Perhaps it's because he was an actor first, and then later a politician, or maybe it's just because he has something to say. Regardless of the reason, California Governor Ronald Reagan makes a good speech.

Thanks to the generosity of Hereford's candidate for state representative, Frank Ford, we were able to attend the \$100 per plate function via press privileges last Friday.

Whether you're a Democrat or a Republican, you have to go along with many of the things which Reagan says, and you have to salute his courage for saying them.

Reagan prefaced his speech with some tongue-in-cheek remarks, which were about as good as the speech itself.

"I'm happy to be here in the Golden Spread," Reagan said. "This descriptive term could be applied to Washington if it were reversed - 'Spreadin' Gold,' the governor added.

"It's hard to blame the entire mess in Washington on LBJ," he offered. "With that kind of a mess, he had to have teamwork."

Speaking of Hubert Humphrey the liberal Democrats' candidate for the presidency, Reagan said Humphrey was "standing on his record. He'd better stand on it, and keep it covered up," Reagan said.

Hitting the theme of sound business practices in government, Reagan stated that not only had his administrations curbed the spiraling trend in government employment, but that since he had been governor, the number of state employees had actually declined by three per cent.

"When we mailed out our driver's license notices a month early, we were not only being efficient. Knowing about the pending postage increase, we saved the state a total of \$110,000 on this one mailing," Reagan said.

In a barbed jest concerning the postal system, Reagan pointed out that in 1920 it cost \$20.60 to call from Los Angeles to New York, and for that amount of money you could mail 1,030 letters. Today, the cost has been lowered to \$2.85, and you could now mail only 47 letters. "And congress will probably investigate the Bell system," Reagan quipped.

In developing the West, our forefathers had no government assistance, the Californian pointed out. "They called on God, not the Office of Economic Opportunity."

And speaking of God, Reagan says God isn't dead -- we just have trouble talking to Him at school.

"Today a civilian bureaucracy is planning to fight the next war with the last war's weapons. In testimony before a Senate committee earlier this month, Admiral Hyman Rickover accused civilian analysts in the Pentagon of 'studying things to death,' Reagan said.

Reagan quoted Gen. Curtis LeMay's book, "America is in Danger," as pointed out the folly of fighting a ground war in Asia on the enemy's terms, and letting the war so bankrupt us that we have abandoned the development of our military technology.

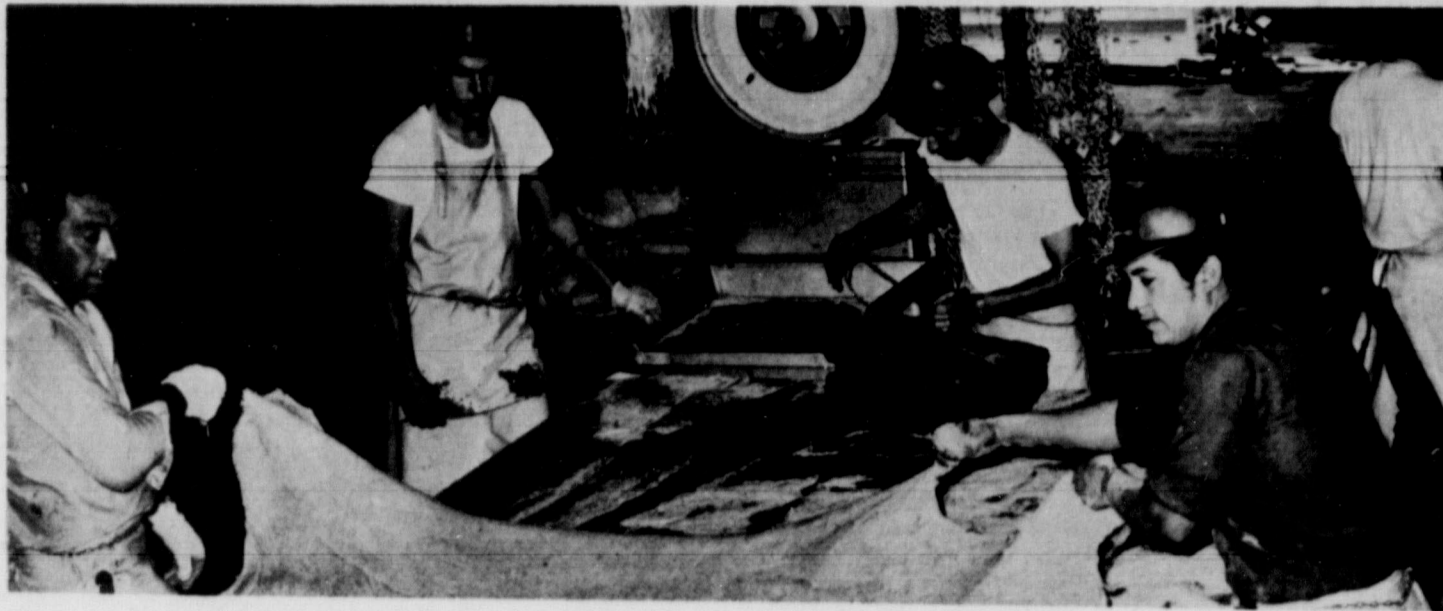
Governor Reagan was given standing ovations at his entrance, the close of his talk, and a time or two during the speech itself.

During the lengthy opening ovation, apparently some of the students attending the speech had worked up something special. One group shouted "Viva!" and another would respond with "Ole!" This was done a couple of times, and Reagan was definitely moved by the welcome.

At the reception earlier, the California governor had remarked: "If the prices I heard that you paid were accurate, then I appreciate each one being here. And remember, unless you vote right in November, those prices may become standard."

In preliminary remarks, state senator Grady Hazlewood of Canyon, a Democratic senator for 28 years, had explained his reasons for being on the platform with Reagan, a Republican.

Friona's summer baseball will come to a climax on Thursday, with the annual all-star games for the Intermediate and Pee-Wee leagues.

3.8-MILE SPUR

F-M Road Approved Past Feed Yard

The Texas Highway Commission this week authorized a new Farm to Market road connecting U.S. Highway 60 south to Farm Road 2397, east of Friona, a distance of 3.8 miles.

The new road, which will run adjacent to Friona Feed Yards, will cost an estimated \$210,000, or about one-sixth of the total expenditure of \$1,200,000 approved for the entire Lubbock District.

This road is a part of 39.6 miles of Farm to Market paving which was announced for District Five, and is a part of

826 miles of Farm to Market development in the state of Texas, including 545 new miles of paving.

Another eight-mile stretch of F-M paving, going south from Black and linking U.S. Highway 60 with U.S. 86, has been in the mill for some time, and right-of-way dealings are still underway for this road.

"We hope to be able to award a contract for the road south of Black sometime this year," District Engineer O.L. Crain told the Friona Star this week. Included in that project will be

a railroad crossing with flashing light signals at the Santa Fe crossing near U.S. Highway 60. The crossing will be located somewhere northeast of the present one, due to obstruction in the immediate area.

The roads mentioned above are used extensively by area residents, and are travelled by school buses and rural mail carriers.

Rhea E. Bradley of Littlefield is the Texas Highway Department engineer in charge of the work.

The new paving will bring the designated mileage of F-M road in the state to almost 39,500 miles. The Texas Farm to Market Road system is one of the most highly developed networks of rural highway facilities in the nation, exceeding the total mileage of the entire highway systems of most other states.

Each day during the school year, almost half a million Texas youngsters are transported to school and back home by an estimated 8,000 school buses. Trips to school and back daily amount to more than half a million miles of travel, much of it over FM roads.

Rural mail carriers drive an estimated 50 thousand miles a day over the FM-RM system. Impetus for the modern Farm to Market system was afforded by legislation passed in 1949 to "get the farmer out of the mud" -- to enable farmers and ranchers to get their produce and livestock to market and to provide adequate, safe highways for school buses and mail routes.

In recent years, many FM and RM routes have taken on additional roles, providing access to recreational areas, daily trips between urban homes and rural farms or suburban homes and urban employment.

Pause And Reflect

WASHINGTON, D.C., JULY 21, 1968, . . .
The smoke and flames have gone; the ashes are cold but the stench remains.

The mud holes are being filled, the bare earth is leveled and sheets of sod are laid but the scared tree trunks and broken shrubbery attest to the violence and vandalism of the recent occupants.

There is a tenseness in the atmosphere that is very real. Not too much is said about the recent burnings and rioting but when the subject is brought up the expression "national disgrace" is often heard.

The question that is asked is "Why was it not stopped in the very beginning?"

There is no clear cut answer. This writer talked to Congressmen, policemen, janitors, and anyone else who would stand still long enough to express an opinion.

The answer he got may not be correct but at least it was consistent -- "The police had orders not to take the steps necessary for riot control."

Second question - "Who gave these orders?"
Second answer - "The big shots from the cabinet and city government."

Perhaps the wrong questions were asked to the wrong people. Perhaps the answers are also wrong and meaningless but the fact remains that several blocks of 7th and 14th streets, just to name the two worst examples, were almost completely destroyed.

The calm waters of the once lovely reflecting basin are covered by a dirty scum.

The former site of "Resurrection City" is as bare as a section of burned over wheatfield.

Earth moving machinery, dump trucks and dozens of men are hard at work to eliminate all traces of the encampment. These efforts will be successful, a year from now all will be green and pleasant again.

But what of the scars on our nation's soul?
Buildings and lawns can be rebuilt.
A fire may be drowned.

What do you do to correct the fundamental causes of such actions by American citizens.

Here again there is no single clear cut absolutely correct answer.

We are a huge and complex society and it naturally follows that our problems are legion.

This is the challenge of the times. Our solution will spell over success of our future as a civilized people.

And now a look at the other side of the coin.
The huge public buildings are running over with employees and tourists.

There is so much to see and admire that only a personal visit of several days can hope to do justice to the capitol.

Thousands of Americans stand in awe before the Capital itself and thousands more pour in and out of the museums and galleries.

There is a seriousness about these visitors that speaks of pride in their nation's strength.

Here one may see tax dollars being spent and be glad to be a part of the whole undertaking.

Due to a kind Providence and to the wisdom of our Founding Fathers we have a choice in our national destiny.

Which will represent our capitol in the future -- the Hope Diamond gleaming in the museum or a dirty hunk of burned wood on 7th St.?

The choice is ours.

Rabies Is Not Licked, Health Official Says

Is rabies a thing of the past? Don't bet your life on it, says the Texas State Department of Health. Statistics and activities of the Health Department indicate otherwise.

"Rabies in man is always fatal," said Dr. James E. Peavy, state commissioner of health, "and for that reason prevention is the only cure."

A big step in prevention is vaccination of pets.

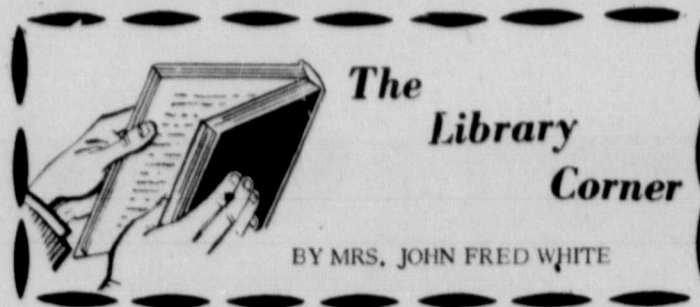
"Vaccination of pets takes on a more vital role when you come to realize that most rabies treatments received by humans have come from exposure or possible exposure to pets," said Dr. Peavy. He noted also that rabid pets normally expose the people closest to them -- their masters or neighbors.

Among the animal heads examined for rabies last year, 385 were found to be positive for rabies upon laboratory examination by the State Health Department. Another 16 cases were affirmed on military bases following examination at the Fort Sam Houston laboratories in San Antonio.

Of the 385 cases, 86 were dogs; 32, cats; 27, foxes; 152, skunks; 44, bats; 24, bovine, and 20, other species. Six horses and seven raccoons were found to be positive among the "other" species in 1967.

Communities and individuals have their greatest opportunity to prevent the spread of rabies among pets and on to humans by means of vigilant anti-rabies vaccination programs and stray dog control.

Health authorities feel that a community is adequately protected from an outbreak of rabies when 70 per cent of the pet population is vaccinated. But most urban areas in Texas have attained only a 10 to 15 per cent vaccination record.

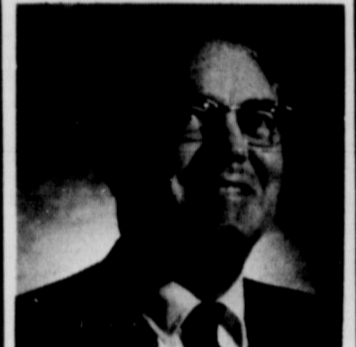

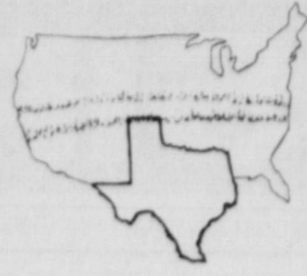
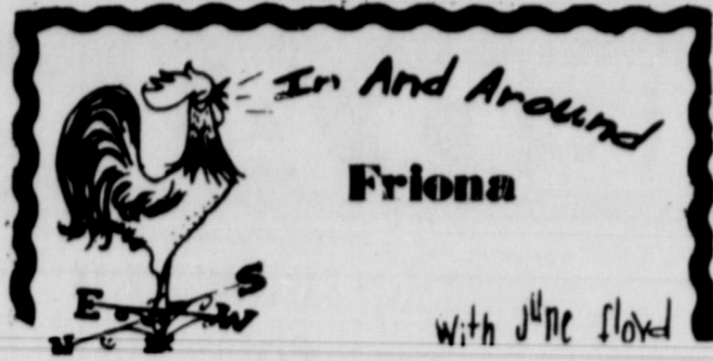

to sicken me. They say our unemployment isn't bad -- less than 3.8 million are seasonally unemployed. Yet, on the other hand, they say that 10 million people are starving to death. That means seven million people are working every day, yet starving," Hazelwood said.

The Canyon senator has wholeheartedly endorsed Reagan, and urges him to seek the presidential nomination.

Patrol Investigates 10 Accidents During June

The Texas Highway Patrol investigated 10 accidents on rural highways in Farmer County during the month of June, according to Sergeant W. E. Wells, Highway Patrol supervisor of this area.

These crashes resulted in one person killed, ten persons injured, and an estimated property damage of \$10,985.

The rural traffic accident summary for this county during the first six months of 1968 shows a total of 56 accidents resulting in three persons killed, 44 persons injured, and an estimated property damage of \$37,405.

"During the first six months of 1968 in Texas there were 1472 traffic deaths, or four less as compared to the 1476 traffic deaths for the same period of 1967," the Sergeant stated. However, if past trends continue the last six months will probably raise the 1968 total to

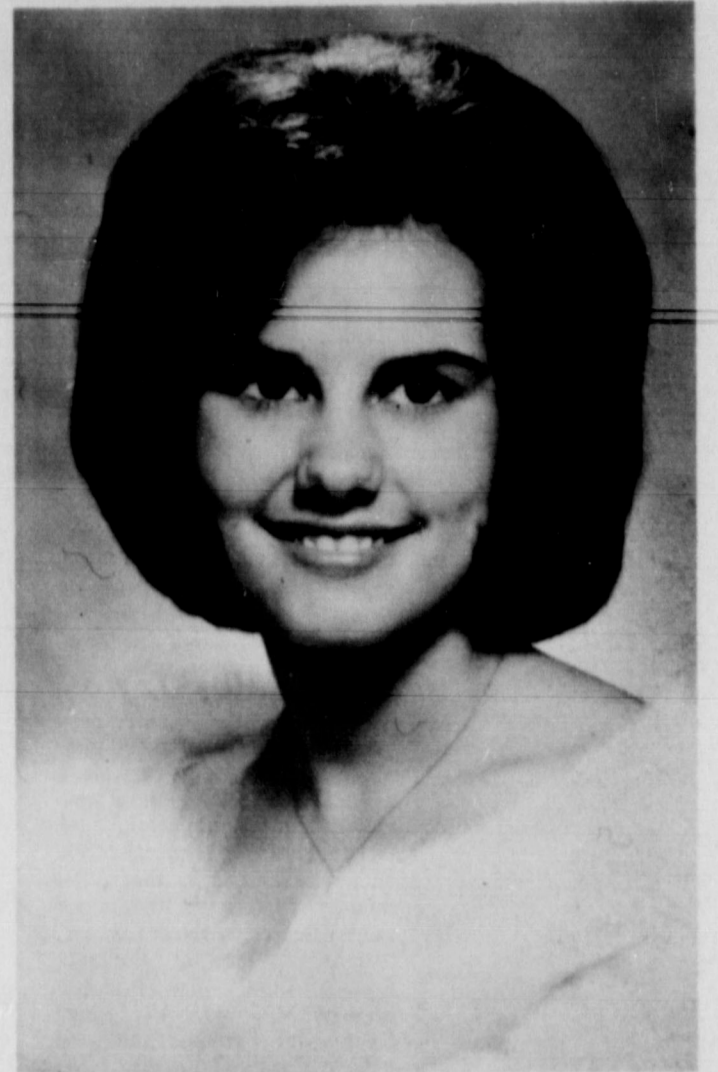

MBP Is Applauded For Water-Saving Practice

Missouri Beef Packers was saluted by the High Plains Underground Water Conservation District in its monthly publication "The Cross Section" for its efforts in conserving water.

The article pointed out that the presence of a good water supply, along with the location of several large cattle-feeding operations were factors in the company's locating in Friona.

Missouri Beef Packers has three six-inch water wells located on their property. This water is used profusely throughout the plant at the rate of approximately 432,000 gallons per day. This water leaves the plant carrying waste of all types resulting from washing and cleaning cattle carcasses.

The water goes into two settling lagoons, capable of holding 23,400,000 gallons of water. Impurities are allowed to settle out and thence the water goes into a very large plays lake. At least two farmers have installed lake pumps for the return of large amounts of lake water to their farms from this plays lake.

Records will be kept on how much water is ejected from the plant, quality of the water, and how many acres are being watered by these lake pumps and other pertinent information that results from this facility.

The paper published three photographs of Missouri Beef Packers, showing the plant,

settling lagoons and a plays lake pump.

It also saluted MBP for their excellent beginning, and for incorporating water conservation into their plans.

On The Farm In Parmer County

RONNIE McNUTT

A workshop set up to identify and solve specific problems in plant nutrition and fertilizer use will be held here at the South Plains Research and Extension Center, Thursday, August 1.

The day-long workshop, aimed at West Texas fertilizer dealers and agricultural leaders, will consist of two sessions and will begin at 9 a.m. announces Jim Valentine, area soil chemist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

The morning session will deal with crop production considerations as related to fertilizer use. In the afternoon, participants will receive first-hand information on diagnosing nutrient deficiencies and related problems.

Discussions on soil fertility, soil testing, weeds, education, research and coordination of the research-education effort will highlight the morning session.

Highlighting the afternoon portion will be a presentation on nutrient deficiency symptoms and herbicidal effects and how to identify these. Also on the agenda will be discussions on soil physical conditions and climate and diseases and nematodes. Demonstrations on tissue testing and on the effectiveness of soil testing will conclude the workshop.

A slate of noted speakers will headline the two sessions. They include such Texas A&M University officials as Dr. John E. Hutchison, Extension director, Dr. Morris E. Bloodworth, head of the Department of Soil and Crop Sciences; and Dr. Charles Welch, Extension soil chemist.

Officials from the SPREC on the program includes Dr. Arthur Onken, soil fertility researcher; Elmer Hudspeth, agricultural engineer; Dr. Robert Berry, Extension area plant pathologist; Dr. Charles Wendt, soil and water researcher; and Valentine.

Billy C. Gunter, Extension District 2 agricultural agent, will welcome the workshop participants. Chairmen for the two

sessions will be W.W. Grisham, Jr., Extension District 1 agricultural agent, and Tom Beck, manager of agricultural chemical sales, Diamond Shamrock Oil and Gas Corp., Amarillo.

The workshop is being jointly sponsored by the Texas Plant Food Educational Society and Texas A&M's Agricultural Extension Service and Agricultural Experiment Station in support of the Panhandle Economic Program (PEP) and the South Plains Development Program (SPD).

The show, scheduled Sept. 28 last day of the weeklong fair run, will be offering premiums totaling \$2,150, including added money.

Cecil A. Hurley, of Yantis, owner of the Bar L. Stables there and widely known quarter horse breeder, will judge the one-day event.

Other show officials include Clyde Fort of Lubbock, superintendent, Bill Phinizy of Guthrie and Ken Cook of Silverton, assistant superintendents; and Tommy Buckner of Levelland, secretary.

1969 Wheat Program Announced By ASC

Farm wheat allotments will be 13 per cent less in 1969 than in 1968, Prentice Mills, Parmer County ASCS office manager, announced this week as details of the government wheat program for next year were made available.

"It's reduction in allotment makes necessary a diversion program similar to that of '66," Mills said.

There will be diversion payments from wheat below the farm allotment. The 1969 program again provides for price support loans, marketing certificates and substitution between wheat and feed grain.

Program options, as explained by Mills, include the following three:

1. A farmer can sign up in the program, divert to a conserving use an acreage equal to 15% of the 1969 farm allotment, and plant his full wheat allotment. By signing up this way, the farmer would earn his wheat certificate payment.

2. A farmer can elect to plant less than his full allotment, earn diversion payments and qualify for certificate payments. At least 43% of the farm allotment must be planted to qualify the farm for maximum certificate payments.

3. A farmer can, if he so desires, sign up to divert as much as 50% of his wheat allotment (in addition to the minimum diversion requirement) and receive a diversion payment on each acre of wheat allotment diverted. The diversion payment rate per acre is determined by multiplying 50% of the county wheat loan rate times the farm's projected yield. The Parmer County Loan Rate is \$1.26 per bushel. Therefore, to arrive at the diversion rate for a farm, you would multiply the farm yield by 63%. Certain small farms could be signed up to divert more than 50% of the farm allotment for payment.

Premiums of \$35, \$25, \$20, \$10, and \$5 will be awarded to the first six places in halter and performance competition. Halter classes include 1968 stallions, 1967 stallions, 1966 stallions, 1965 stallions, stallion foaled 1964 and before, grand champion stallion and reserve champion stallions; 1968 mares, 1967 mares, 1966

mares, 1965 mares, mares foaled 1964 and before, grand champion mare, reserve champion mare; 1967 geldings, 1966 geldings, geldings foaled 1964 and before, grand champion gelding and reserve champion gelding. Banners will be awarded to the grand and reserve champions and a \$50 premium also will go to the class champions.

Performance classes include junior western pleasure, foaled 1964 or later; senior western pleasure, foaled 1963 or before; junior reining, foaled 1964 or later, senior reining, foaled 1963 or before; pole bending; and barrel racing.

Friday, stops are slated at Hub (8:45-9:45), White's Elevator (10-11 a.m.), Lazbuddie, (12 noon-1 p.m.) and Clay's Corner (1:15-2:15).

Then on Saturday, the Bookmobile makes its regular stop in Friona from 1-4 p.m. at the City Park.

New Medicare Forms Available In This Area

A new easy-to-complete form to collect medical insurance benefits under Medicare is now available. The Request for Payment form is used for claims under the voluntary doctor bill insurance part of the Medicare program, according to Wayne Klipping, social security Field Representative for this area. People 65 and over who have enrolled will get payment for 80 per cent of their doctor bills and certain other medical expenses, after having met the first \$50 of these expenses.

"There are two ways to claim payment for doctor bills and other medical services under Medicare," Klipping said. "The Request for Payment form is used for either method. Under one method, the doctor (or other supplier of services) may collect the Medicare payment directly from Medicare. If he agrees to do so, he accepts the reasonable charge as determined by the Medicare carrier as his full charge."

"The second method is for the patient to apply for the payment. Under the new law the patient can apply even if he has not yet paid his bill. The patient needs to get an itemized statement (paid or unpaid) from his doctor and submit it with the Request for Payment form (SSA-1490)."

These forms may be secured by contacting Klipping in the Council Room at the City Hall from 9 a.m. until noon on the third Tuesday of each month.

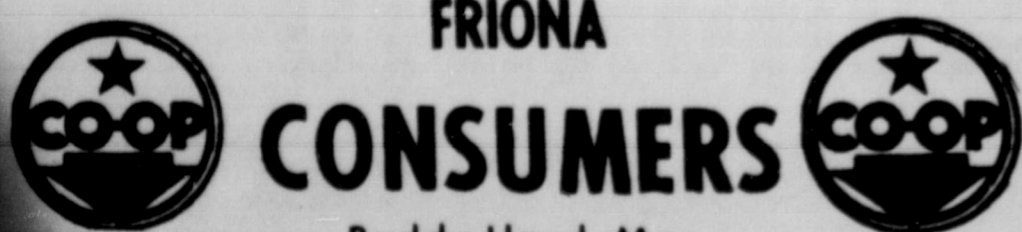

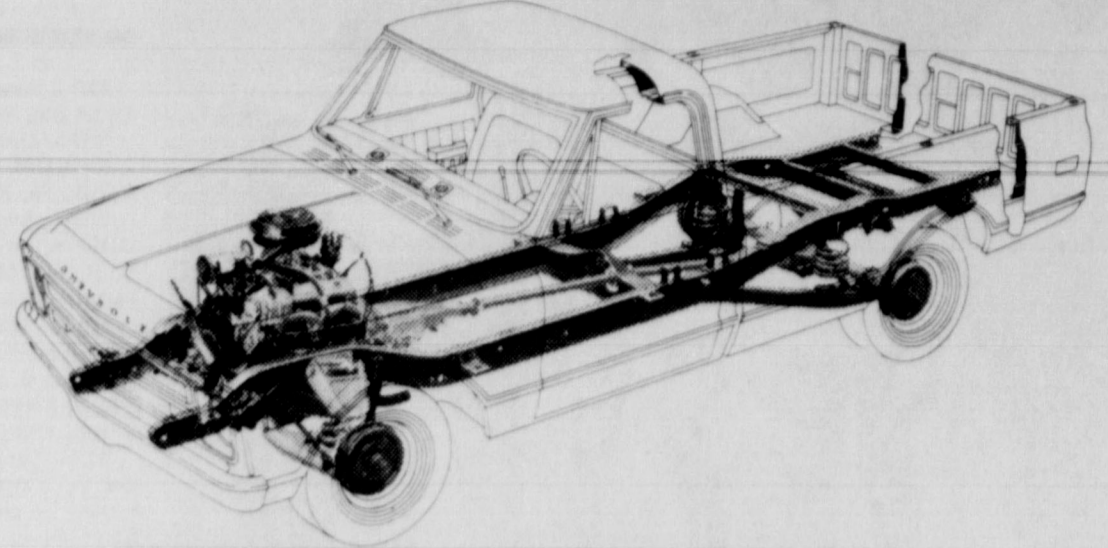

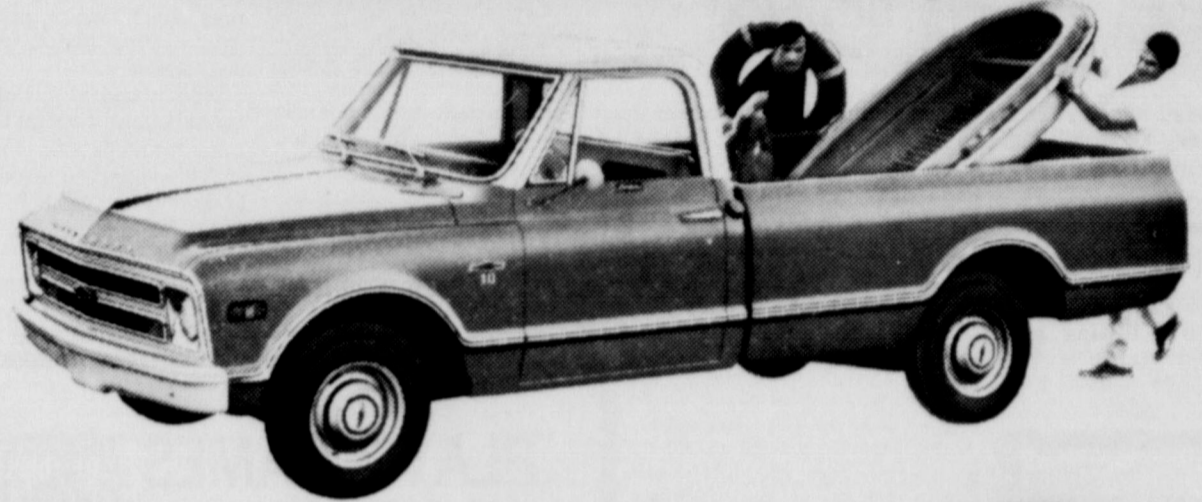
