

### March 15 Announced As Last Day To File Your 1947 Income Tax Returns

That's for the income you rereived last year.

No matter what Congress does about reducing this year's income tax, every person whose income in 1947 was \$500 or more must file a return with the col-

lector of internal revenue. A child with an income of \$500 or more has to make a return and pay his tax as a separate taxpayer even though his income may be received by his parents. However, parents can be held responsible for the unpaid tax of

a minor child. There is one class of wage earners not required to file a return but who should file in order to get a tax refund. They are persons whose income was less than \$500 in 1947 but who had taxes taken out of their wages. They get a refund because every person has a \$500 exemption from

Remember, no refund of tax is nade unless a return is filed.

Men and women in the military services below the rank of commissioned officer need not file a return reporting that pay. They must make a return, howeve.r if they received \$500 or more income from other sources.

Commissioned officers get a special exemption, they get a regular exemption of at least \$500 which applies to any kind of in-

Benefits received by discharged veterans under the GI Bill of Rights are exempt from tax and need not be reported in returns. It is unfortunate that the general public sees industry as making exhorbitant profits. Actually most people do not know that industry's profit level is as low is it is. Take a specific industry for example, According to surveys, many think the steel industry takes for profit as much as 25 cents out of every dollar of sales. This is wrong as can be. During the five recent "boom" years, just 3.5 cents out of each dollar taken in by the steel industry was profit. And much of this 3.5 cents was "Plowed back

### Slim Profits

We look upon steel as being he leader of our manufacturing industries. Steel is basic. It supplies the raw materials and semi-processed materials which are the chief need of manufact. uring plants today. Our daily lives are conditioned by the place of steel in modern civilization. This is one reason why we should be concerned about the decline of profits shown by the steel industry, on a long term basis.

For the first half of the period 1909 to 1946, steel's profits on sales averaged 10.5 per cent. But for the last half of that period (1928-1946), profits on sales averaged 4.5 per cent. During the twenty-year period from 1921 to 1940, there were twelve years in which the return on investment stayed lower than 5 per cent. In most of these twelve years, it was very much less. These figures are enough to show that our most basic industry is finding profits very slim indeed

### Profit Means Jobs

Why would the agitators like profits to be less? They would like to see the government "take over" any of our major industries. That would bring them a step nearer their own goal: "tak ing over." How has the profit of steel and other industries, despite big increases in sales, been kept so low? The main reasons: enormous operating costs and heavy taxation. Only a very large and efficiently managed industry
