Many young folks who are now old, have rode fifty miles horseback to dance "Turkey in the Straw" till daylight. These people to a great extent now days represent our very best citizens. Religion was not ignored. The young people of today think of God just as strong as your ancestors or mine ever

did. We today have more problems associated to young people. A great many of these problems result from the places these young people go and who they associate with.

It is up to us elders to furnish the right associates, the right place for recreation, and the right sponsors for this recreation. It has come to this columns attention that dances should not be held in our school gymnasium. The one thing this column can not understand is, if dances in our gymnasium are harmful why do the greatest majority of our finest colleges, and universities allow dances in their schools. The day will come when it will be a problem to find a school to send our youth to that does not have dances for recreation. We have a progressive school. We have a good school board, we have a good superintendent, we have good teachers. Our school is modern. Lets keep the young folks in it. Far better to keep our kids in the gymnasium dancing, occasionally throughout a year, celebrating their school events, then having them speeding through the night on a car-crashing highway to some bawdy honk-a-tonk.
