#### 1950 Auto License Tags Placed on Sale; Must be on Cars by April 1

New auto license plates were placed on sale at the Sheriff's office at the Cochran county courthouse Wednesday morning,

February 1st. The new tags may be placed on automobiles immediately, the tax assessor's office reported.

The 1950 license tags must be on all vehicles not later than

#### **Vernon Reports Local Cemetery Funds Are Short**

According to J. A. Vernon, caretaker at the Morton Cemetery, more funds are needed to keep the Cemetery in first class condition.

The electric bill alone runs around ten dollars a month, Vernon said, and there are no funds to pay this and other bills. The electricity is used to pump water out of the well which is used for irrigation of trees, plants, grass and shrubs at the cemetery.

Beginning last summer the association added a caretaker fee to lot prices but before that those persons purchasing burial lots simply paid for the ground.

If you own a lot or lots in the in commissioners court room at cemetery, bought before 1949. you have not paid a fee for the upkeep of the cemetery. It is your duty as well as privilege to see that the cemetery association has enough money to keep your lots in good condition.

Lots in the cemetery are owned by approximately 310 families. Vernon estimated that around \$1,500 or \$2,000.00 would keep the cemetery in fine condition. If each owner would contribute as much as ten dollars each year the cemetery association could hire a helper for Mr. Vernon and there might also be some extra beautification.
