SAN ANTONIO-Next of kin of the war dead were urged today not to go to San Antonio upon receipt of the initial telegram advising them that the remains have returned to the United Stat.

"When the ship reaches the port of entry telegrams are sent to the next of kin advising them of the return of the remains", Lt Col. S. H. Partridge, Chief of the American Graves Registration Division at Fort Sam Houston, said. "The purpose of this telegram is to give the families ample time for funeral arrangements, to contact other relatives, and to give us a check on wheth er the next of kin will be available to receive the remains.

The remains do not reach the distribution center until 10 days or so after the ship arrives in port. It requires two or three free clinic of the Texas Scottish Rite Hospital for Crippled Children in Dallas, walks toward a huge mirror in the physio-therapy room. Sponsored by public donations, the hospital has aided many handicapped youngsters to weeks, after arrival at the distribution center, before deliveries can begin. Next of kin have come to San Antonio from considerable distance upon receipt of the initial telegram. Such a trip only adds to the expense and worry as there is nothing we can do for


So I went in by myself and sat in one of the seats for half the program, then moved over and sat in the other seat for the rest of the evening.


