



# Late Blizzard Strikes; Moisture Supply Aided

Since the Friona area is getting to be more and more a cattle-feeding empire, we thought the following item might at least make feeders lift an eyebrow. Perhaps it's another way that the newspaper can help its community.

A mixture of ground-up newspaper and molasses was fed to a test group of heifers for 56 days in an experiment by dairy scientists at Pennsylvania State University. And believe it or not it made good cattle feed. Those cows digested the mixture -- at the rate of two and a half pounds of newspaper daily -- just as well as a controlled group of heifers digested a standard high-quality feed supplement. Both groups of heifers were fed conventional corn silage along with the supplement. It is predicted by Dr. Earl M. Kesler, professor of dairy science, that a newspaper-molasses mixture could help alleviate the expected world food deficit by making available a cheap, nutritious cattle feed that would not compete with man's own food needs. Molasses is cheap and nutritious and cows can digest molasses better when it's mixed with newspaper. Furthermore newspaper provides the kind of fiber the animals need. What affect the mixture had on the milk was not mentioned but evidently there was no appreciable difference in the quality or quantity.

This test group was made up of dairy cattle, so we don't know what the results would be on feeders. Neither do we know whether it was best to feed the cattle the newspaper before or after it was printed with the news.

At any rate, we're glad to know of additional possible uses for newspapers -- and something besides lining waste baskets for a change.

Proponents of an improved roadside park for Friona got a boost this week with the announcement by the State Highway Department that a new facility will be constructed just east of Friona.

A contract for four such projects was awarded by the state, and two of the parks are located on U.S. Highway 84. Another is south of Muleshoe on Highway 214.

Included in the project is to recondition, landscape, pave and improve the water system. Total cost of the four projects in the Lubbock district was \$104,871, so apparently the Highway Department plans to spend in the neighborhood of \$25,000 on the Friona park. The project is to be completed in 80 days.

Rural areas are surprising the experts on voter registration.

Preliminary figures submitted to Comptroller Robert S. Calvert show that the first 100 counties to report on their voters, all smaller counties, had a 63.5 per cent gain over last year.

Estimates by tax collectors in the three largest counties -- Harris, Dallas and Bexar -- indicate gains of only 13.6 and 18 per cent.

Some of the increase in rural counties is due to the fact that voters over age 60 in rural areas and towns under 10,000 now register to vote. Heretofore, they could vote without registering.

It is estimated that the number of qualified voters in Texas will exceed 4,000,000 this year. Final figures will not be in until April 1, the date that county reports are due.

For Farmer County to have a record number of registered voters is commendable, but that alone is not enough. To follow through at the polls should be the ambition of all.

A late-winter blizzard interrupted the Friona area's spring-like weather early this week, but the cold front brought additional moisture to farmland, which now is in the best shape moisture-wise that it has been for many seasons at this time of year.

The City of Friona measured a total of .40 inches of moisture last Sunday, moisture which came in the form of rain, drizzle, sleet and snow. The snow, which started in earnest about dark, left a covering of two inches by Monday morning. A gusting north wind caused

blizzard-like conditions in the area on Monday, and cut outside activities almost to a standstill. Friona schools, like practically all others in the Panhandle area, were closed by the blizzard. Blowing snow reduced visibility drastically most of the day on Monday, especially outside of the city, making travel hazardous.

The icy covering had begun to melt from city streets by Monday afternoon, although the temperature never climbed above 30 degrees. A warming trend on Tuesday further reduced the snow covering, leaving only large drifts in curbs, barrow ditches and fencerows as evidence of the storm by Wednesday.

Irrigation farmers, most of whom were already a week or two behind on their land preparation due to moist conditions from an extra-wet January, lost another week due to the storm, but most figured it was a pretty good reason to miss the outdoor time.

Dryland wheat prospects are now the best in several years, and the crop outlook in general is very good.

An additional .07 inch of moisture was measured by the city last Thursday, when a thunderstorm moved through the area.

The Friona Booster Club has kicked off a drive to raise money for a new scoreboard for Chieftain Field. It is announced by Booster president Bob Riethmayer.

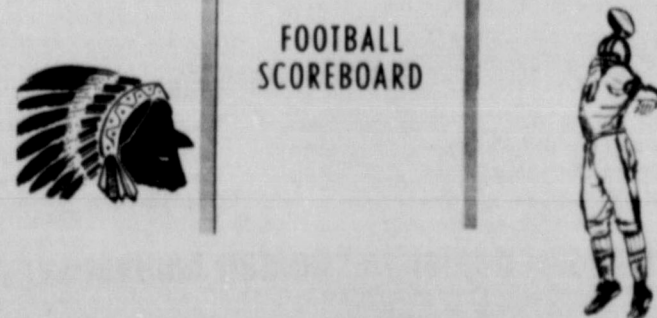

Designed by the Fair Play Scoreboard Company of Des Moines, Iowa, the company which designed and installed

the giant scoreboard for Houston's Astrodome, the scoreboard chosen is 18 feet long and eight feet high, and weighs 360 pounds.

Its all-aluminum cabinet is fully enclosed for year-round protection against dust and weather.

## Census Bureau To Get Information In County

Questions aimed at developing up to date information about the number and characteristics of the Nation's households and families will be asked in this area as part of the Census Bureau's monthly Current Population Survey the week of March 18, Director Francis H. Wilmer of the Bureau's Regional Office in Denver announced today.

Dale Hart of Friona will visit selected households in the Friona area.

The March survey contains inquiries on family composition migration, employment and unemployment, and sources of family income including earnings, social security payments, pensions, dividends, etc. Basic statistics on these subjects were gathered in the 1960 Census of Population and they are updated each year through these sample surveys.

The monthly survey is taken in a scientifically selected

cross-section of household in several hundred areas throughout the United States, according to Director Wilmer.

The identity of those questioned is kept completely confidential and the facts collected are used only for statistical purposes.

**Buffs Complete 1968 Football Schedule**

West Texas State University has completed its 1968 football schedule with the return of Memphis State, Western Michigan and Lamar Tech after schedule absences of a year or more. The Buffs will also meet 1967 foes Wichita State, University of Pacific, Montana State, University of Texas at Arlington, Utah State, New Mexico State and Colorado State. West Texas' 10-game schedule include five home games in Buffalo Bowl and five road contests. 1968 home games will begin at 8 p.m. rather than 7:30 p.m. like the last season. 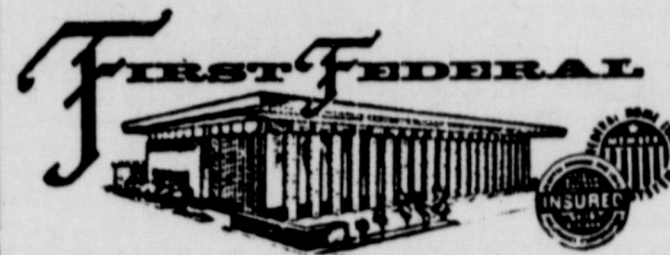
The club plans to send at least one team of four members to

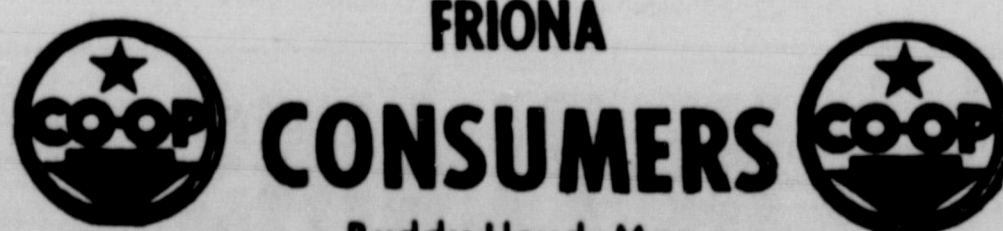

### Some Heaters Recalled As Potentially Unsafe

Sears, Roebuck and Co. has announced it is recalling some 6,000 gas baseboard heaters which it regards as potentially unsafe.

It identified them as four models of its "Gas Fired Baseboard Thru-Wall Heater." They are Homart model numbers 133,72561 or 133,7256111; 133,72562 or 133,725621; 133,72565 or 133,725651; and 133,72566 or 133,725661. The plate showing model numbers is located on top of the burner box.

Sears said its recall decision was reviewed with the U.S. Public Health Service and the American Gas Association, which will cooperate with Sears in an effort to locate the heaters.

James W. Button, vice president-merchandising, said most of the 6,000 heaters were sold between September, 1962 and December, 1966. They were last offered for regular sale in a catalog circular in August and September, 1966. A few remaining units were sold in retail stores during 1967, he added.

"Every effort will be made by Sears retail stores and catalog facilities to locate and replace all of these heaters,"

he said. Because many customers purchase and install equipment themselves, he added, it will be difficult to locate them unless they notify Sears.

In addition to Sears public announcement, the company will advertise in newspapers and catalogs. The ads will urge owners of the units being recalled to shut them off immediately and contact the manager of the nearest Sears retail store or catalog sales office.

Button said Sears decision to recall its heaters was based on the company's field investigation. This investigation showed some of the units had developed defects, and in some cases produced measurable amounts of carbon monoxide.

"These defects developed," he added, "in spite of the fact that production units when tested passed all safety and performance standards without question. The design, while sound, did not allow sufficient latitude for human error."

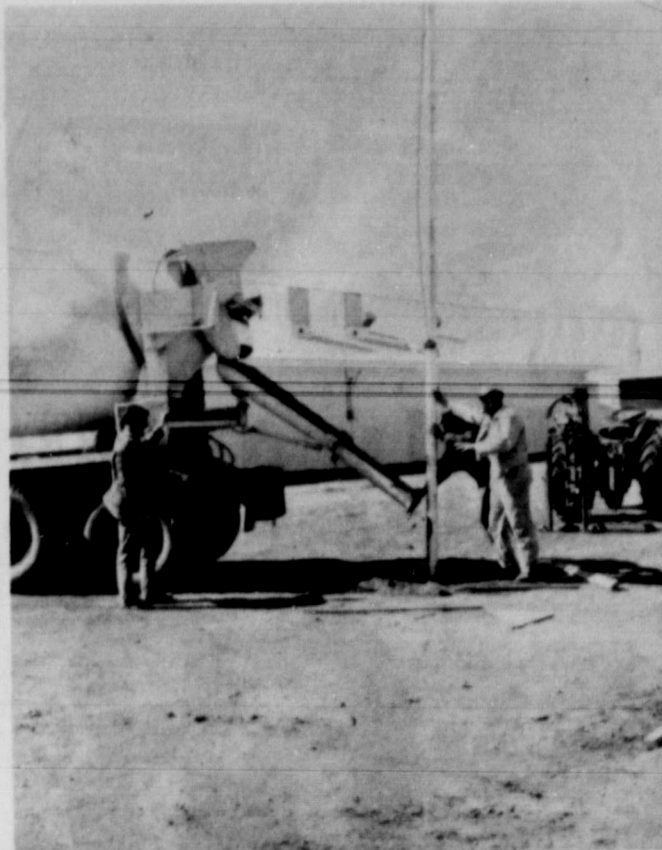

**On The Farm In Parmer County**

**MEETING SET**  
An educational meeting on the insects and diseases affecting major Parmer County crops has been set for Thursday, March 14. The meeting will be held at the Friona State Bank and will begin at 7:30 p.m.

Dr. Robert Berry, Area Plant Pathologist with the Extension Service, will discuss and present up-to-date information or disease problems for various crops.

Lyndon Almand, Area Entomologist with the Extension, will present the latest work being conducted on insects and their control.

Both of these speakers are headquartered at the South Plains Research and Extension Center.

This is a County-wide meeting and all interested persons are encouraged to attend. **WEED CONTROL IN SUGAR BEETS**  
Chemical weed control studies in sugar beets have been conducted in the Panhandle area since 1964. Much of this work has been conducted in cooperation with the Bushland Experiment Station with Dr. Allen Wiese assisting with the studies.

Herbicide evaluation trails have been conducted when the herbicides were applied and incorporated prior to beet planting, postemergence to small

beets and postemergence and incorporated to sugar beets at thinning time. Studies also have been conducted to determine the effect of time of application, depth of incorporation, and the thoroughness of incorporation on herbicide toxicity to weeds.

Some of the conclusions from these studies indicate that at normal planting time, in March, preplant incorporated herbicides are of little value, unless volunteer grain sorghum infests the field. If sugar beets are planted after April 15, acceptable pigweed control usually will be obtained with Tillam, Ro Neet and Pyramin.

There are no labeled herbicides that will satisfactory control pigweed in small sugar beets. Topside will control kochia in small sugar beets.

Application of Treflan and Eptam to weed-free sugar beets at thinning time will give good weed control. Treflan will control weeds from application until fall while Eptam will control weeds from 6-12 weeks after application. Utilization of Eptam in 1968 is dependent upon label clearance.

**Consumer Benefits By Farmers' Efficiency**

By Prentice Mills  
The consumer benefits from the efficiency of the American farmer. The farmer doesn't always do so well. Let us look at the facts as follows:

**Food Expenditures:** Americans saved more than twice as much in 1967 than in 1960, and half of the increase was made possible by a smaller percentage of income spent for food. Had consumers paid in 1967 the same proportion of their income for food as in 1960, they would have had \$12 billion less to spend on other things or to save.

Food was about the only item of expenditure that went down in 1967 compared to 1960 as a percentage of personal disposable income. In 1960 consumers spent 20% of their income for food -- in 1967 17.7%. Most of this went for marketing and other services. -- **FARMERS GOT ONLY FIVE PERCENT.**  
Total spent for food went up from \$70 billion in 1960 to \$96.4 billion in 1967, but had

the percentage of income spent for food not dropped off, consumers would have paid out about \$109 billion for food last year.

Except for food, practically everything takes bigger and bigger bites out of what consumers have available to spend. From 1960 to 1967 the percentage of personal disposable income spent went up for interest, autos, home furnishings and appliances, clothing and services (includes housing, household operations, transportation, medical costs, personal care and recreation.)

Not only has agriculture freed billions of dollars for consumers to spend on things other than food, it has also freed 94 per cent of Americans to produce an abundance of other goods and services that have made the U.S. the most affluent country in history. In Russia, on the other hand, more than half the population is needed to produce food and fiber.

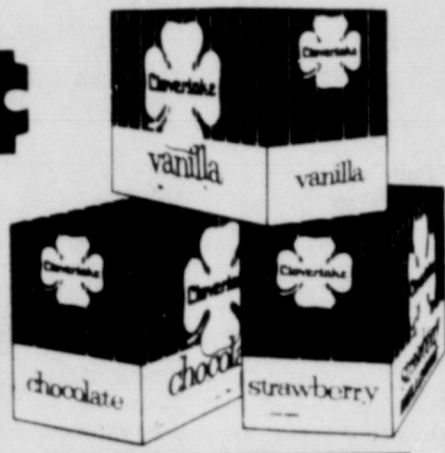

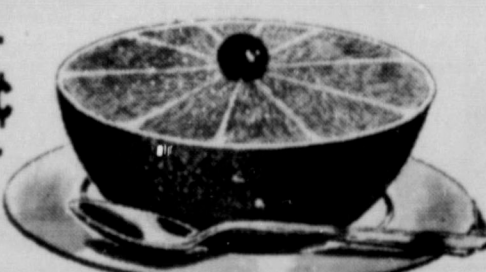
