. Roberts, C. B. Williams, J. V. McKay and J. S. Crockett petitioned the court to enjoin the Cochran County Cooperative Hospital Association from carrying out the terms of a lease granted on July 19, 1947, by Cochran County Commissioners' Court.

Leasing of the hospital to the Association followed an election held in Cochran county on July 5, at which time the voters favored leasing or selling by a majority of almost two to one.

The Commissioners' Court advertised for bids on leasing the hospital July 10. Notice to bidders specifically stated that all bids could be rejected at discretion of the Commissioners' Court.

According to a report given by the Commissioners' Court and published in the Morton Tribune on July 24, Dr. J. V. McKay offered \$3000.00 a year rental for the hospital and equipment. While the Association offered \$125.00 a month, payable in advance as rental, in combination with installation of several thousand dollars worth of essential equipment for the use of all patients and doctors who might wish to use the hospital. Coop Association also agreed to run hospital as open staff for benefit of public.

Weekly Cotton Market Review

(Texas and Oklahoma)

Spot cotton prices lost a little more than \$5 per bale from last week. Offerings were becoming more plentiful in south Texas markets. The demand was principally for the higher grades. Scattered showers were not generally sufficient to benefit cotton. The price in Dallas on Thurs-

day for Middling 15/16" was 34.30 cents compared with 35.45 cents a week ago and 35.70 cents a year ago. In the Houston market the price was reported at 34.40 cents and in Galveston at 34.30 cents. This compared with 33.95 cents and 33.90 cents, respectively, a week ago. The basis was reported as being erratic with rather wide variations be tween different sales. Rains in the Corpus Christi area and Rio Grande Val ley resulted in lower grades and current ginnings are running mostly Strict Good Ordinary to Strict Low Middling. Farmers were generally selling cottor soon after it was ginned. Demand for Middling and better was strong but these qualities were becoming scarce.

Picking and ginning made good progress in extreme south Texas. Considerable cotton was being snapped in the Coastal Bend. Early planted cotton was opening in central and north Texas. Deterioration was reported in most parts of Texas due to dry weather. Moisture conditions were more favorable in Oklahoma but rains would be benefi-

And be sure you don't wait too late to plant the frost-tender vegetables like potatoes, beans and

And don't fill up all your garden space now. Leave room for your later planting of spinach, beets, carrots, and lettuce.

When you start planting, put bit, and you'll have fresh vege. gone into Fair buildings. tables for a longer time this fall. If you want your vegetables to grow off fast and tender, apply four to five pounds of 5-10-5 commercial fertilizer to each 100 feet of row space.




