EDITORIALS.

A Little Boost Will Go A Long Way

The proper spirit, both in the players and in the fans, goes a long way toward winning a game whether it be baseball, football, or soccer. But spirit, like individuals themselves, is a tempermental thing, easily damaged, soon destroyed completely. Bar and

In a school, situated in a large city, the rivalry between teams within the city usually assures plenty of school spirit. Then as long as all the teams manage to win some of the time, the spirit is preserved. The situation works similarly in small towns except that the spirit stems from rivalry between towns, instead of inside one town

In this situation often the teams are not evenly balanced, in fact usually one of the small towns is habitually stronger than another, even though they be of the same approximate size.

Morton, though having come a long way in the past few years, needs a little help in getting the proper spirit. For quite some time the local High School had been an habitual loser. The fault for this did not rest on the shoulders of any one individual. The coaches may not have pleased everyone, but the school cfficials evidently saw some good in their work. The players, year after year, measured pretty close to the same standard but they just didn't have that extra push to go out and win. In many games they were of course outclassed, playing larger schools when they should have been concentrating on the smaller ones.

The schedule makers overlooked the fact that each year they were tending more and more to break down what school spirit remained.

First they had to convince the home town fans that they could bolster the team if the fathers would show a little interest. The Quarterback Club has been working hard on that angle. Then they had to convince the boys that hustle is the most important thing in any sport. With preseason training trips last year and this year, to get the boys in condition, both physically and mentally, to play ball they have begun to lick that problem.

Where the Morton teams formerly went into a game thinking they never had a chance, now they know that they can win, if they hustle and take advantage of the breaks.

Friday night a vastly improved Morton team will take the field against Whitharrel. Our boys are no different than any others the country over. With some support from the fans they are capable of a lot better football. If your boy is not out there on the field this season he will be someday or has been before. He needs the mental lift of knowing you and your friends are behind him.

What do you say fans, lets go out there Friday and root our boys home to victory. If they win they will get off on the right foot, but if they lose they'll need your support more than ever. Give it.





Conservationist **Discloses Plans On County Farms**

Fred W. Collins, Soil Conservationist in Cochran County has announced that several County agriculturalists have recently completed plans for soil and water conservation programs. France Baker, Willard Henry, F. G. Kennedy, B. M. Rose, Gowan and Harris, Fred Horner and C. E. Harbinson are those men.

C. H. Silvers, a cooperator of the CYT Soil Conservation District, has bench leveled 35 acres on his farm, located one-half mile east of town. Silvers has seeded 10 acres of this benched land to alfalfa, with wheat as a nurse crop. The remaining 25 acres will be seeded to wheat. A sprinkler system will be used to water the alfalfa and wheat up.

E. D. Courtney, living about 7 miles northeast of Morton, has recently bench leveled 10 acres on his farm. This land will be seeded to permanent pasture using a mixture of grasses and clover.

Max Bowers, a cooperator of the CYT SCD, has benched leveled 4 acres which will be seeded to a mixture of grasses and clover.

Gowan and Harris farm, 4 miles east of Morton, plan to bench level approximately 40 acres and seed to a legume this fall. The purpose of seeding to a legume is to add humus and nitrogen before seeding to grass.

Hazel Hancock, one mile west of Morton, has a good stand of weeping lovegrass that he seeded in July this year.

Max Bowers, Willard Cox and R. Z. Dewbre have recently completed the construction of reservoirs.
