Cochran County Hen Lays Big Egg Too; 8½ by 7 in.

Not to be outdone by a jumbo size egg laying hen of Lubbock, a biddy owned by Mrs. O. L. Castle came across with an outside egg last week.

Mrs. Castle has a flock of about 200 White Leghorn chickens, all less than two years old. The large egg found last week measured eight and one half by seven inches, in comparison with a normal egg which is generally about six inches by five.

Mrs. Castle after reading in the *Avalanche-Journal* about L. D. Garrett of Lubbock and his unusual hen (Mr. Garrett thought his chicken was a rooster) decided her various sized eggs worthy of mention.

Mrs. Castle lives eight miles Southeast of Morton. She too, had a midsize egg to show, this one measured four by three and one fifth inches; however Mrs. Castle, unlike Mr. Garrett, doesn't know to which hen or hens credit is due for the freak eggs.

The dog had been loose twice since it became ill and according to Mr. Willis, "we didn't know Pat's whereabouts and whether or not anyone was bitten during

this time." Willis and Mrs. Willis attempted to administer medicine to the dog before taking it to the hospital; both are taking rabies treatment as is Mrs. Charles Dean, mother of Mrs. Willis. Mrs. Dean was bitten by the family pet before its death.

Larry James Brittan, who had visited in the Willis home shortly before the pet was removed to Lubbock is also taking the rabies treatment.

"The city has had numerous calls from citizens complaining about stray dogs, and in view of the current outbreak of rabies here and all over Texas, which constitutes a definite menace to the public's health and safety, we will shoot all stray dogs found on the streets of Morton beginning Wednesday," the Mayor said.

Pete Todd Attended Rural Electric Cooperative Convention in Chicago

Pete Todd, member of the Bailey County Electric Cooperative which serves Cochran County, returned last week from Chicago where he attended the eighth annual convention of the National Rural Electric Cooperative Association convention, held in that city March sixth through ninth.

Cecil Tate, REA attorney and Roy Sheriff, secretary, both of Muleshoe, also attended the convention.

The convention, operated on a unique plan which permitted each individual to get answers to his questions from the nation's top men in various fields, was aimed at an exchange of information to improve and extend rural electric service.

On hand to help find answers to the questions were Secretary of the Interior Oscar Chapman, Rural Electrification Administration. Administrator Claude R. Wickard along with his top rural electrification specialists, Senator Lister Hill (Ala.), Tennessee Valley Authority Chairman Gordon Clapp, NRECA executive manager Clyde T. Ellis and experts on the technical phases of rural electric system operation.

Inadequate power supply and high rates which rural electric systems must pay for wholesale power were given more consideration than any other single problem. Calling electricity "the life-blood of our Nation," Secretary Chapman declared that the Department of Interior is developing the nation's water power at a record breaking pace and is constantly making efforts to cooperate with rural electric systems needing that power to fill the rapidly growing demands of America's farmers for electricity. Several speakers, including TVA Chairman Clapp, pointed out that development of low cost water power by the government could save American farmers millions of dollars annually on their electric bills. Possibilities of generation of their own power by rural electric systems were thoroughly explored.

The new rural telephone program, under which REA makes loans for the construction and improvement of rural telephone facilities, was also given considerable study. Delegates, generally stating their plans to stay out of the rural telephone business, discussed steps they should take to aid telephone companies in their areas. It was urged that they lend the benefit of their experience because of the desire to aid farmers in their communities and because telephones make it easier to give good electric service. They stressed the fact that outages could be reported much more quickly and service restored if all members had telephones.

Senator Hill referred to the first rural telephone loan made late in February and urged the delegates to stick together in the "never-ending fight as we carry to the farm people of America the opportunity to share fully in the comforts and benefits of modern living, as we develop the rivers and streams of America, hold back its floods, rebuild and enrich the soil, reforest the hillsides, provide cheap power and

THE LAW AND YOU

DO YOU KNOW that any citizen can make arrests in certain situations?

Generally arrests for violations of the law are made by officers charged with the duty of enforcing the law, but in some situations citizens may make arrests.

Any officer may call upon a citizen to assist him should the need arise in an individual case. Every one is familiar with the term posse. This is a group of citizens who have been called upon to assist the officers. In these two situations, it is a citizen's duty to assist the officer or officers, and he is subject to a penalty if he fails to assist when called upon.

If a citizen sees a felony or

breach of the peace committed in his presence, he may arrest the offender and take him to jail and turn him over to the proper authorities.

Also a citizen has the right to prevent the consequences of a theft, and he may take the property into his possession and the supposed offender before the proper authorities. He must have reasonable grounds to believe the property stolen to act in this situation.

A citizen acting in one of the above situations may use only such force as is reasonably necessary to accomplish the arrest and delivery of the offender to the proper authorities.
