Topping Will Soon be Complete on Farm-to-Market Road North of Here

It was announced Thursday by County Judge Glenn Thompson that topping will soon be complete on the farm to market road starting one mile north of Morton and running four miles to the east. He said that preparations were also nearly complete to top the road in front of the hospital from the Plains Highway to the Levelland Highway.

Thompson also stated that the county has been carrying on an extensive road patching and repairing program although they have been hampered to some extent by bad weather. Sixteen miles of road have been partially patched to date. The center of the road has been completed as this portion carries the bulk of the traffic. The patching of the sides of the roads will be done as soon as possible.

Thompson asked that it be brought to the attention of the farmers that locking one wheel of a tractor while turning during hot weather causes considerable damage to a road due to its soft condition.

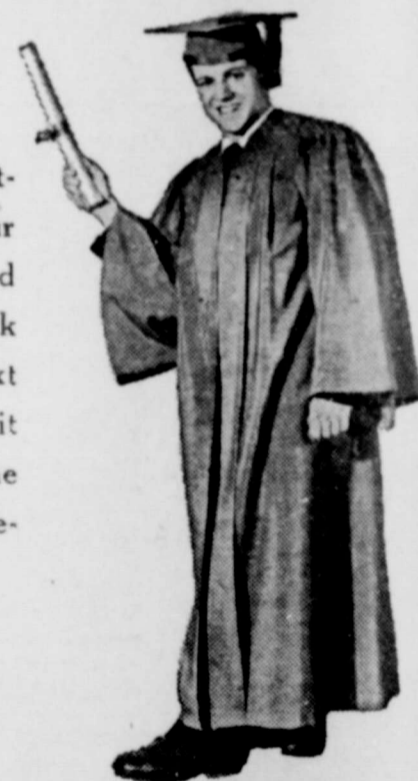

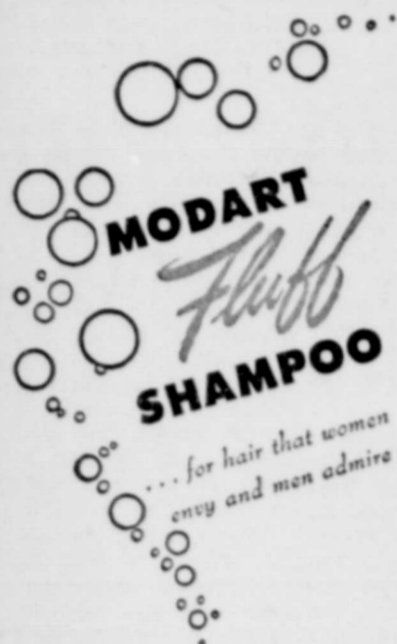

Nearly every farmer has a smile on his face these days and he has a right to wear it for he has sweated out a lot of bad dust storms and is now enjoying some good moisture. In the Panhandle though there is some worry for fear too much rain will damage the wheat. Otherwise the Panhandle is prophesying ninety to ninety-five million bushels of wheat this year. This is to fifty-six million last year.

It is said in the U. S. News and World Report for May 6th-1949 that "The youth graduating from college this year is to find the going harder than in recent years. Jobs of the kind desired are not as easy to find except for top-ranking graduates of technical schools. Pay is to be higher for some who find jobs but probably not as high for the majority. Colleges will turn out in June a record crop of graduates. The estimate is that about 338,000 diplomas will be awarded, 19,000 more than last year. Next year the crop maybe even larger. Yet the number of jobs awaiting graduates is declining and is sharply lower than in 1948." This report brings a question to us people in this community. 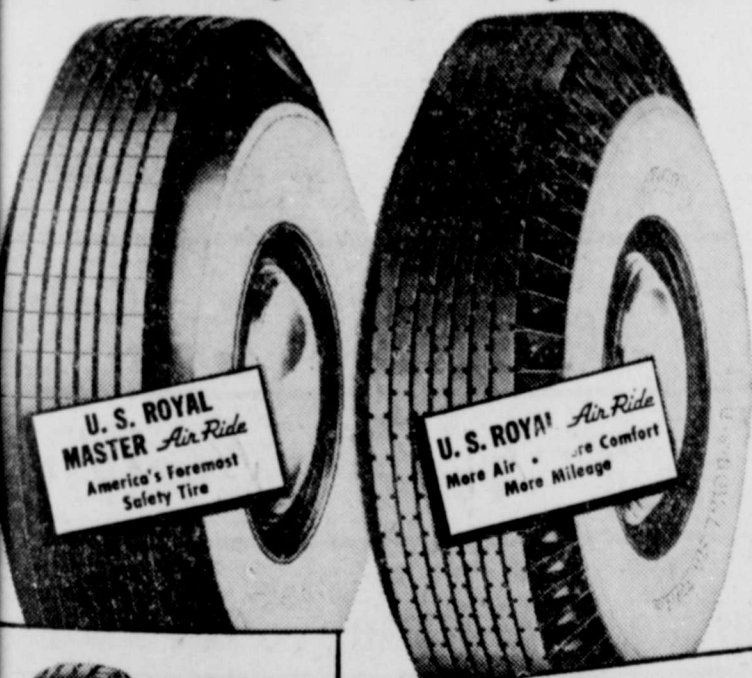
