A highlight of our Panhandle Press Association convention the past weekend was the report by Former Texas Attorney-General John Ben Shepard and Maxie Davis from the West Texas Chamber of Commerce on the plight of the small town in West Texas.

The West Texas Chamber has just concluded and published results of an extensive survey concerning towns in West Texas. The group has listed the chief problems of our small towns, and listed some steps they need to take if they are to survive.

We're going to attempt to list some of the highlights of the presentation, in hopes that we in Friona can derive something which will do us some good.

Seventy-five per cent of the West Texas towns with population of 12,000 and under lost population in the past 20 years, the report shows. It is predicted that 260 towns in the state will completely die by the year 2000, unless the trend is reversed.

It is up to the community leaders in towns such as Friona to assure that it will not be one of the 260 communities spoken of above.

The people in West Texas need to adopt a positive attitude about our area, the chamber officials pointed out. We have a bad reputation to begin with -- from the standpoint of weather, culture and recreation facilities. This makes it harder for our area to secure new industries and businesses than other parts of our state.

The truth of the matter is that our climate, recreational and cultural facilities are not that bad, it was stressed. We have more recreation than many areas; our cultural aspects are improving, and we have a moderate climate with cool nights.

The biggest problem facing the small town in West Texas, according to the WTCC "Task Force" is the lack of proper leadership.

According to the report, towns usually have a lack of aggressive and informed leadership, a lack of motivation in its present leadership, or selfish interests are the motivating factors behind the leadership.

We have a lack of intra-community communication between individuals and organizations, the report said. Also, we fail to develop potential leadership in a small town. Sometimes we completely overlook women and young people for their leadership potentials, it was pointed out.

Our failure to cooperate with neighboring communities was also pointed out. "Usually we're still fighting with each other like they were still on the football field," it was observed.

Reasons were cited why small towns fail to attract industry. They included such trivial reasons as failure to respond to inquiries and not compiling statistical information to not keeping contacts private and not cooperating.

Communities have to spend money to attract industries, it was pointed out. Industries don't just come. They have to be convinced that a town is the best location, and they will make profit there.

Many cities are giving land, services, etc., to attract industries to their communities. This is one way communities can overcome what disadvantages they may have.

The best type of industries for the West Texas area, according to the survey, are agricultural processing industries. This is seen in the number of such industries which have come into our area in the last few years.

However, the report stressed that recreation and tourism are possibly our greatest potential for new dollars for the small town. Tourism is one of the nation's leading industries, and the small towns should take steps to get their share of the tourist dollar.

One thing small towns need to do is to reverse the trend and keep more young people. They should be made to realize that small towns are a wonderful place in which to live and raise their families.

Also, we need to continually

Patrol Investigates 12 County Rural Accidents

The Texas Highway Patrol investigated 12 accidents on rural highways in Farmer County during the month of March, according to Sergeant W.E. Wells, Highway Patrol Supervisor of

this area. These crashes resulted in one person killed, persons injured and an estimated property damage of \$8,990.

The rural accident summary for the county during the first three months of 1967 shows a total of 24 accidents resulting in one persons killed, 11 persons injured, and an estimated property damage of \$15,430.

The final entry in the 1966 Texas traffic records has been entered and closed. An all-time record high of 3,406 persons killed, 208,310 persons injured, and an estimated property loss of \$557,414,000 was sustained. This compares to the 1965 record of 3,028 persons killed, 186,062 injured, and an estimated property damage of \$98,070,000.

Since the death count of 2,254 in 1960, Texas has gained steadily each year. The Sergeant stated, "If the death rate increases during the last four years of this decade as it has during the first years, the death count will stand at 4,745 in 1970's." What is the solution? Irrigation Article Is Featured In Magazine

Irrigation farmers will be interested in the article, "Here's How To Stretch Your Water," in the May issue of The Progressive Farmer magazine. Declining water supplies make it necessary for producers to extend their water supply as long as possible through management practices.

Some suggestions to conserve valuable water are the following:

- (1). Don't overwater. The water need not penetrate deeper than the soil root zone.
- (2). Time the irrigations when they will be of most value to each crop. In addition to pre-plant irrigation for cotton, the most important time is peak bloom. Critical stages of grain sorghum are at boot, bloom, and soft-dough. Soybeans need water at bloom and 20 days later. Best water use for wheat is pre-plant, jointing, boot and heading stages.

(3) Irrigation patterns and methods may save water and still get maximum yields. Skip-row planting in cotton has been successful. Variable - row planting of cotton cuts down on water. Narrow - row spacing may increase grain sorghum yields. Alternate-row irrigation also increases water efficiency. Bench leveling has increased production with half the water in some areas.

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Water Association In Works For The Area

Formation of a water association is generally considered to be the first step necessary to the importation of water to the area. The organizational meeting is slated to be held on May 26th, with time and place still to be selected. At that time it is hoped that several hundred interested persons will put the proposed association into operation.

Watson, who is chairman of the water committee of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce and the West Texas Advisory Board to the Texas Water Development Board, was selected as temporary chairman of the organizing committee for the proposed water association at a meeting held in Lubbock in March.

Highlighting the May 3rd session will be reports of committee chairmen who have been drafting a proposed structure for the association. George McCleskey of Lubbock will give the report of the organization and legal committee, with J.D. Smith of Littlefield outlining plans for the May 26th meeting.

The group was interested in types of tillage used to manage the crop planted in wheat stubble. Visited were the W.L. Edelman farm, the John Benfer farm, Parmer County Implement Company and the Jack Clayton farm near Bovina.

Making the tour from the Bushland station were Jack Musick, director; Ron Allen, assistant director; Paul Unger, soil scientist and Allen King, agronomist.

On The Farm In Parmer County

The Rolling Plains Livestock Research Station at Spur held its field day this past Thursday. I had the opportunity to attend the field day and observe what work the station is doing concerning beef cattle.

Don McGinty, Research Associate with the station, is conducting research on feeding moist grain to cattle.

According to McGinty the results of feeding moist grain so far indicate:

1. Grain sorghum can be harvested successfully at 30 per cent moisture with standard self-propelled combines by slowing ground speed and maintaining cylinder speed at that used for threshing small grains.
2. Grain of 25-30 per cent moisture content (harvested or reconstituted) can be stored without spoilage in air-tight structures.
3. Moist grain in unground form is unsatisfactory for fattening cattle.
4. Ground moist grain produced weight gains equal or superior to those of cattle fed ground dry grains.
5. Cattle fed ground moist grain have required from 10 to 20 per cent less feed on a dry matter basis than cattle fed ground dry grain to produce a unit of gain. This increase in feed efficiency has been strikingly consistent and is apparently due to increased digestibility whether because of higher starch solubility or enzyme action.

Postal Savings Program Discontinues Interest

"United States Postal Savings Certificates which are on deposit at Post Offices will cease earning interest for depositors on April 27, 1967," Postmaster Wright Williams said today.

Nationwide, the Post Office Department is holding more than \$90 million in the now obsolete program which was discontinued by the Congress on March 28, 1966.

As of April 27, a year ago, Postal Savings was discontinued, and no deposits were accepted by the Post Office Department. Certificates whose anniversary dates have been reached since last April 26 have earned their final interest payment, Postmaster Williams said.

On June 30, he said, all remaining funds in the program will be turned over to the Treasury Department to be held in trust fund until liquidated. There they will remain available for payment without time limitation whenever proper

claims are received. Postmaster Williams urged that all Postal Savings depositors close out their accounts and invest their funds into United States Savings Bonds or the Freedom Shares, which on May 1, will pay 4.74 per cent interest.

Holders of Postal Savings certificates can arrange to redeem them simply by applying at the post office where the certificates were issued. The postmaster there he said, will provide guidance and necessary forms to assist in cashing certificates. All transactions can be handled by mail, and certificates issued to persons now deceased can be cashed by their legal heirs in accordance with state laws governing such distributions. Again, the postmaster at the issuance post office will render authorized assistance.

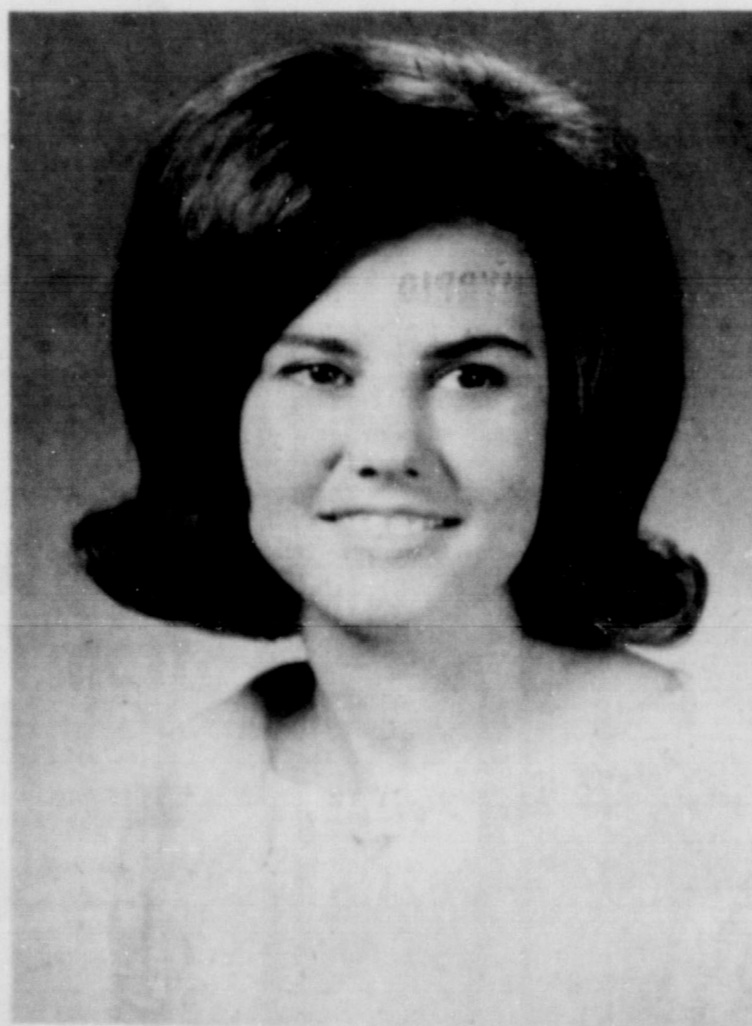

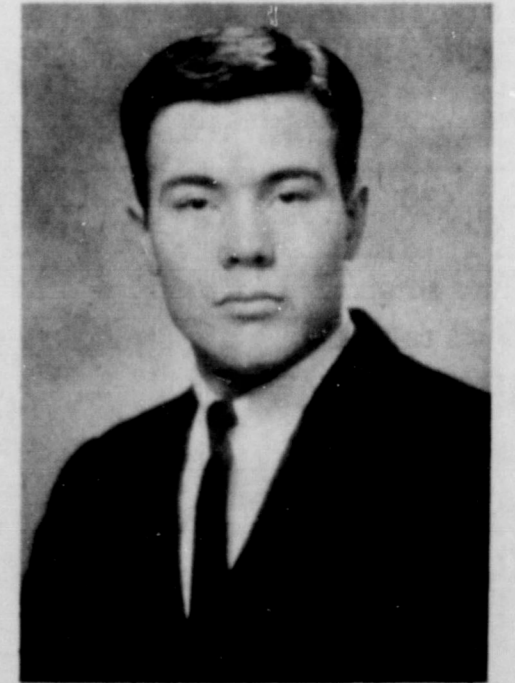
