In Texas, the Texas Division of the American Cancer Society is located in Houston. Therefore, all Texas postoffices forward all mail addressed to "Cancer" to the Houston postmaster, who, in turn, sends it to the state office of the Society. As soon as cancer control workers in Houston receive the requests, they forward cancer booklets and information to the persons mailing the inquiries.

Why don't you write to "Cancer" today? Do you know the seven danger signals of this disease? "Cancer" will tell you.

New State Health Laws to Begin On October 5th

The recently enacted premarital and prenatal laws become effective in Texas October 5.

Prior to securing a marriage license, both participants must furnish a certificate from a physician stating that a medical examination, including a blood test, has been performed. It must state the individuals are free from venereal disease.

Expectant mothers must submit a specimen of blood to be examined for syphilis.

Blood tests performed in compliance with both of these acts must be handled in a laboratory approved by the State Department of Health.

The health department has asked all laboratories performing such blood tests to apply for approval.

Stanolind No. 2 Holt Well in Cochran Has Possibilities of Making Producer

Despite the fact that it found the Devonian 978 feet low to a discovery from that formation one-quarter of a mile to the south, Stanolind Oil & Gas Company No. 2 Holt, a stepout to the Landon-Deep field in Central-South Cochran County, has possibilities of making a producer from that formation.

This venture has its best show of oil in a drillstem test in the top of the Devonian at 11,755-800 feet. The tester was open for three hours.

Recovery was the 2,000-foot water blanket, 5,000 feet of free oil and 480 feet of mud cut oil. There were no signs of formation water in that section.

The exploration drilled on down to 11,830 feet, and ran another drillstem test with the packer at 11,777 feet. The total was open six hours and 15 minutes.

Recovery was the 2,000-foot water blanket, 3,240 feet of free oil and gas cut drilling mud, and 540 feet of sulphur water.

At the time this report was prepared operator was running a string of 7-inch casing. It is probable that the pipe will be set bottom, and the producing formation which has been penetrated will be tested through perforations.

Interested observers think the well has at least 70 feet of oil bearing lime and chert in the Devonian above the top of the water zone. Those persons think it has a good chance of making an oil well from that interval.

There is a possibility that the development will be deepened from the present bottom of 11,830 feet, either before or after the section above that point is tested for production.

This venture, located 660 feet from south and east lines of section 3, block L, psl survey, topped the Devonian at 11,729 feet, to give it a datum of minus 7,918 feet.

That made it 978 feet low to the same company's No. 2 Edwards one-quarter of a mile to the south, the discovery, and up

to now the lone producer from the Devonian in the Landon-Deep field.

That region also has wells producing from the San Andres lime of the Permian and from a Pennsylvanian lime.

The field is about 17 miles south and a little west of the town of Morton.

Stanolind No. 1 Grollman, on the west side of the Landon field, and 660 feet from west and 407 feet from south lines of section 4, block L, psl survey, had reached 10,375 feet in Pennsylvanian lime, and will dig on until it finds and tests the Pennsylvanian pay zone. It may be carried on down to find and test the Devonian.

Seaboard Oil Company of Delaware No. 2 E. M. Hinson, slated 10,000-foot exploration in North-east Terry County, and one location south of the same company's No. 1 Hinson, discovery for commercial production from the Pennsylvanian to open the Mound Lake field, had reached 6,925 in Permian lime and, was boring deeper. It is 660 feet from south



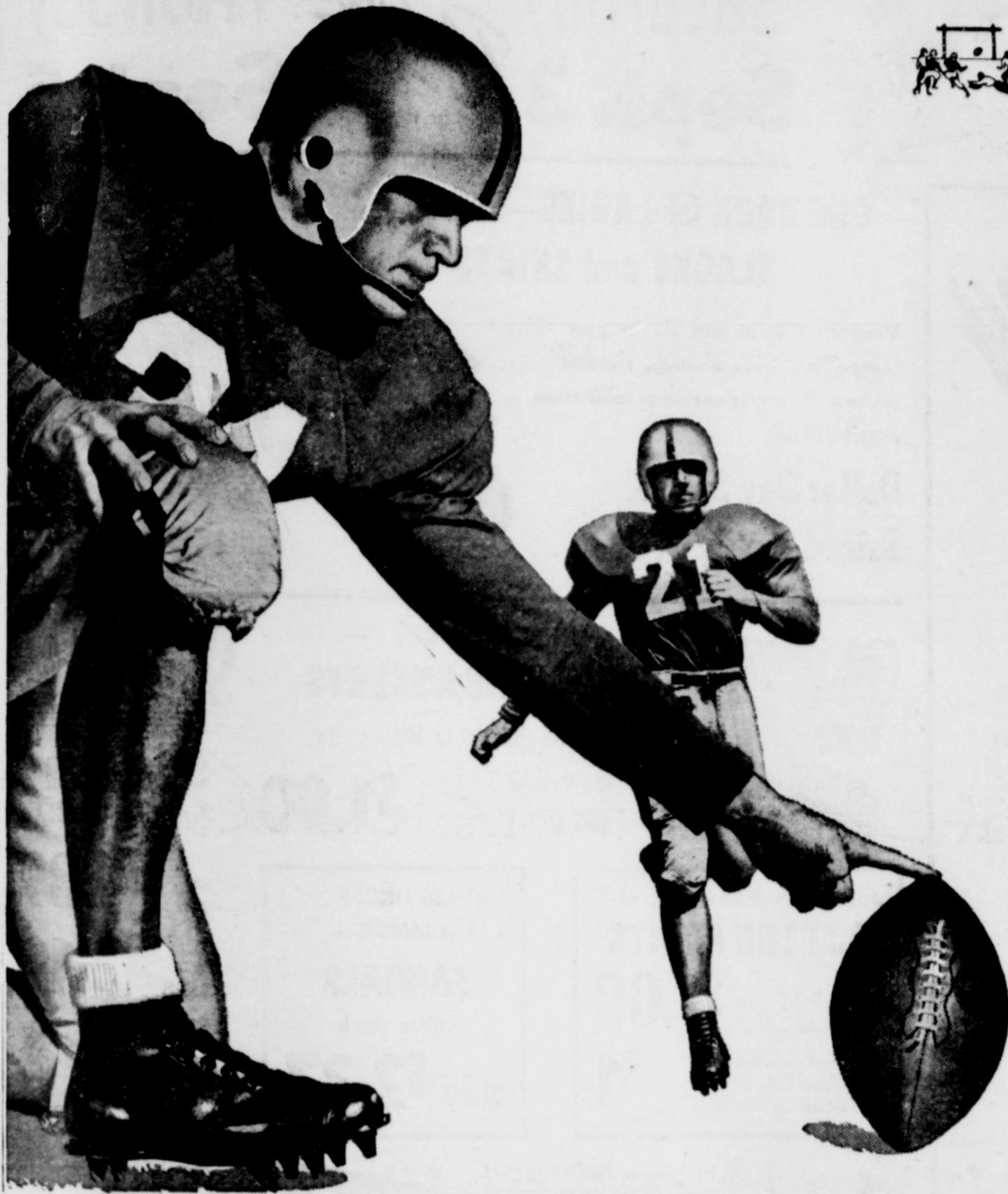

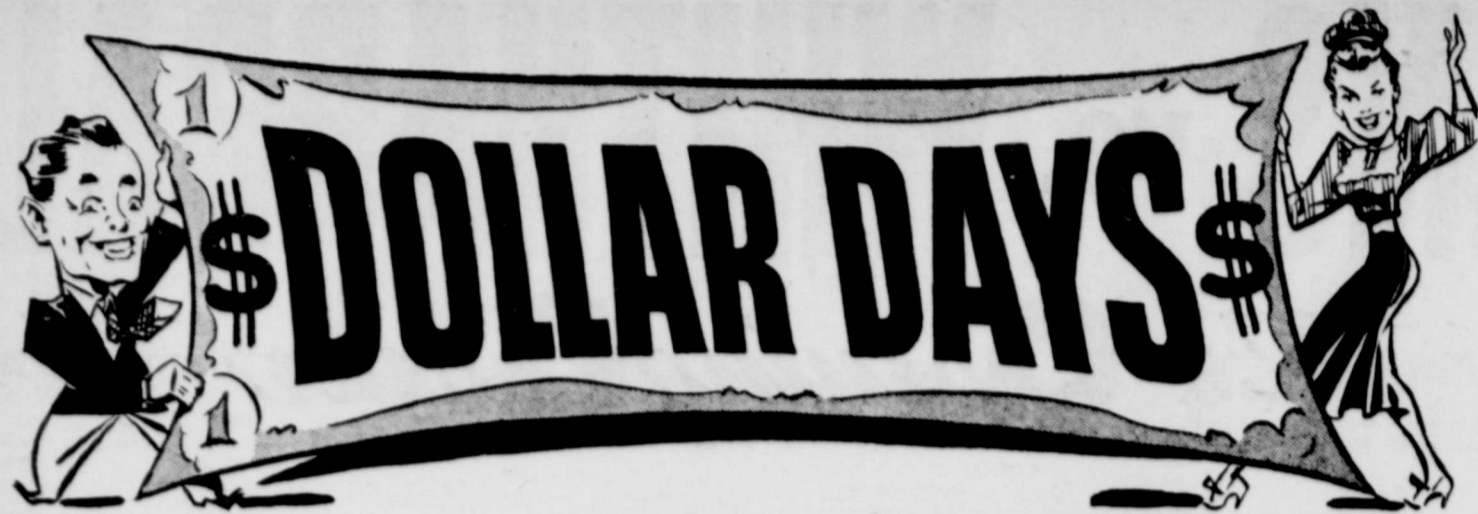

4-H Clubs Obtain New Regulations For Star Award

The new rules and regulations for the 4-H Club Gold Star Award were sent out to all 4-H Club girls on Monday, August 29. There have been some changes in the rules and regulations that will be of interest to all friends of 4-H Club work. This year each club will have at least one candidate which should make competition more interesting.

Here are the rules:
A Gold Star Pin will be awarded by the Texas A. and M. College Extension Service to the outstanding 4-H Club girl in each county. Only one award will be made to a county each year.

The requirements for the winning girl are:
1. She must be 14 years old before the first of June, 1950.
2. She must have completed three years of 4-H Club work.
3. She must have a good established demonstration.
4. She must exhibit leadership along with achievement.
5. She must be planning to continue her 4-H Club work.
6. A girl may receive this award only one time.

The girl judged the most outstanding in her club work will be interviewed by the 4-H Gold Star Committee which will be made up of the Chairman of the Education Committee of the County Home Demonstration Council and two 4-H Club girls who have received the Gold Star Award and are still carrying on an active 4-H Club demonstration. In addition to the Gold Star pin the Cochran County girl winning will be awarded an all expense trip to the State 4-H Club Round-Up held at Texas A. and M. College.

The Junior Award group will be made up of those girls whose ages range from 10 to 13 years. The rules for the winning girl in this group are as follows:

1. The girl must not have passed her 13th birthday by June, 1950.
2. She must have completed at least one year of 4-H Club work.
3. She must be carrying a well established demonstration.
4. She must be planning to continue her 4-H Club work.

5. After winning the junior award she is eligible to participate in the Gold Star Contest when she reaches the proper age. This award is strictly on a county basis. The award will be a plain gold plated 4-H pendant. The winner will be a county delegate to any district meetings that do not have an age limitation. The outstanding 4-H Club girl in each club will be judged by the same committee that judges the Gold Star Group.

Girls wishing to compete in either of these contests should notify the county home demonstration agent immediately and ask for proper forms to fill out. Records should be in the agent's office by Saturday, September 15, 1949.


