

1949 Bids Fair to Be Worst Polio Year for Texas

With the alarming total of 922 Texans having been attacked by the dread disease poliomyelitis 1949 bids fair to be the worst polio year the State has ever experienced, and health officials in every section of the State are exerting every effort to bring the disease under control.

Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer, has re-iterated his appeal for every citizen to cooperate in a continuous clean - up program, ridding their premises of all rub bish and trash piles, and any such filth as will afford breeding places for flies and other disease spreading insects.

"This polio situation will never be controlled without the observ ance of stringent basic sanitation measures," the State Health Of ficer declared. "The filth on your premises may cause the disease to attack your neighbor; and the same condition on his premises may cause polio in your home. This problem of controlling polio is one demanding the closest pos. sible cooperation, and until a program of continuous cleaning up is instituted and stringently enforced, we shall continue to face the menace of polio in all sections of the State.







aplasmosis usually are resistant to further attacks, but they continue to be spreaders of the disease.

Tests have shown that dairy cows which have fresh water before them at all times produce about 7 percent more milk than those watered only once a day.

Farmers, mechanics, carpent. Morton ers, construction men and all others whose work causes them to sweat profusely are in danger of having their body salt content seriously depleted, and as a result may suffer from heat cramps or heat fag. Salt is a prominent constituent of sweat, and when the therometer hits the high register, the human body may lose as much as 40 to 50 grams of salt during a single day.

In many industrial plants, workmen are furnished with and urged to take a tablet of pure salt or a mixture of salt and dextrose with each drink of water. Many find this a pleasant way of taking extra salt, but ohters prefer to add the needed amount of salt to their food and drink.

"Take your extra salt in any manner that is agreeable to you," says Dr. Cox, "but take it. Heat cramps are very painful and exhausting. They are characterized by cramps in the abdominal region, headache, and in severe cases there may be nausea and vomiting. Body salt losses occur without the knowledge of the individual until a deficiency exists; then the abdominal muscles begin to cramp."

According to the State Health Officer, it is a wise precaution to keep the body supplied with salt, and thus avoid much possible suffering and loss of time from heat cramps.






