Need for Public Information on **Venereal Disease**

A very definite need for widespread public information about venereal disease is indicated, stated State Health Officer Geo. W. Cox. "The information campaign now underway in many Texas communities is in part a reflection of that need," Dr. Cox

The total number of cases reported to the health department for twenty leading communicable diseases, show that syphilis and gonorrhea totals were higher than any of the others, except influenza and measles, in 1948.

More than 20.000 cases of syphilis and 27,000 cases of gonorrhea were reported to the health department last year. "Nor is it expected that the situation will be different this year." said Dr. Cox. "Reports to date for 1949 indicate that the venereal diseass will continue in their highranking place."







Rice Vegetable **Turkey Soup**


