

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

"At a recent newspaper convention," Editor Joiner writes, successful publisher warned less successful publishers that if they wanted to make money, and be popular in their communities, they should 'avoid crusading' and devote time and talent to keeping people happy.

"People, he indicated, have little respect for editors who take nd in the cleaning up of their towns, or who fail to ignore coron in high places. What people want is plenty of comic strips, ts pages, jokes (at somebody else's expense), church and Sun-School sermons, recipes, how to renew old furniture, how to for dogs, good gardening features, dressmaking ideas, weds, market quotations, tirades against Socialism and Joe Stalin an occasional glorification of the local businessmen.

"Everything, that is, except any hint of truth regarding taxes, enforcement, crime, corruption, or an occasional new idea. 'Keep happy," the publisher said.

"So happy," queries Editor Joiner, "that when their liberty and freedom are yanked out from under them they won't know what hit'em?"

We think Editor Joiner has a point there. , and a good one on't know who the publisher is whom he's quoting. We do that there are newspapermen of that type, though we'd like leve they're in the minority.

We do not agree with the anonymous publisher, either in his e (that a successful newspaper must step on no toes) or his sion (that if it does, it's signing its own death warrant).

We believe that in return for our cherished privilege of a free we owe certain obligations to the public: to keep our readers ed of events in our community and conditions in our govern-Being entirely human and having little faith in our ability to miracles, we wouldn't even undertake to carry out the advice Editor Joiner's anonymous publisher "to keep everybody happy."
