Stolen Safe Belonging To Lubbock Firm Found On Ranch Near Morton A steel safe, stolen from a Lub

bock business firm, was recovered near Morton last week, according to the Sheriff's depart-

Deputy Sheriff Herman Crockett reported that two local surveyors, Bill Langley and Boyd Thompson, discovered the safe while running a survey on the F. O. Masten ranch about twenty miles south and west of Morton and reported the incident to the local officials.

Sheriff Hancock, Crockett, two Highway Patrolmen and the two surveyors returned to the ranch and began an investigation. The safe, an ancient affair, was about three feet square. The door had been forced and the contents scattered.

The safe is the property of the City Steam Laundry of Lubbock. The concern reported the safe stolen the night of November 5. It was found December 9 and apparently only \$200.00 in cash and \$150.00 in checks and \$100.00 in bonds are missing.

Crockett said a list of the contents when stolen included \$3, 600 in Government bonds, \$500.00 in checks and \$200.00 in cash. Checks and bonds were blown from the safe by the wind and scattered over the pasture. All the checks may have been unmolested, Crockett, since the wind could have blown them away and the \$100.00 bond could open safe.

An ordinance prohibiting soliciters, peddlers, itinerant merchants and vendors of merchandise from using the public square in the city of Morton as a place to sell goods, wares, and merchandise, or to take orders therefor in said place: Providing a permit: Fixing a penalty: and declaring an emergency.

Be it Ordained by the City ommission of the City of Moron. Texas:

SECTION 1: That after the passage of this ordinance it shall be unlawful for any soliciter, peddlers, itinerant merchant and vendor or merchandise to use the public square in the City of Morton. Texas, for the purpose of selling, delivering and taking orders for goods, wares, and merchandise; and the use of the public square shall mean all parking area in and around the Courthouse on both sides of each street and highway surrounding

SECTION 2: From and after the passage of this ordinance it shall be unlawful for any soliciter, peddler, itinerant merchant vendor or merchandise to sell, offer for sale, and to deliver any goods, wares and merchandise within the corporate boundaries of the City of Morton, Texmet from the City Secretary of Motor Company. the City of Morton, Texas, for

SECTION 5: use of the public square in the City of Morton by soliciters, peddlers, and itinerant merchants and vendors of goods, wares and merchandise has caused, and is causing a traffic hazard and endangering the safety of the citizens of Morton, Texas, and ail other persons using the public streets around the public square for parking and thoroughfares. creates an emergency and public necessity, demanding that the rule requiring the reading of this ordinance on more than one day before final passage, be suspended, and such rule is hereby suspended and it is ordained that this ordinance shall take effect and be in force immediately upon its passage and adoption. 

LABOR STATESMANSHIP

One branch of America's organized labor, the Congress of Industrial Organizations, has made a move that puts it in the same class with great statesmen. You might not expect these large groups, organized for wage bargaining with industry, to enter the field of international relations. Yet the CIO, meeting recently in its yearly convention, did much to strengthen the hand of our government for the grow ing struggle in Europe.

Not Russia's Tool






