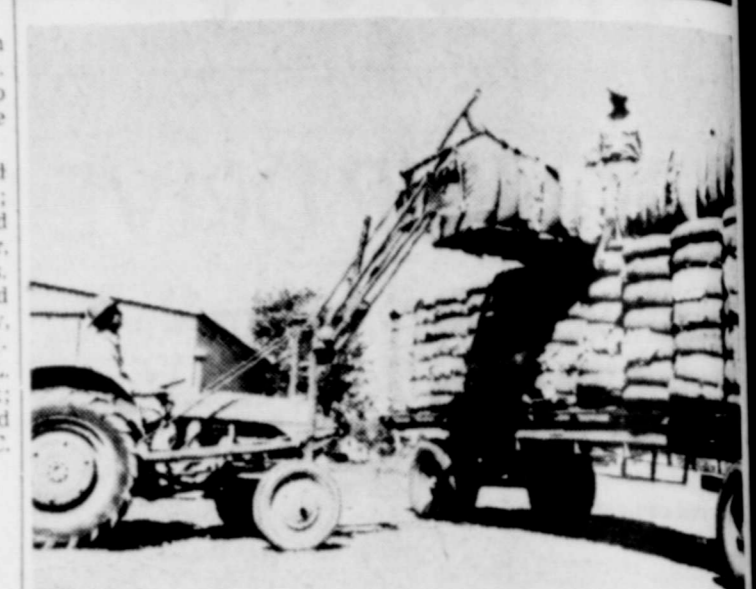

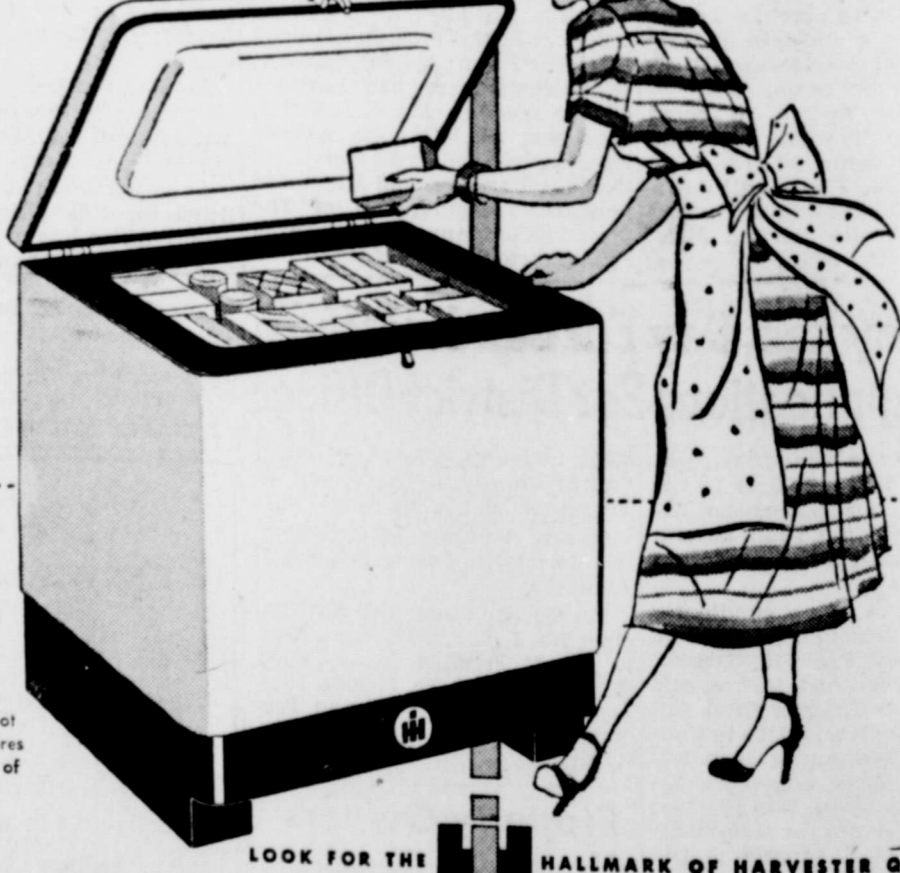

Williamson Urges Farm Customers To Establish Financial Reserves

W. W. Williamson, local bank president, urges farm customers to establish financial reserves in U. S. Savings Bonds. He says, "The laying up of financial reserves is more important to the business of farming than it is in any other type of business."

"In a factory or store or other business, the owners and stockholders supply the capital for plant and equipment and carry the risk on losses," Mr. Williamson said. "But farm people know that a farm is a combination of home and business and that the farmer has to finance his farm plant and the needs of his family from the funds earned from farm production. So he needs financial reserves for both personal and business reasons."

"This idea of laying up farm financial reserves is nothing new. Ever since the Bible days of Joseph and his seven bountiful years and seven lean ones, farm people have laid up reserves in good times and drawn on them in bad. But for centuries those reserves have been largely invested in land and livestock, the prices of which go up and down with prices of crop and livestock products. So when prices of farm products fell and farmers needed to draw on their reserves, they found that the selling price of their reserves had also shrunken badly."

"During World War II, farm people, and others of course, got into the habit of salting down money in War Bonds—the safest possible investment and one that will have a higher rather than a lower purchasing power in case prices of farm products go down. I believe that practice of putting farm financial reserves into the bonds of our federal government should be a definite and permanent part of the financial program of every farm family. I am not a farmer, but it seems to me that a financial reserve is just as badly

needed as a part of a well managed farm business as land, livestock, or a tractor. Farming is a highly speculative business at best, so farm people need to have their financial reserves in the safest possible form and where they will be readily available when needed. Nothing meets those two requirements so well as U. S. Savings Bonds.

"I imagine many of you already have a good nest egg in U. S. Savings Bonds. In fact, I guess our bank sold you quite a few of them. That nest egg of Savings Bonds will certainly stand you in good stead in case of a crop failure or sickness in the family or a bad run of some crop or animal disease. But how about a reserve against possible lower prices?"

"Changes in the general price level of the country have made and broken more farm people and other businessmen financially than any other economic factor. An individual farm family can do little about controlling fluctuations in the general price level. But building up a financial reserve in U. S. Savings Bonds when incomes are good will help to cushion any drop in prices that may come later."

"Now just a word about the bonds themselves. First, the bonds that are now available are exactly the same E, F, and G Bonds we bought during World War II and called 'War Bonds.' During this Security Loan Drive, they are called 'Security Bonds'—and I think that's a good name for them, too, for they certainly provide security for the future."

Antidote Found For ANTU Poisoning

A life-saving drug for domestic animals and human beings who accidentally consume ANTU rat poison was described recently in veterinary journals. A sulphydryl compound, investigated by Army research workers, was called an "apparently suitable antidote" for this type of poisoning.

ANTU, a highly effective rat-killing compound developed during World War II, causes an accumulation of fluid in the lungs and literally drowns its victims. Last year, a wave of deaths occurred among dogs and cats in a midwestern town following a rat-killing campaign in which this poison was used. People of the town had been erroneously informed that ANTU-treated food bait could be consumed by animals without harm.

During the war Australia woolen mills at Sydney expanded production to 750,000 yards of cloth annually.

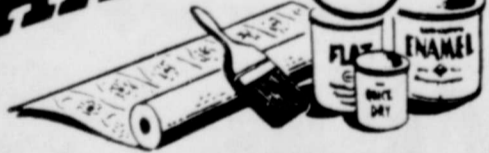

Suggestions On Prevention Of Poliomyelitis

AUSTIN—Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer, has issued the following statements and suggestions concerning the control and prevention of poliomyelitis which is now occurring in some sections of the State.

Strict sanitary measures should be observed in all communities. Eliminate rats, mosquitoes, and houseflies, and destroy their breeding places. Every effort should be made to secure approved garbage collection systems and safe water supplies. Where adequate municipal sewage disposal systems are not in operation, it is vitally important to maintain sanitary septic tanks and outdoor privies.

All swimming pools should maintain standards approved by the State Department of Health, which includes maintenance of proper chlorine level.

Only approved milk should be used, and raw foods and vegetables should be washed thoroughly before use, and protected from flies, filth, and insects. All food handling establishments should adhere strictly to the State Law concerning the sterilization of dishes and utensils. Those restaurants with insufficient personnel to maintain approved sanitation should close one or two hours a day so that employees can assist in maintaining cleanliness.

Over-exertion in children should be avoided, and they should not visit in homes where there is illness. It is advisable to reduce to a minimum all human contacts, especially in children during an outbreak of this disease. It is not advocated that schools, churches, and theaters be closed.

Early symptoms of infantile paralysis are headache, fever, vomiting, drowsiness, followed by stiffness in the neck and back. When suspicious symptoms appear, a physician should be called immediately.
