

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Where is That Modern Theatre?

"Excavation On New Wallace Theatre In 10 Days"—The promise in this headline which appeared in the Morton Tribune July 15, 1948 was carried out. Other promises within the story were not.

One of the most progressive businessmen in the West Plains wallace B, Blankenship, owner of the great Wallace Theatre hain seems to have forgotten Morton.

Just about a year ago when talk was being bandied back and forth about the need for a new theatre in Morton, it was rumored that someone was making plans for installing a new theatre. People at that time generally conceded first of all that Morton was large enough for two theatres, and in the second place, that the old theatre was neither large enough, or modern enough for the city.

Almost immediately Mr. Blankenship rushed workmen onto e scene, had the Coffee Shop moved away, and began the excavatg on, what was to be the foundation of a new, modern theatre. is was no pipe dream. The size of the new theatre, approximate ating capacity, cost of construction and even the name of the chitect were released.

But somehow this "most modern and largest of all Wallace theatres" has not yet arrived. In its proposed place, Morton can boast a muddy lot covered with weeds so thick that a newcomer without sharp eyes would never know that any digging had taken place.

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



Agricultural Short Shots of Interest

Doctors and nutritionists say the yellow fat of beef is a better source of Vitamin A than the more popular white fat. The yellow color of beef fat is due to carotene in feed that grazing ani. mals eat. Tests have shown that the fat of grass-fed cattle may have 20 times more Vitamin A than cattle fattened on a grain ration low in carotene.

A high producing dairy cow deserves good feeding, kind treatment and comfortable surroundings.

A big cotton crop doesn't neces. sarily mean big profits for the cotton growers. Profits will be determined by the price received and the cost of producing and harvesting the crop.

The storage for canned foods should be cool, dark, dry, wellventilated, clean and free from odors. Even good quality canned foods will develop a flat, sour taste and will lose food value when stored at warm tempera-

Feeds containing soybean meal and cottonseed meal for protein. with small amounts of fish meal and meat scraps seem to be the best. The growing pullet should get this feed along with liberal amounts of grain and the best tender green range that you can give them. The addition of choice alfalfa leaf meal to the mash you're feeding is a good substitute when good range is not

It is important to supply the growing birds with plenty of shade, pure, cool water and keep them clean. Moore says, if the pullets are developed properly they will be ready to produce next fall and winter when egg prices are best. The kind of birds that go into the laying house this fall will be largely determin. ed by the treatment they get this summer, and concludes Moore, now is the time to practice proper poultry range management.

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
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
